Heavy Voting Expected Saturday On Sale of Alcoholic Beverages

polls Saturday to cast their ballots on the question of legalizing the sale of all alcoholic bever ages with in the confines of the city limits, and indications are that a large turnout can be expected

It will be the first time since the mid 1940s, when the entire county voted to ban the sale of that Baird residents have been faced with such a choice.

The petition which requested the election contained 161 names, 11 more than the 150 re-quired by law to allow the county commissioners court to set the date. The ballot will call for voting for or against the legalizing of the sale of all alcoconsumption in the City of Baird.

Polls will open at the American Legion hall at 8 o'clock Saturday and will remain open un-til 7 p.m. The outcome of the election should be known soon after the polls close.

The young people of Baird and Callahan County staged a parade in downtown Baird Saturday urging the defeat of the issue. Some 15 cars and floats were entered in the parade, some showing the evils of drinking, and all displaying placards urg-ing people to vote dry.

A "get out the vote" campaign is expected to develop, as those on both sides of the issue expressed a feeling that they have a better chance of winning with a large vote.
