VIRGINIA'S DEBT.

Richmond, Va., February 8.—The joint committee of the general amembly will meet blonday to receive from the representatives of the bondholders an amended proposition for the settlement of the public debt. Although it cannot be officially stated, it was generally understood that the new proposition will extend the three per cont. period from five to ten years, thus leaving the four per cent. period at 20 years instead of 25, and the five per cent. period at ten years. THE WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

New York, Peb. 5.—The weekly statement of the associated banks is as follows. Loans increase \$4,650,800; specia decrease \$784,000; legal tender decrease \$2,913,400; deposits increase \$18,100; devotation decrease \$50,500; reserve decrease \$0,839,425. The banks hold \$15,137,875 in expect of legal reconstructions.

MISCELLANEOUS PARAGRAPHS.

New York, February 8.—At the Potter committee meeting this morning Gov. Tilden entered, accompanied by his brother, Henry A. Tilden; of Lebanon, John Bigelow and Henry F. Dimmock.
