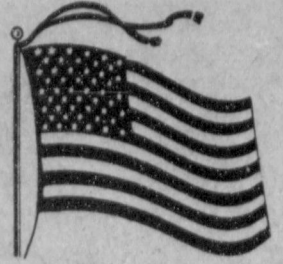

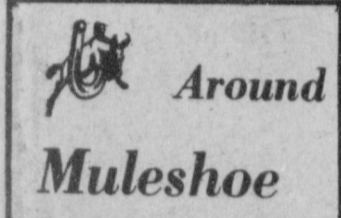

## Congressional, Local Candidates Draw Crowd



Michael Gerard Isaac, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Isaac of Muleshoe is among 443 students in the College of Natural Sciences at the University of Texas that have been named to the 1983 Fall Semester honor roll. To be eligible for this honor roll students must earn a required number of grade points, passing all courses undertaken. Isaac's designation was Cum Laude, which required 52 to 54 grad points. Total grade points are calculated by multiplying the number of semester hours undertaken by the value of each grade (A equals 4 points).

### Health Fair Planned Friday

A free blood sugar screening will be offered at the Muleshoe Civic Center on Friday, April 13th from 12:00 noon-6:00 p.m. in conjunction with the Health Fair. The screening is offered by the personnel of the Regional Diabetes Center of West Texas Hospital in Lubbock. Persons are asked not to eat two hours prior to checking their blood sugar level. Tests will be offered on persons age 18 years or older. If a person's test shows an elevated blood sugar, the person will be advised to check with his private physician.

During the Health Fair, a Glaucoma Screen will be provided free of charge from 1 to 6 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Muleshoe Lions Club, according to Dave Cavitt. The test only takes a few seconds of a person's time and is offered as a service to the community.

### City, School, Area Elections Canvassed

Results from area and local school board and city council elections which were held on Saturday, April 7th are now complete.

In the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees election, three places were open, with six candidates running, three of them being incumbents. Incumbents Ben Roming received 383 votes, Dewey Moore - 357 votes. A new board member was named with 340 votes, being Howard Watson. Sam Harlan who was running also received 336 votes, Gene McGuire (former incumbent) received 291 votes and Butch Vandiver received 225. Voting was very close among the first four candidates. Moore, Roming and Watson were sworn in Monday evening, April 9.

According to Election Judge Doyle King, a total of 597 votes were cast in the 1984 school board election. Jesse Leal served as alternate election judge.

### Civic Center Filled To Standing Room

Despite very high wind and blowing dust, candidates and interested citizens alike filled the meeting room of the Bailey County Civic Center Monday night for a candidate speaking forum.

Touted as a debate, the speakers did not debate, per se, as most were in complete agreement with the subject that seemed to be of major interest - the farm and agriculture situation. They were also mostly in agreement in the fields of the military, Central American intervention, and the growing costs of medical treatment.

Hosted by the Bailey County Extension Office, Clara Lou Jones introduced Bailey County Judge Gordon H. Green as moderator for the evening.

Judge Green explained that each candidate had five

minutes to speak to the group, explaining why they were seeking office and their qualifications.

Beginning with local candidates, they were introduced as Tom Watson, Bob Henderson, both seeking the office of Bailey County Sheriff, then Commissioner Candidates, R.L. Scott, R.O. Gregory and Marshall "Catfish" Williams, all seeking Precinct One; and James Warren and Joey Kindle, both seeking Precinct Two, also introduced was Linda Guelker, candidate for Bailey County Attorney, who is unopposed.

After drawing lots for speaking order, Watson became the first candidate to state his candidacy.

He explained that he felt the office of sheriff was a very important job, and felt that sheriffs should be elected to represent the people of the county not only in the county where he is elected, but be representative of the county throughout the state.

He gave a partial list of his qualifications: he was certified as a law enforcement officer in 1973, and did have a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice. He served as an officer in Lewisville before moving back to Bailey County.

Watson said he was in favor of staggering the hours for the two deputies in order to provide night patrols; establishing a working relationship between the Muleshoe City Police Department and the Sheriff's Office and establishing a dress code and code of conduct for the sheriff's office. By dress code he said he was not advocating uniforms, but white or beige shirt with tan or brown pants, and a hat (no levis or tennis shoes).

