Who is "many citizens" is a question a considerable number of our people are asking their heads about. The "people's movement" has not yet come to "a head," and "who is which" is not easy to determine as yet.

The press congress in which the Illinois Agricul. Soc. took place some weeks ago does not seem to have accomplished much, judging from the tone of one dispatch yesterday. After a few more sessions are held, another pipe of peace smoking will make a good wind up to the proceedings.

PLANTERS are beginning to fear they will lose considerably on their cotton crop by failure to secure a sufficient force of pickers. In this section of the country the demand for laborers is reported to be very great. There is a tendency for those being on the same in any community in Western Texas.

The Chinese should have a recognition by the People's party. If it is to be a party of all nations, let it have a share. The Chinese residents of San Antonio may have any vote, but they possess a certain influence over many politicians who own them with bills. What is the bid for the Chinese influence?

The Atlanta Argus explains why it favors the election of Hancock. It is simply because it does not deny that Hancock is a hard money man, yet it favors the Democratic election, while it opposes Mr. Buchanan because of the latter's hard-money views. The Argus would have more influence if it would not attempt to "beat about the bush" so lamely.

This is the day set apart by the Governor as a day of fasting and prayer on account of the drought, and for contributions in aid of the sufferers. The Express hopes for a faithful observance of the Governor's proclamation, especially as to the last clause. In our property let us not forget that in the yellow fever stricken districts there are hundreds of thousands, suffering for the actual necessities of life, and will continue to suffer for months to come unless the people of the whole country elsewhere are liberal in their donations.

The last school census of this county was incomplete. It was apparent to any one that the report made by the Assessor did not show the number of children of the county within the school age, some claiming that not half were reported. The Assessor acknowledged, we understand, that he took the census by asking heads of families the number of their children of school age, and it is but fair to presume that this was many times overlooked, or forgotten, and the consequence has been that the county will be deprived this year of probably half its proportion of the State school fund. In fact, we understand that Hancock county will receive as much as Texas, and yet few would doubt that the latter contains three school children to where the former county contains one. A full investigation of this matter should be made, and if there is any way in which the evil can be remedied it should be done. In any event, the people should profit by the lesson taught, and see to it that future censuses do not neglect this important duty. The Express has been anxious to give for neglecting the school census that he was not allowed any pay for doing the work, but considering the business policy attached to that office, and the light expense, that census is a very poor man.

THE BARRER QUESTION.
For over a week the papers throughout the country have been commenting upon the result of the Maine election, and it is quite satisfactory to read the views expressed. The variety is almost unlimited. The only thing connected with the election on which there is any unanimity of sentiment, is that it was a Republican defeat. As to who won the victory, and by what means, there is a wide diversity of opinion. The victory is claimed according as it may suit the political case in the various localities. It proves a very popular nostrum with political quacks of all denominations, and is made to apply to nearly every symptom or disease. Some call it a Democratic victory, others a victory for the National party, while others still declare the defeat of the Republicans to be the result of a non-partisan movement.

After reading up on all sides of the question we believe we can present a very intelligent statement of the case. The result of the Maine election was due to three causes: the agitation of the national finance question, the tact of the Democrats, and lack of political stamina on the part of the Republicans. The first gave opportunity for the conduct of the second, and the second permitted the second to win. It was a Democratic victory, won by strategy against heavy odds. The Democrats manipulated the Greenback movement in their favor. There was but one Republican candidate seeking the support of the Greenbackers. The platform of the Maine Greenbackers was not a National platform, and even though they had carried on the campaign independently of the Democrats and secured the election, it could not have been called a National victory as contemplated by that party in many of the other States. The financial plank of their platform was in effect the same as that of the Democratic platform of Texas. In favor of the payment of the National debt according to original contract, it favored a sufficient supply of national currency to meet the demands of business, and the substitution of greenbacks for National Bank notes. There was nothing in the platform favoring the scheme of "absolute," or irredeemable money to be issued for every purpose. Therefore, as a National victory, the Maine victory was not a success. Had the Republicans possessed the tenacity to lay down a platform of financial principles with an unmistakable definition, they might have won a different result in the election. Had the Republicans not acted with doubt and uncertainty, had they not attempted to court the Greenbackers by a sort of more money, gold, silver and greenback policy, which amounts to nothing at all as a policy, and would have the people who have held their own following, or if their policy had been antagonistic to the views of those who deserted them, they might have secured enough votes from the Democrats to counteract the votes of those who left them, and with their established majority carried the election. The Democrats found the National willing to act with them on a compromise between a hard-money and soft-money platform, and they took advantage of the circumstance to ride into power.

