Results Of "School Day" Extension Poll Released

Recently, in cooperation with Senator Bill Sarpalus, the Journal made a survey of area residents with regard to their feelings on the proposed lengthening of the public school day. A spokesman in Sarpalus' office told the Journal that with the written responses,

the Senator hoped to be able to counter the proposal for the extended hours of school time.

On March 9, the results of the poll, which included responses from residents of 29 counties of the 31st Senatorial District, were released. The responses in favor of extending the school day was insignificantly small (less than five) according to the Senator's office. Over 99 percent of the respondents from the District recorded negative responses to the proposal of lengthening of the school day.

Of the counties polled, Bailey County had the most response, with 281 responses recorded and more still to come. Potter County had the

second largest response with 205. All other counties in the District had less than 50 responses, with the exception of Deaf Smith, which recorded 52.

However, it was determined by Senator Sarpalus that the proposal to increase the length of the school day in Texas was overwhelmingly rejected. Newspapers from throughout the 29 counties of the 31st District assisted in conducting the poll, with the Journal conducting its own poll and then forwarding all letters and responses to the Senator's Austin office. Additional replies to the proposal are still being compiled at this time.

"I have never had an issue before the legislature which generated the amount of response as did the request for input on the extension of the school day," Sarpalus said. Sarpalus said it was apparent from the tone of

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Only 70% Local Signup Farm Program

As of Tuesday afternoon, March 13, Danny Noble, Bailey County ASCS Executive Director told the Journal that approximately 70 percent of the 1100 farms in Bailey County had been signed into the 1984 Farm Program, with only three days to go until the signup deadline of 5 p.m. on March 16, Friday. Noble said however that a number of farms had been signed up within the past few days, and farmers were continuing the sign up at the time of the report.

Noble told the Journal that Reserve IV and Reserve V corn is back in release status at this time. Reserve IV became effective as of March 1 and Reserve V as of March 5. The release will continue at least through April 30, according to Noble. Area producers are being notified of these releases at this time.

In a March 12 meeting of the Muleshoe Youth Baseball, Inc. at the Summitt Savings and Loan Community Room, the group adopted a motion to incorporate the Girl's Softball League into the Muleshoe Youth Baseball program. Girls softball will become a league within the MYB, with the adoption of this motion, just as the Bronco League for boys and girls, ages 9-12, Mustang League for boys and girls ages 8-10 and T-Ball for boys and girls ages 5-7, according to Bill Liles, public relations officer for the organization.

Softball for girls within the 8-12 age group will be

played on the Mustang League field, formerly known as the minor league field, along with the Mustang League.

The bylaws of the Muleshoe Youth Baseball, Inc. were amended to provide directors' positions for the softball league on the Board

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Commissioners Appoint Manager

The Bailey County Commissioners Court met in a regular session in the Courthouse on Monday, March 12 beginning at 10 a.m. with several items on the agenda.

A representative of Bravo Pipeline Company met with the court giving them a copy of a tentative right-of-way easement in the County. No decision was made on this item.

The Court accepted a bid from Muleshoe Motor Company on a 1984 Ford LTD four door sedan at a price of \$9,884.78 on a new Sheriff car.

Appointments were made by the Court to the 1984 salary grievance committee. Those appointed, if they choose to serve, were: Mary Francis Perez, Dianne Wiedebush and Jerry Lynn Sower.

Commissioners also appointed Joyce Holmes as

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Trustees approved a seven period academic school year beginning in 1985. The teacher day will remain as it is presently scheduled (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.). The school day for elementary schools will not be significantly affected by this decision. The bus schedule in the afternoon will be adjusted to pick up elementary school students first allowing high school and junior high to remain in session until 3:45 p.m.

Secondary students are currently dismissed at 3:25 p.m.

Fuller pointed out that the additional time needed to have a 7 period day would be gained by decreasing periods that now exceed the 55 minutes. The advantages of the seven period day according to study, should be three-fold: first: students would be allowed to obtain 28 credits before they graduate, where 24 are now available; second: required academic classes should be smaller, with elective classes expected to grow in enrollment; and, finally, students should be better able to meet the requirements of the new state mandated cur-

riculum (H.B. 246).

This new curriculum requires students statewide to have 21 (22 for academic transcript) credits as a minimum for the State requirements. The seven day academic day should increase opportunities for all students according to Superintendent H. John Fuller.

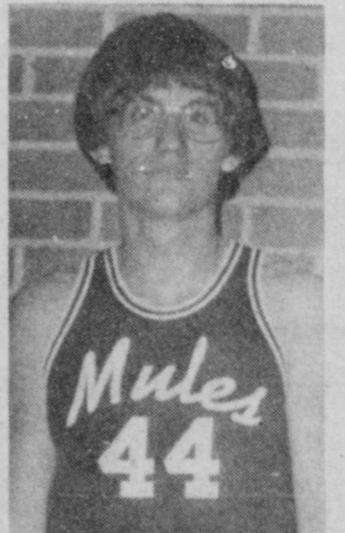
In other business, board members cast ballots for the Directors for the Region XVII Education Service Center Board, and also ratified the 1984 Textbook Committee Report.