"Your problems are my problems" said the second speaker, current Precinct One County Commissioner, R.L. Scott. He gave a brief biographical sketch of his family, including his 30 years in Bailey County, and explained some of the problems trying to keep the county dirt roads in good condition with the long dry-spell this county has endured. "You can't do much to the roads without moisture," he explained.

Marshall "Catfish" Williams, who is a candidate for County Commissioner, told the group he had worked for a county in road maintenance for about five years. He said he believed his experience in repairing road machinery would be good, as he said he could save the county money, by being able to repair much of the machinery himself. He also said he believed in trying to keep taxes "down" and pulling back to keep from spending too much money.

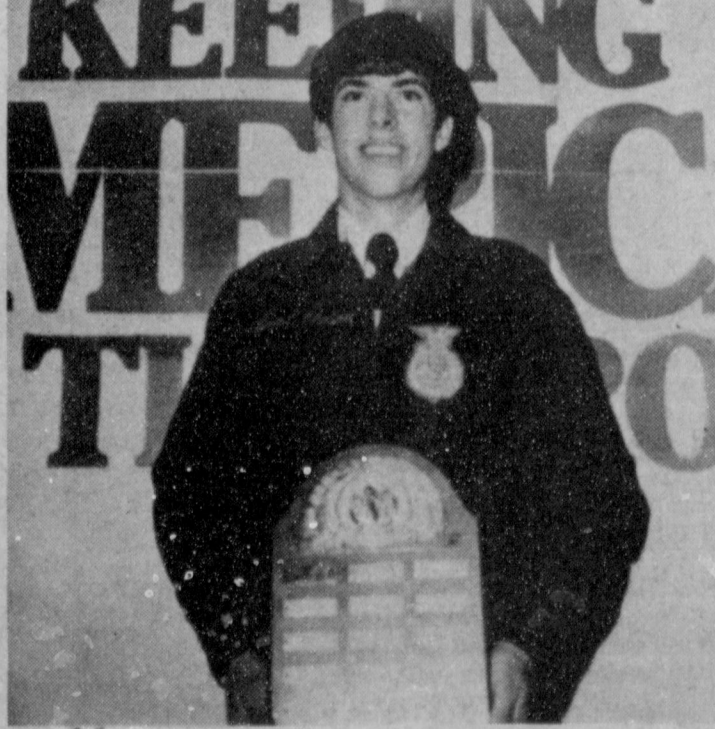

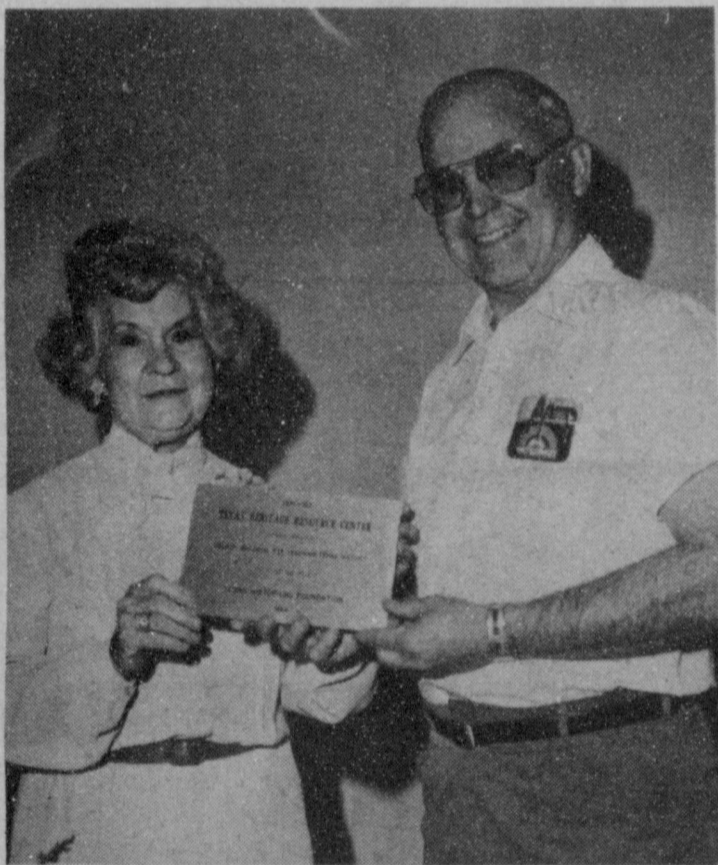

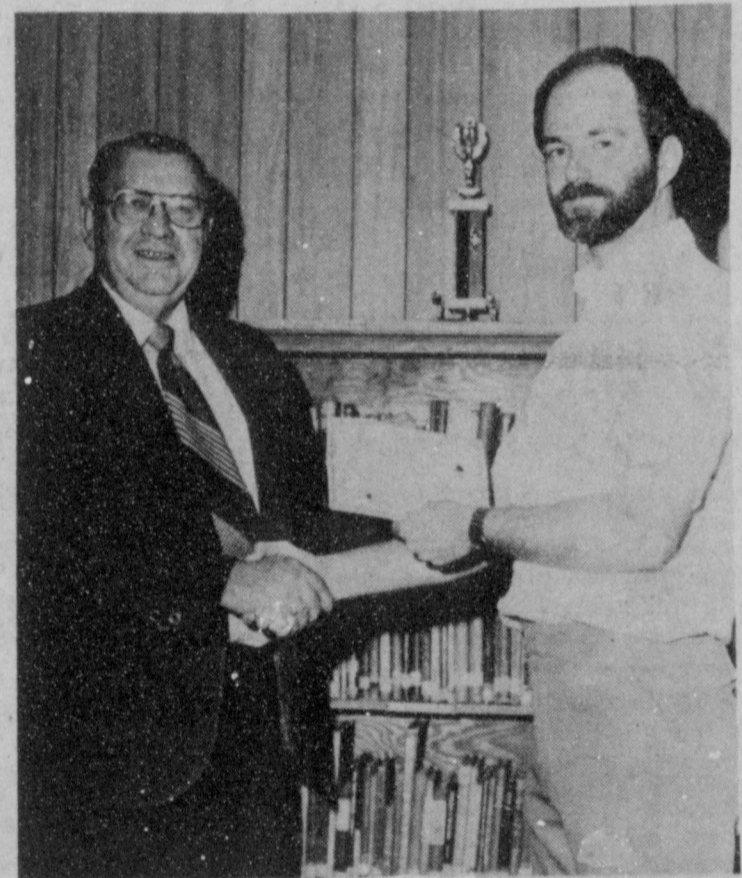

**IRS RULING-BAD NEWS**

April 16th is the filing deadline not only for your 1983 income tax return, but also for your 1984 first quarterly estimated tax payment. Don't neglect this payment even if you're filing for an extension on your 1983 return and have an overpayment which you intend to apply to your 1984 estimates. A recent IRS ruling could make you liable for underestimation penalties.