THE HERALD'S ATTACK ON OUR BUSINESS MEN.
The Herald of yesterday morning contained a volubility by the then managers, and it is but justice that the Express should resent the injustice done our business community by the utterances contained therein. To do this it devotes upon us to make statements concerning the condition of that paper from which we have heretofore refrained. The Herald has heretofore given a variety of reasons for its misfortunes, but its last one is the least tenable, and makes a blot on its business men totally unwarranted and unwarranted by the facts. The Herald now charges that its failure is due to the fact that the business men of this community withdrew their patronage from it because it supported Judge Ireland. Now, the whole truth of the matter is, the Herald did not have the patronage to withdraw, and we do not believe there is a business man in the city who has withdrawn one dollar's worth of patronage from that paper because it supported Ireland. That would have been withheld under other circumstances. The Herald knows that the reason our business men did not patronize it more extensively was because of their want of confidence in it. This was one reason. The paper was unfortunately "run down," and they could not see where it would benefit them much. Another cause for the Herald's unpopularity, and which the recent management cannot successfully deny, consisted in the fact that, owing to the peculiarity of its business management for some years, bills for services performed were presented time and again for payment after the creditors had paid and got their receipts, and many claim to have paid the same bills, more than once. The fact that the liabilities of the Herald have several times been "washed" through the convenient medium of a trustee's sale, which left many creditors with the bag to hold, also created suspicion and damaged its business prospects. It is true, the editorial course of the Herald has not been calculated to overcome those prejudices, and bring its support regardless of the many disadvantages it labored under, but to charge our business men with that illiberality and narrow-sightedness that would cause them to withhold or withdraw patronage simply because of political doctrines, is unwarranted and unjust.

Q. W. H. Young, who has controlled the Herald for some time, and who held the deed of trust upon it under which it was sold, purchased it yesterday for \$300. Let him put sufficient capital into it to run a good paper; let him furnish the news and other reading matter enough to satisfy its readers; let him convince our merchants that it would be to their interest to advertise in it; let him, in fact, conduct the paper so as to regain the public confidence in it, and we can safely say no business man in this community will advertise in it. The Herald supports Judge Ireland or anybody else. The failure of the Herald was due to business, not political causes, and it would have been much to the credit of that paper had it subsided without that last stab at our people.

The Chicago Times gives the reasons why greenbacks will depreciate in value if they are substituted for bonds. First, because the value of money, or of any substitute for money, depends largely upon its volume. If greenbacks were issued to take the place of bonds, the paper circulation would be about two and a half times as large as it was when the greenback was worth only seventy cents on the dollar, and it would depreciate at least in proportion to the inflation. Second, the issue of that paper, as proposed, to "pay" the bonds, would utterly destroy the credit of the nation, and the greenbacks would soon be worth no more than at such paper stock.

HEALTH OFFICERS' CONVENTION.
A meeting of Health Officers of the State was held at Houston last week, and Dr. Sulzberger was appointed health officer of the State. A committee to adopt suitable regulations for the government of deputy health officers, reported as follows:
Whereas, we believe in the protection afforded by strict quarantine upon male transportation lines entering the State, and that the following regulations will, if adopted by general consent of all contiguous counties and towns along the lines, afford such protection;
First, that there shall be appointed at Orange, Marshall, Tarrant and Denton officers whose salaries shall be conjointly shared by the several counties and towns along the lines of such roads, and whose duties shall be to carry out regulations as adopted by the convention. And we believe that these regulations can be better executed by having one executive head at each point upon such lines. And that the quarantine regulations of the city of Houston, September 2nd, afford sufficient defense if strictly carried out, with regard to freights, passengers and mails.

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The following resolution was also adopted, and Drs. R. H. Harrison of Columbus, T. Heard of Galveston, H. H. L. Hill of Austin, J. A. Allen of Corsicana and F. E. Hughes of Dallas, were appointed in accordance therewith.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed by the chair to sit in conjunction with a like committee appointed by the State Medical Association at the last annual convention of that body, whose duty shall be to urge before the next Legislature the establishment of a "State Board of Health," and the enactment of proper quarantine laws.

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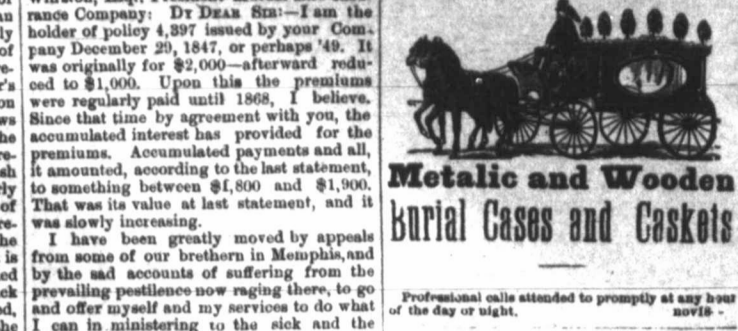
