## Swine Flu Shots Set For Next Week

TUESDAY & WEDNESDAY  
At Hospital 4-7 P.M.

The flu vaccine has arrived in Sterling City and will be given here at the hospital next Tuesday and Wednesday. Hours for giving the shots have been set at 4 to 7 p.m. The shots are free. Persons getting the shots will read the forms, and sign consent papers before receiving them.

The vaccines cover two kinds of flu, both Swine and Victoria, it was said.

Taking or receiving the shots is recommended by President Gerald Ford and Dr. Wm. J. Swann, local physician.

So, make a date with yourself for getting the shots here at the hospital next Tuesday or Wednesday afternoon.

Persons 18 years old and up are eligible for the shots, it was said. There might be some exceptions in the age, if one's pediatrician or doctor deems it safe or necessary.

### Social Security

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Sterling County at a rate of \$30,913 a month at the start of 1976. Frank Upp, social security manager in San Angelo, said.

Of the 194 social security beneficiaries living in Sterling County, 104 are retired workers and 7 are disabled workers. Another 83 are receiving benefits as the dependents of workers who are retired, disabled, or deceased.

In Sterling County, 47 people under age 65 and 147 people age 65 and over are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries 74 are men, 93 are women, and 27 are children. The children receive payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.



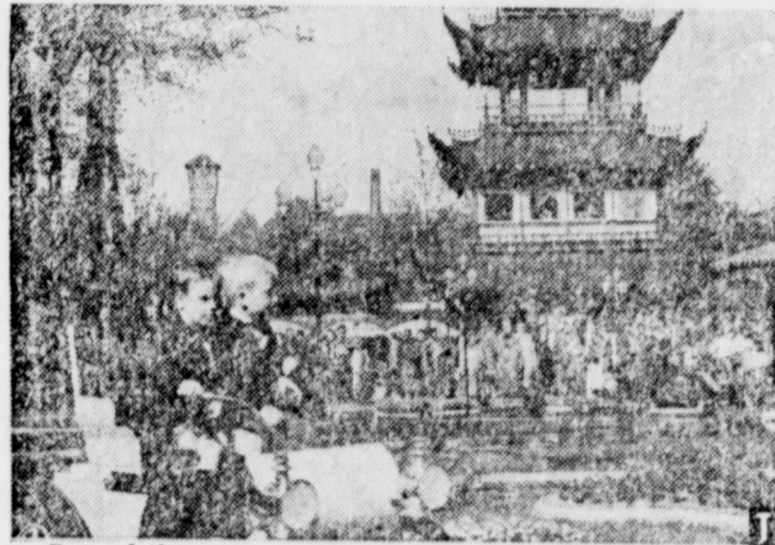

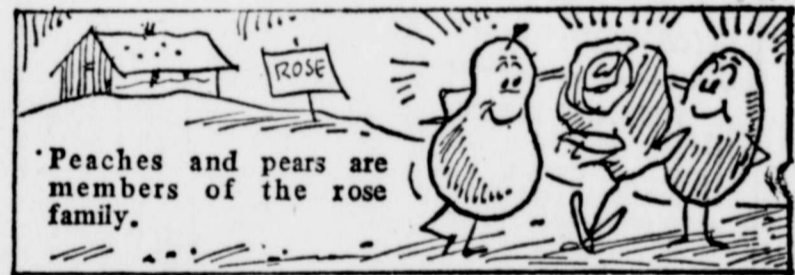
For the adventurous, there is Givskud Lions Park, where you'll see African Lions, enor-

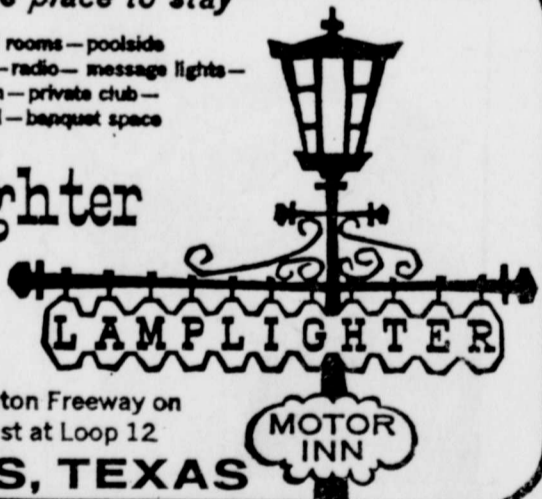
