



I noticed in your issue of the 28th ult. a letter from Mr. S. Nugent Townsend reflecting upon our old fellow-townsman. Dr. Kingsbury, and winding up with a challenge to the Doctor to get any one of the San Antonio bankers to endorse his (the Doctor's) statements. Now, in justice to Dr. K., Mr. S. Nugent Townsend's ignorance of our community should be exposed. What do our bankers know about the correctness of Dr. Kingsbury's statements? Just about as much as they do of the reason for Mr. Townsend-spelling his name "S. Nugent" or for parting his hair in the middle. Our bankers are very intelligent gentlemen, but they are not singaged in the business of inducing immigration to Texas, and know very little about practical farming or other home industries. Dr. K. might retort by asking Mr. "S. Nugent Townsend" to secure the endorsement of the Bank of England to his statements made in print. 
