Texas ranchers and farmers no longer have to pay sales tax on certain purchases to be used in the production of food and fiber. Such items as baling wire, fencing supplies, and machinery and equipment were exempted by the new Texas Sales Tax Law.

Agricultural producers do not automatically qualify for the exemption however, says Don Parks, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station. Producers must file an exemption certificate with each firm or business with which they deal. To qualify for the exemption, the item purchased must be used exclusively on a farm or ranch for the production of crops, livestock, or other agricultural products. Home gardens do not qualify. Also, certain items are exempt without the use of the exemption certificate. These include feed for ranch or farm animals, fertilizer, seeds, annual plants and animals.

Items requiring the exemption certificates include insecticides, herbicides, medications for ranch animals, machinery and equipment, hand tools, baling wire, fencing materials, gates, storage facilities for bulk commodities, natural gas or electricity if used for pumps for livestock or irrigation water, and certain other agricultural-production related uses.

There is a brochure outlining the materials that are exempted under the law as well as those that are not exempt. A supply has been ordered for the extension office here and if you desire one, we'll send it as soon as they arrive. The certificates must be obtained from the Office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts, Sales Tax Division in Austin, 111 East 7th Street, Austin, Texas 78774.

Producers thinking of holding onto their feeder cattle may want to take a closer look at the market situation, at least for the remainder of 1976. Things are not too bright according to Dr. Ed. Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. His analysis of the market comes after an extensive trip through the cattle country the Corn Belt and visits with feedlot managers. "I look for feeder prices to weaken into the fall and winter for a number of reasons," says Uvacek. "Among these are the continued weakness in fed cattle prices, big feedlot losses, no major drop in sight for feed-grain prices, a big supply of feeders still available, and more competition from other meats such as pork and broilers."

Uvacek sees his situation developing in the months ahead. "Choice feeder steers in the 600-700 pound range will likely move to the low \$30s by October. Many feeder animals will move to slaughter during this period. Some price gains could then result as we move into the winter months and the demand from feedlots begins to recover. The extent of the price rise into 1977 will depend on how many animals are held over the winter. Too many holdovers will keep the price gain down."

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.





How do the insurance companies set the rates for auto insurance?

Auto rates are determined by both statistical losses in given territories and the personal driving records of the individual policy holders. Statistics for a particular territory are gathered by taking the number of losses per age group along with the premiums paid—setting the stage for general auto rates. After standard are set, the individual driving record plays a big part in the premium a person will pay for his auto coverage. If a driving record is good, the standard or minimum rate is paid. A driver, considered a POOR RISK, will pay larger premiums to have adequate coverage.

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.



And every Tuesday throughout the summer, there is a very lively children's circus in the Odense Zoo.

Denmark even has its very special Hans Christian Andersen Festival held in the Funen Village, in his native town Odense, from July 6 to August 5, where children enact Andersen fairytales on an open-air stage, that will delight the whole family.

Social Security

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Sterling County at a rate of \$30,913 a month at the start of 1976. Frank Upp, social security manager in San Angelo, said.

Of the 194 social security beneficiaries living in Sterling County, 104 are retired workers and 7 are disabled workers. Another 83 are receiving benefits as the dependents of workers who are retired, disabled, or deceased.

In Sterling County, 47 people under age 65 and 147 people age 65 and over are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries 74 are men, 93 are women, and 27 are children. The children receive payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.
