Last year 250,000 pounds of sponges, worth about £28,000, were exported from the island, of which I 159,000 pounds were sent to Great Britain, the remainder being reserved for the United States and Canada.

They are next thoroughly washed in sea-water, after which they are stowed in the vessel's hold. On arriving at port, the sponges are sold to merchants who trade in them, and, by whom they are passed into the hands of the clipper, who cuts off all coarse matter, and otherwise trims them. This operation having been performed they are ready for the press, where they are baled for shipment. A sponge-press is not unlike a cider press on a large scale, but it is made of fron, and requires from two to eight men to turn the pace.


