London, February 3.—The British Medical Journal publishes the following:

The Medico-Cherurgical Centrablatt of January the 24th, states that the origin of the pestilence in Russia is as follows:

A Cosack returning from the war at Wettanka, brought his lady-love a shawl, which was probably a part of his spoils. The girl wore it two days, and sickened with all the symptoms of the plague, and died during the following four days. The other members of her family sickened and died. The disease spread rapidly, but the local authorities did not pay any attention to it until about half the imabitants of the village had died, and those remaining alive were unable to bury the victims. The epidemic had assumed serious dimensions by the 25th of November, but the government was only informed of it officially on the 11th of December. Ten days further time clapsed before any systematic or energetic means were taken for preventing its spreading further. The authorities have since exerted themselves to make up lost time. As the only way of arresting the disease is to prevent all communication between the districts where it reigns and others which are healthy, a double cordon is being formed, firstly in the towns and yillages, shutting off the streets where the plague reigns from the rest of the place, and secondly, by surrounding places with troops so that nobody is allowed to pass in or out. Quarantines are also being instituted on the borders of the infected governments, and are strictly watched. The population is said to take an active part in preventing the crossing of the sanitary line, which begins at Sanwanowski and runs upwards on the borders of volga and Bolaguaka. Four quarantines have been founded in Sarepta, Iwanowski, Iwantradi and Zaratzia. A great drawback is the want of medicines.