Prior to this new ruling, taxpayers who filed extensions have been allowed to credit any current year overpayment of tax to the subsequent year's estimated taxes and be considered as having made a timely estimated tax payment. However, overpayments will now be considered as estimated tax payments only at the time the income tax return is filed. Therefore, unless one of the exceptions to the penalty is met, the taxpayer could be subject to underestimation penalties.

To illustrate, suppose you file your 1983 tax return on August 15th, 1984 (the extended due date), and your return shows a \$2,000 overpayment which you elect to credit to your 1984 estimated taxes. In the past, the \$2,000 would have been considered a timely payment of the first quarter's estimated taxes due April 16th, 1984. Now, however, the \$2,000 will be treated as being paid on August 15th when the return is filed even though the IRS has had your \$2,000 all along. Therefore, you will be considered late not only on your April 15th estimated tax payment, but also on your second payment which is due June 15th.

Both corporations and individuals are subject to the new ruling and both should review estimated tax requirements independent of anticipated overpayments from the prior year.



"One of the objectives of the Center is to help identify persons with diabetes who are medically undiagnosed. This blood sugar screening will provide that opportunity for persons in Muleshoe."

Handouts including facts, warning signs and points of control about diabetes will be provided. Information will also be available about the services of the Regional Diabetes Center at West Texas Hospital.