Also, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to name Muleshoe Junior High School - the "Elizabeth M. Watson Junior High School."

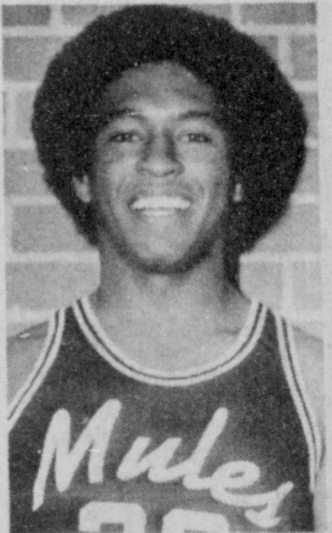

As a tribute to the long-married couple, friends and relatives came from Arizona, California, England, Ireland and India.

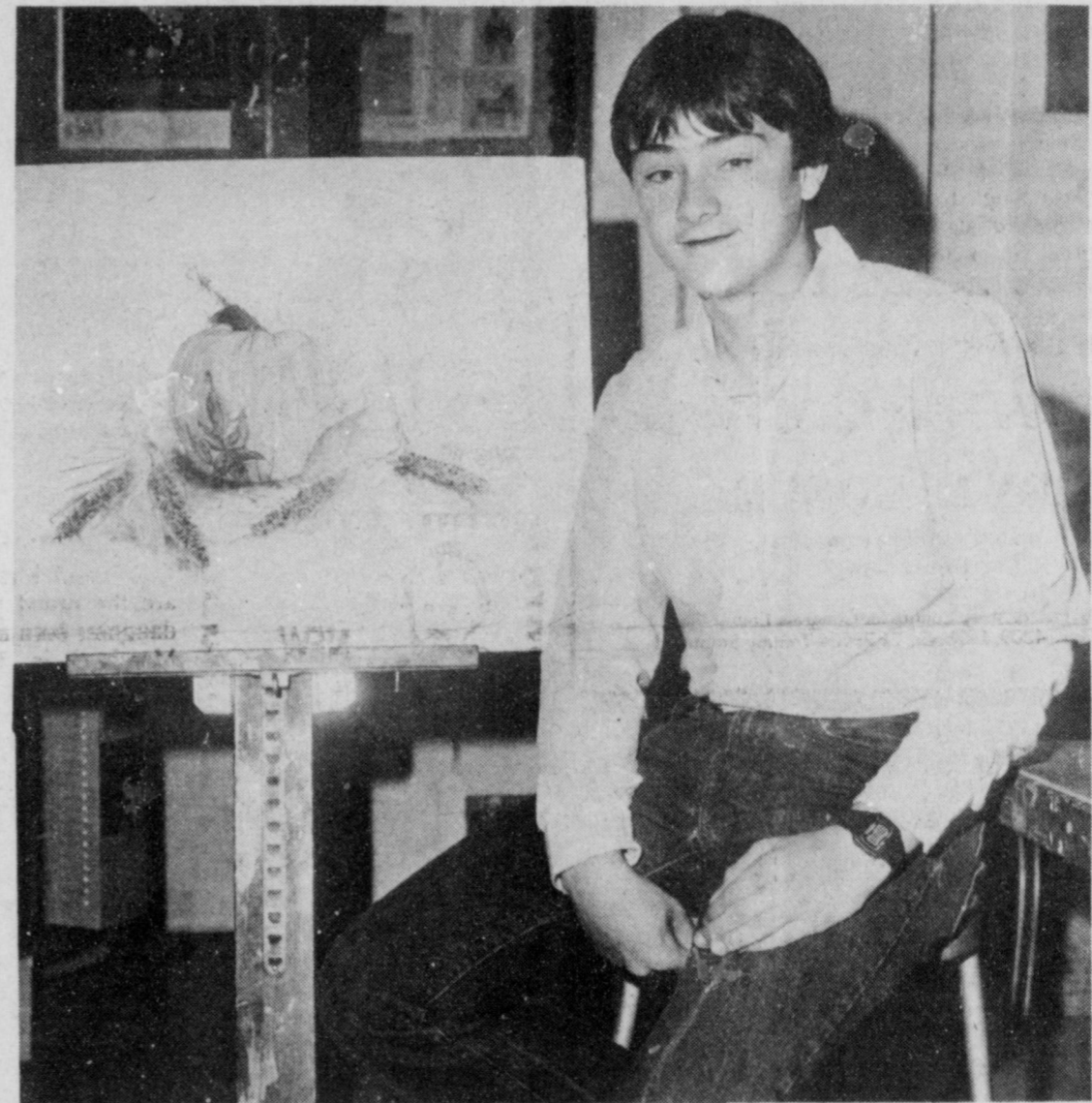

THE IRS AND BARTERING
Since bartering for goods and services is becoming increasingly popular, the Internal Revenue Service has prepared the following questions and answers to explain the income tax consequences of bartering.
QUESTION: Since bartering is not illegal, why is the IRS so concerned about it?
ANSWER: There's a definite tax consequence because the same rules apply to barter transactions as cash transactions.
QUESTION: If no money is exchanged, how can there be a tax consequence?
ANSWER: The fair market value of goods or services exchanged must be included in gross income just as if sold for cash.
QUESTION: Could you give an example of taxable bartering?
ANSWER: Suppose a doctor treats a grocer's daughter for an allergy. The treatment would cost \$50, but instead the grocer agrees to give \$50 in groceries to the doctor. The \$50 has to be treated as income by both the doctor and the grocer. In each case, both avoided having to pay out \$50 and each received \$50 worth of goods or services. However, the grocer may be able to deduct the grocer's bill if he itemizes deductions. The doctor on the other hand has no deduction since the groceries were for personal use.
QUESTION: I heard the IRS can't check on bartered income. Is that true?
ANSWER: No, not always. Where the trading is done through an association, the IRS can request the records of the association itself.
If you have unreported income in reference to barter transactions in years for which you have already filed your tax return, you may want to amend those tax returns to include the bartering income. Seek professional assistance when amending prior year returns since they can be more complicated than your original tax return filing.

the instructions he was receiving from constituents that they would rather see better quality education than quantity through an extended school day.

More than 150 students added comments, many saying that they have jobs after school to help with finances at home and felt that longer hours in school would interfere with necessary jobs and with chores around the house and farm.

Many students added that longer hours would cause an increase in drop-outs in their school.

