##### KILLING OF J. W. COLDER.

DALLAS, September 4, 1878.

As Ira Harris, Receiver, and J. W. Colder, General Manager of the Dallas & Wichita road were passing down Elm street at noon today they were approached by Albert Pointer, Oberchain and Rosser, former directors of that road. Pointer addressed Harris, and after a few words were exchanged Harris struck him with his fist. Pointer then knocked Harris down with a cane and drawing a pistol began shooting at Colder. By this time his two friends Oberchain and Rosser had drawn their pistols and also directed their fire to Colder, who had been standing quietly by taking no part in the conversation. He was shot three times in the head, breast, abdomen and hip, and fell to the ground. Either of the three shots mentioned would have killed him. After falling and being mortally wounded Colder managed to draw his pistol and fired one shot without effect. He then expired. Pointer, Oberchain and Rosser then went to the courthouse and gave themselves up to the sheriff. Harris being unamused took no part in the affair after the shooting commenced. There had been a long feud between these parties, occasioned by Dallas & Wichita railroad competition, and the wrath of the three seems to have been concentrated on Colder.

##### GALVESTON GOSPEL.

GALVESTON, September 4, 1878.

Houston tonight declared rigid quarantine against this city. For the past week rumors have been afloat that Houston contemplated such a step, yet it occasioned some surprise and great indignation among our people. Houston's reason for this embargo is that Galveston has been making discrimination against Morgan steamers in favor of Mallory's, and on account of the Galveston Board of Health refusing to allow the steamer New York of the Morgan Line to enter this port. Houston declared the quarantine.

##### DE RUTHERFORD VENTILATED AND THE BUG EXPOSED.

Galveston, Sept. 4.—The President of the board of health received this evening a telegram from Dr. Rutherford, Health Officer of Houston, that he would declare quarantine against Galveston at six o'clock p. m. Upon the receipt of this telegram a meeting of the board was called at the city hall. A large number of the board were present and the adjournment of the board on an impromptu public meeting was called, which was addressed by all the members of the board, explaining fully all the complications, which have arisen regarding quarantine matters.

##### YELLOW FEVER NOTES.

New Orleans, September 4.—Died 12.25 p. m.—Weather unfavorable, heavy rain. New cases 21; deaths 7.

New Orleans, September 3.—Midnight.—A. B. Still, of the Democratic staff, and son of Mayor Rich, died tonight of yellow fever.

Holly Springs, Miss., September 4.—2 p. m.—There are over sixty cases of yellow fever here and six deaths. The steamer is all closed and the people who can get away.

##### NATIONAL CAPITAL NOTES.

Washington, September 4.—The President has removed Gen. Kelley, Postmaster at St. Louis, and appointed Samuel Hays to that office. Charles W. Hay, of Memphis, has been appointed Postmaster at St. Louis. The Postmaster, Hays, is a strong friend of Secretary Schurz, and there was a warm fight between the two candidates.

##### MORE BONDS CALLED IN.

Washington, September 4.—The Secretary of the Treasury today issued the seventh call for 5,200 bonds of 1865, and interest to be paid on demand on December 31, 1878. The call is for \$1,000,000 of bonds and three million registered bonds.

##### AID FOR THE SUFFERERS.

Washington, September 4.—Senator Kellogg this morning at the suggestion of certain parties in New Orleans had an interview with the Mayor of that city. He stated that the twenty days government rations for 2,000 persons for that city be distributed through the collection of the port. This will avoid the necessity of the Twenty-day rations. Rations will be distributed on their respective applications without any distinction between the colored and white races.