"The Regional Diabetes Center provides education and training to help a person with diabetes learn to manage their condition. Any physician may refer a client to the Center," reports Snider. "Classes are given in diet, exercise, weight control, insulin administration, skin care, and the physiology of diabetes." West Texas Hospital, serving Lubbock and the area since 1920, is located at 1401 Ninth Street, Lubbock, Texas.

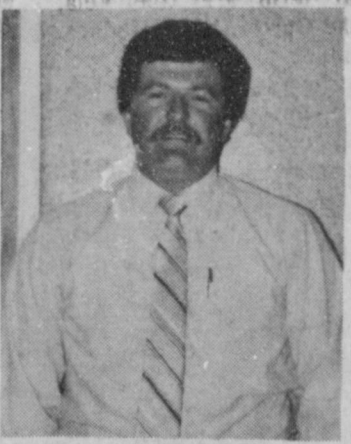
## Members Named To National Honor Society

## G/T Class Wins State Championship Second Time

The Muleshoe High School Gifted/Talented class was notified last Wednesday that they had won the Texas Present Problem Solving competition for the second year in a row. This year's MHS present problem solving entry was titled "A Drug Solution - Stop It Before It Starts".

For their project, the class researched various drugs and invited Sgt. Wayne Holmes of the Muleshoe Police Department to come and talk with them about the drug abuse problem in Muleshoe. He talked about many of the drugs the class had researched and confirmed that alcohol and marijuana abuse were the most prevalent drug problems here in Muleshoe. The group then conducted a survey of the 8th-12th grades to determine the extent of alcohol and marijuana use among students in these grades. From their survey they determined that the students became more involved with drugs as they progressed through school, so the class decided to prepare a program based on their research that would help elementary students recognize the dangers of

alcohol, marijuana, and peer pressure.

The G/T class wrote and produced a puppet show and put it on for Mrs. Skipworth's 5th grade class at DeShazo. The Muleshoe Church of Christ allowed the class to use their puppets and the First Assembly of God loaned the group their puppet show stage and puppets for the production. To accompany the written report of their project, the class decided to make a videotape of their presentation to the 5th grade class, so Channel 6 graciously con-

ferred to let the group use their equipment and Dale Hughes, a 1983 graduate of MHS who videotaped the G/T state winning project last year, did the actual videotaping.

Sgt. Holmes loaned the class two drug displays to use that showed the elementary students a variety of drugs other than marijuana and alcohol which were the primary focus of the puppet show. The students asked questions about the displays, then the G/T class concluded their presentation to the elementary students

with a quiz/survey over the program. They included the results of that survey with their project report also.

The class, consisting of Brent Black, Randall Stevens, Betsy Lunsford, John Isaac, Tracy Tunnell, Wade King, Jimmie Lee, Kristi Campbell, and Kristi Spies, along with their teacher, Mrs. Pat Black, will travel to Austin on May 4, 5 and 6 to present their state winning project at the Texas Future Problem Solving Bowl. This is the second year in a row that the class has won state in Present Problem Solving. They won in 1983 with their project on the completion of the miniature golf course in Muleshoe.

In judging the team's project for the state this year, the four evaluators who were educators and businessmen from communities in Central Texas, gave Muleshoe's entry 117 points out of a possible 120 points. One judge wrote in the following comment on his critique sheet: "I'm sure that the young students really appreciated your concern for them. You may have made an impression on them that no adult (parent, teacher, police) could have. I applaud your caring and beneficial project."

