## Underground Telegraph Wires.

It is well known that the City Councils of Philadelphia have ordered the removal of telegraph poles from the street of that city, and that experiments have been making to produce a wire that could be laid ander ground and worked satisfactorily. The McKeesport Times gives an account of some interesting experiments made during the present week, at the tube works, in manufacturing "insulated wire," the process having better

ent week, at the tube works, in manufacturing "insulated wire," the process having been patented. The company owning the patent was represented by Mr. Allberger, and the tests have been very satisfactory. The wire is now being made in sections of ten test, but it can be made as long as thirteen feet. In making the wire a copper telegraph wire is incorted in a glass tube of the same length, and sufficiently large to admit the wire casily.
