THE FINANCIAL QUESTION CONTINUES. The financial question discussion continues to be bounding along, and we are becoming accustomed to hear of a statement made one day being contradicted or supported by another directly opposite in character the next, that merely a slight surprise results. In this District the Ireland faction attempted to take the people by storm and drive them into a political act de sear for capture to their uses, but unfortunately for them, and fortunately for the people, the election was too far distant. The people had time to reflect; to read; to post themselves in regard to the true situation of affairs, and the result has been that many of the broad assertions so defiantly made at the outset have already, with the election yet more than two months in the future, been stripped of their gloss and false covering, and the heralds of the Ireland party find themselves in confusion. It has been developed that instead of Mr. Schleicher being a renegade Democrat because of his financial views, that he is on, and his enemies off, the national platform, Mr. W. was denounced most heartily for his vote on the Island bill, and yet the aggressors he asked to guard against already suddenly threatening, if not actually present, and upon us. Instead of demanding that all holding the financial views of Mr. Schleicher should be driven to the back ground, we find the leading papers of the State unanimous in advocating the election of a man entertaining those same views, and even the opponents of Mr. Schleicher doing the same thing. With a grand flourish the people were drenched with the greenback idea only to recover from it to find that the chief antagonist of all those performing the duties of a candidate had only a short time before declared that that policy could not be carried out without overriding the constitution of the United States. The truth of the matter is, the campaign was opened too soon for the Ireland faction, and they now find themselves in an embarrassing position and under the necessity of retracting their steps and retracing their statements. They went blustering wildly along until their heads bled squarely up against a dead wall on which was written by the people of this district, "You have been trying to deceive us." The nomination and laudation of John Hancock was a blow to Mr. Schleicher's position, for they, too, unwittingly joined in the praise of the candidate of the Fifth District, little thinking, doubtless, how they were stultifying themselves by the act. Now comes another thorn in the side. If Hon. R. Q. Mill has been correctly reported, that gentleman holds that the only absolute means of gold and silver and they are already gone, and that God has made them so. Nothing else can be used in their place unless it is made redeemable in gold and silver at the will of the holder. He holds that to stamp on a piece of paper, "This is a dollar" is a delusion and a snare, and the government that does so is guilty of a lie. Greenbacks not redeemable in gold and silver are worthless, and he is opposed to the country with worthless currency. Mr. Mill, too, is bound to defeat on account of his financial views. No! No more than most Hancock in the Fifth District. Neither of those gentlemen are in the way of Judge Ireland, and their financial views are of little importance. It is only in the Sixth District that the question is a vital one, and to-day, if Schleicher was a Greenbacker, Judge Ireland would be on the opposite side, "batting with might and main for the time-honored principles of Democracy."

EVERYBODY TO BLAME. Our dispatches of yesterday morning mention an Indian council at Umatilla, the United States being represented by General Howard, Wheaton and others, the object being to take means to procure the peace. There has always been a division of sentiment regarding the policy pursued towards the Indians by the government, some being in favor of the sword and some in favor of an appeal to sentiment. Both the sword and the "piques dog" have failed to accomplish the desired effect, and Indian troubles come with the regularity of the seasons. Some blame the Indians, some blame the government, and while the criminalization and extermination is going on, the outbreaks continue, the government is robbed, and the frontiersmen and their families are massacred. Whether a different system of government would make a change for the better in the conduct of the Indians, we know not, but there can be no doubt that the Indians have more than the semblance of cause for complaint against those who are placed in charge of their fate, and this should be first removed. The placing of the Indians in charge of gentlemen "diabrotic for piety and human instincts" has not brought the fruit that was expected, for since that "reform" was inaugurated the outbreaks have been more frequent than under the old regime. A recent writer from Eastern Oregon to the San Francisco Chronicle says this pious policy has a tendency to aggravate rather than subside the discontent of the Indians. He says the most powerful, and at the same time the best disposed band of warriors in Oregon at the present time is that of Chief Moses, but if the reverend gentlemen who presides over the Umatilla reservation could carry his points, Moses would have been driven to the war-path long ago. This pious emissary to within a couple of weeks had been exerting himself to have Moses and his band driving off lands on which they have maintained themselves for generations, and correlated on a reservation on Government fodder. Moses and his people are converts to the Catholic faith, and as the agent who is thus annoying them has assumed the authority of banishing the Catholic missionaries from his reservation, it may be well believed that this interference is not calculated to cement the bonds of peace in that part of the country. It is a little singular that a Government founded on religious liberty as one of its cardinal principles should countenance the fomenting of disorder by the introduction of religious discussion and bigotry in the Indian Bureau or any other department. Gen. Crook, the great Indian fighter, has also become very outspoken in favor of the Indians and against the government policy. In an interview with an Omaha reporter after his return from the Bannock reservation he said the Indians engaged in the late hostilities were driven to desperation by hunger—other starvation. The proof is incontrovertible that Indians have actually starved to death on the reservations. The Indians cannot now support themselves as formerly. The writer has occupied about all the grounds that would afford them a living and there is no more left on the reservations. The Indians are left entirely destitute, and if the government will not keep good faith and feed them, they have the alternative of lying down and starving or going out and plundering.