The Gifted/Talented class would like to thank Dale Hughes, Sgt. Wayne Holmes, The Muleshoe Church of Christ, The First Assembly of God, Channel 6, Mrs. Skipworth and her fifth grade class, and the administration and faculty of MHS who allowed them to take class time to work on their Present Problem Solving project. 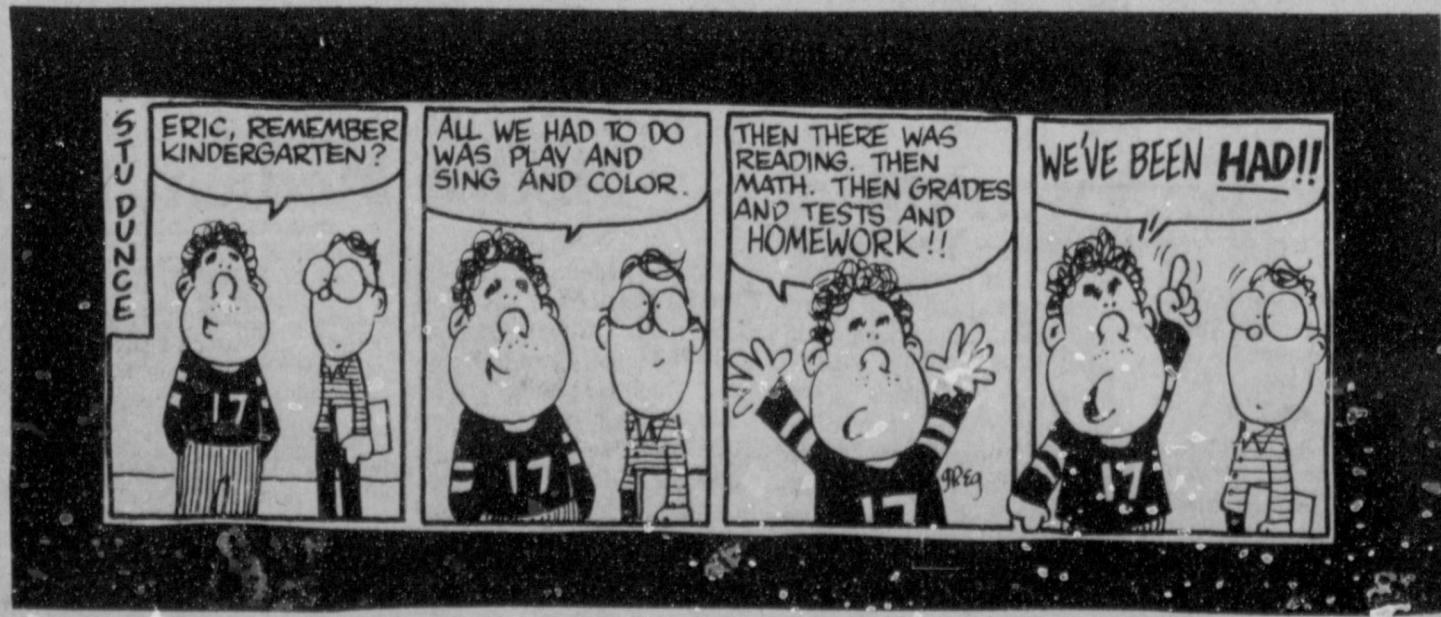

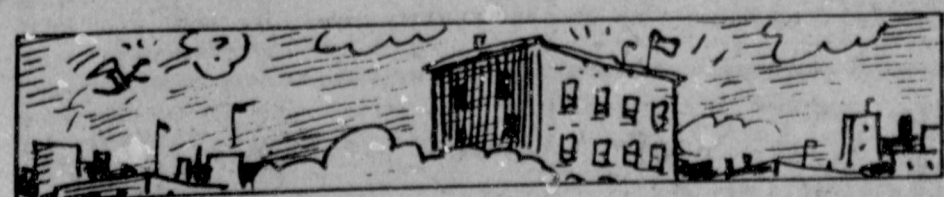

Funeral services for Rev. Herman "Don" Boles, 74, of Lubbock were held at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Lubbock with the Rev. Davis Price, pastor, officiating. Assisted by the Rev. Jerry Boles, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Dumas, and the Rev. Paul Young, pastor of the Palo Duro Presbytery.

Graveside services were held at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at Resthaven Memorial Park under the direction of Resthaven Funeral Home. Boles died at 7:40 p.m. Sunday at St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock following a lengthy illness.

Boles was born Jan. 11, 1910, in Wellington and married Lois Jewell Pond on April 9, 1944, in Anton. They moved to Lubbock in 1978. He was retired from Christ United Presbyterian Church in Wichita Falls where he served as minister for 13 years. He also served as a missionary in Sitka, Alaska, and had pastored churches in El Paso, Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Joshua and Louisville, Ky. Before entering the ministry he was a radio personality from 1937, until 1952.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Travis Harmon of Signal Mountain, Tenn., Charles Wesley of Big Lake, James Gail of Post, and Nathanael Johnathan of Idalou; one daughter, Zela Dianne Airhart of Roswell, N.M.; one brother, J. Hoyt of Amarillo; one sister Mrs. J.B. Graham of Amarillo; and 18 grandchildren.

