

SHEEP PARASITES

The more we investigate the parasities which prey on domestic animals, the more are we assured of the endless perils attending the free interchange of animals between different countries and districts without a sufficient attention to the question of health. It has now been known for many years that European sheep suffer severely from two species of lung-worm—the one an inch and a half in length, the other full three inches. In many of our American flocks the smaller of these prevails to a most fatal extent, and districts admirably adapted to sheep raising are being turned to other uses because the fleckmaster finds that he cannot keep this kind of stock at a profit.

We must now record the discovery of a new enemy of our flocks, in the shape of a third ling-storm, smaller than either of the other two, but very destructive to the lungs of the victim. The military abattoir at Vicenness having been largely supplied by

The military abattoir at Viconness having been largely supplied by African oxen and sheep, Megnier's attention was drawn to the presence of small, hard nodules in the lungs of the latter; and on examination these were found to contain myrinds of ora and of minutes embryo worms, and the encysted bodies of the adult female worm full to repletion with eggs. The adult male was formed in the air passages of the lungs. The new species has the general character of the family of Strongyli, to which the two other species belong, but differs in several important anatomical features, and also in its size, the length rarely tures, and also in its size, the length rarely exceeding half an inch. So far as it has been studied it shows the same habits as the

been studied it shows the same habits as the other lung-worms and the Strongyli in general, the eggs being laid and the young worms hatched out in the system of the sheep, while they most quickly learn to pass their early life in water and moist carth, so that they become rapidly disceminated through a whole fleek that occupy the same pasturage of though a very life likely from the same stream. The presence of the encysted parents worn in the lungs, as also of the eggs and embryos, gives rise to circumscibed spots of inflamation and nodules varying in size from a pea to a walnut, which, by their aggregation, cause extensive and dangerous cause extensive and dangerous aggregation, cause extensive and dangerous pheumonia, and large open cavities (eomice). This parasite has as yet only been found in the fat-tailed sheep of African origin, but there seem to be present danger of its importation into European pastures; and, like other stock plagues and parasites, it may end by invading the New World also. To maintain success in stock raising we must be forewarned of dangers from whatever side they arise, that we may not run into them blindly by importations from infested locali-