Parents and teachers alike expressed the view that children can absorb knowledge only to a point and think that 2:30 or 3 P.M. is the limit for keeping attention, especially among younger children.

Many felt that the additional time at school would be close to making their children wards of the state and thereby cause deterioration in the family structure.

Many who expressed views stressed the importance of getting back to basics and felt that greater concentration in the first few grades would increase comprehension levels at higher grades.

A sizeable number of responses expressed concern at not allowing a child to enjoy childhood experiences. These people said that activities such as piano, dance classes, baseball, scouting, time for play with friends and family would be severely restricted by long hours at school. They feared that children would receive too narrow a view of life.

Sarpalius had earlier expressed fears for those rural students who already spent long hours being bused to and from school. He said the long trips would make it necessary to be away from home from before sunrise until after dark.

The Senator noted that since the time the poll was begun in the district, the subcommittee on Educating the Child had made the recommendation for a longer school day to the full Select Committee on Education.

The official recommendation is that for grades K-12 the six-hour school day be used for academic experiences (plus an appropriate lunch period), and a two-hour period following the academic block be used for Texas Education Agency approved enrichment activities.

The two-hour block would be optional on the part of the students except for those who needed or desired tutorial assistance.

Sarpalius said he felt that the subcommittee received a strong outcry from the

citizens of Texas when the initial proposal of a mandatory eight to nine hour school day was first set out, causing them to tone down the recommendation and making it less demanding.

Sarpalius said the recommendations would be acted on as the Select Committee concludes its work with a meeting in mid-March in Dallas.

"I was pleased to have the cooperation of the news media in assisting us in determining the will of the Panhandle on this issue," Sarpalius said.

He added, "I now feel that I have a strong sense of direction from the people of the district as this particular issue comes before the Legislature. It also afforded me the opportunity to get first hand input as to what the people think is important in education and to use their comments as a basis for formulating my response to these issues."

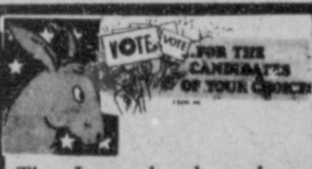

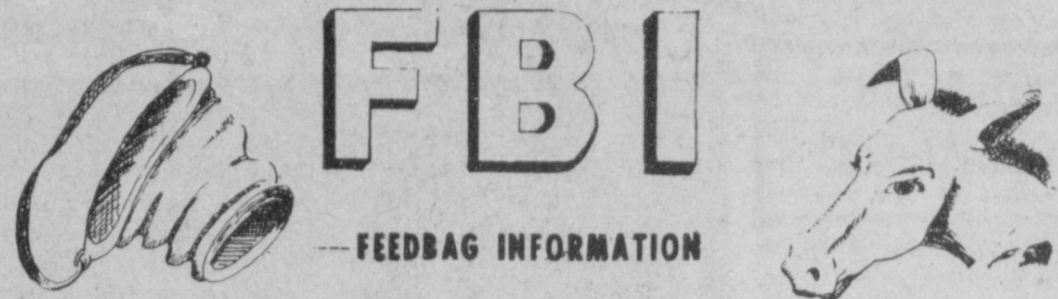