SPS is developing special public service announcements that will offer tips on using electrical energy wisely, and on avoiding waste of energy.

"We're also offering various programs on energy - cost control. The presentations will be available to civic groups, schools, senior

citizens, church groups, etc. For instance, the SPS speakers' bureau has prepared a new program on conservation. Its theme, "Wrapping Up Your Home," emphasizes proven methods of saving energy."

SPS home economists and marketing representatives also will present informational programs on preventing waste of energy, Gibson said.

Customers who see the SPS presentations will be given "energy - cost - control packets" containing "draft stoppers" that fit behind electric outlet covers and prevent air infiltration. The conservation "starter kits" also will contain shower-water "flow restricters," Gibson said.

Southwestern Public Service also will offer "walk - through audits" of homes the company serves. The "walk - through audits," by either SPS personnel or volunteers from local community groups, will help residential customers identify energy - loss trouble spots in their homes.

The company already offers customers extensive home energy audits, called Residential Conservation Service (RCS) audits. RCS audits in Texas cost \$15; the

"walk-through audits" will be free of charge.

SPS recommends RCS audits to anyone planning extensive home remodeling.

The "walk-through" energy auditor will point out ways the customer can control energy losses -- and thereby, control the cost of heating or cooling a home, Gibson said.

Civic groups, senior citizens groups such as RSVP, and church groups are being contacted for potential volunteers for the program, he said. SPS will train the "walk-through audit" volunteers.

The company also will participate in a statewide "telephone energy-talk" program. Customers interested in energy-cost savings can dial a toll-free number, request information on a particular "energy-savings" topic, then listen to a pre-recorded message.

Brochures on energy savings will continue to be available in local SPS busi-

ness offices, Gibson said. "We have a lot of excellent brochures already available in our local offices. SPS has been encouraging wise use of energy for a long time."

The company is offering the "residential energy - cost - control program" information not only to SPS customers, but also to area customers of other energy suppliers, for instance, to customers of rural electric cooperatives, Gibson said. "We hope to help inform everyone in our service area about energy savings."

SPS primarily provides electrical service to a population of more than one million in a 70,000 - square - mile area in the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

bent Commissioner in his first term said that three years ago his precinct (3) had no machinery and no money, but through "careful management" he now has both proper machinery and money in his precinct. He also said that being a commissioner covers a much broader scope and just taking care of roads. He advocates city and county growth and said he would like to continue to serve to help the city and county grow.

Incumbent Bailey County Sheriff Bob Henderson gave a brief background, including his lifetime spent in Bailey County. He explained that he had attended law enforcement school in San Antonio and was a graduate of the San Antonio Police Academy. Henderson said he spent three and one half years with the San Antonio PD before returning to Muleshoe to raise his sons. His wife, Ruby, is also a native of Bailey County.

He spent six years as a Bailey County Deputy Sheriff before going to the Texas Livestock Board for eight and a half years as livestock inspector. This was followed by returning to the local sheriff's office in 1979. He explained that during his administration, the jail was certified by the state in 1981, and he has cut food bills for the prisoners.

Linda Guelker Elder, current County Attorney, who is unopposed, spoke of her successful write-in candidacy three and a half years ago and her recent marriage. Although she had filed as Linda Guelker, she married James Elder two months ago, after she had already filed her candidacy.

A 29-year old farmer from southwest Bailey County, Joey Kindle, is also seeking the Precinct Three Commissioner's post. He said he is interested mostly in saving tax dollars and having good roads for rural residents, who "have to depend on good roads to be able to get their crops to market. It's your money, the taxpayers deserve the maximum for their tax dollars," he commented.

Local candidates ended up with R.O. Gregory, longtime area farmer and local businessman, who is seeking the Commissioner's office Precinct One.

He said he has lived in Bailey County for the past 38 years and is well aware of the duties and responsibilities of a county commissioner. He said that if he is elected, he will face the issues with an open mind and will work for the benefit of Bailey County with a conservative spending policy in the forefront of his actions.

A question asked by Juvenile Probation Officer Keith Madole at the conclusion was "If you had to make a choice between spending \$10,000 for the juvenile probation office and \$100,000 for a new piece of road machinery, which would you choose?"

All those seeking the office, and the two incumbents were unanimous, that

they would use their support for the Juvenile Probation office.

Six of the nine candidates for the 19th Congressional District Representative were at the forum.

First speaker was Delwin Jones. He is a former state representative and spoke of the necessity to control deficit spending in the federal government. Deficit spending leads to inflation which in turn leads to higher interest rates, he added.

Dr. John Selby complimented the people of Muleshoe for attracting such a good crowd of people who prove they are interested and involved in community affairs for coming out during such a bad sandstorm.

"You show that you are willing to work, and that is important," he said, "but what is more important are leadership qualities."

He said, "The only promise I will make is that I will listen to you - I will listen, then I will consult the experts, and will crusade to

keep the Free Enterprise System strong in America." Gary Condra said he was at the meeting to apply for a job - and gave his qualifications as an ag economist, a farmer and former feedlot employee. He said he has spent the last ten years in Bailey County and 41 other counties studying the agriculture problems, and is fully familiar with them.

His biggest concern, he added, "I am very much concerned about the future of West Texas farmers, and concerned about the future of Muleshoe."

Condra said what is needed is profit and stability - not problems and sympathy.

A Lubbock attorney, Thomas M. Richards, spoke first of the \$200 billion federal deficit and pointed out

that it was so very critical for this area to have a very strong farm bill to survive the agriculture crisis. He is also a strong advocate of preserving the family farm, and Richards was very emphatic that he disagreed with any attempt for a food and fiber embargo.

Richards gave his background in farming and ranching, and said he would be willing to put his time and energy into serving as Congressman.

Candidate Don Richards spoke first of his background in Muleshoe, where his father was editor of The Muleshoe Journal when he was a very young man. He said he was asking for the same office he was in before, and would be just changing desks. He served

for several years in Washington in the office of Kent Hance, the Congressman he is seeking to replace.

Richards said he had been directly involved in budget cuts, and emphasized his involvement in what he termed a very complicated farm program. He spoke of his very intense background in all phases of government work, and said he knew where to go and who to see for assistance.

He was followed by Republican Larry Combest, who said he shared the conservative views of the majority of the people across this entire district. Combest also said he had been involved directly with government in Washington, as he spent seven years in Wash-

ington as an aide to John Tower, who is not seeking re-election this year.

Combest said he spent the first 26 years of his life on a farm, and was a farmer, himself, before becoming an aide to Tower. He said he

also had the proper Washington ties to help represent the people of this area.

A question and answer session followed the candidates brief statements, and several people asked questions of the candidates.

Shade trees seldom need extra fertilization when a good lawn maintenance program is followed. But when shade trees do need fertilizer, proper application is important.  
Over-fertilization of trees can force excessive top growth, making them vulnerable to storm damage, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.  
Trees rarely need fertilization more than once every three years except in extremely sandy soils and under special conditions.  
The hard December freeze injured some trees, and those should receive additional nitrogen fertilizer to speed up the healing of damaged tissue. Also, trees occasionally may need extra nutrients when their roots are confined by street and curb installations and other structures.  
Fertilizer recommendations are generally based on trunk diameter and make no allowance for the fact that the root zone may be confined to a small area, Tanksley says. Thus, fertilizing according to such instructions may result in over-fertilization and tree damage.  
The safest method of computing the amount of fertilizer to apply at any one time is to base it on the number of square feet included in the branch spread of the tree. Tanksley recommends two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of branch area per application.  
When fertilizing, make several applications—one in the fall! at the usual first killing frost, another just before new growth starts in the spring, and a third applied as ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate in midsummer.  
Spread fertilizer evenly beneath the branch spread of the tree and water thoroughly. Without moisture, roots cannot use the nutrients, points out Tanksley.  
If the tree's root zone is confined by buildings, curbs, walks or other obstructions, base the fertilizer application on the actual root zone. Under these circumstances it may be necessary to fertilize every year to provide an adequate supply of nutrients.
