Dog Trainer Wins First

In Contest

Willis, a one year old registered Border Collie, bred and raised by Cecil Mardis Kennels of Hereford, placed first at the Crawford "Texas" state ide stock dog trials recently.

Willis, trained by Eddy Mardis of Muleshoe, was entered in the Ranch Class, where trainer and dog stand at a designated point and the dog is sent on command to gather sheep approximately 150 yards from trainer to be placed in an 8x8 pen at the original starting point.

According to Mardis, a dog is judged on his ability to go out and gather stock without exciting them and bring them back to the trainer to be penned. He is judged on poise, obedience, and inherent ability to herd stock and keep them under control. Points are deducted if stock are flushed or are excited by the dog, if they are not brought back to the handler in a controlled walk or trot and in as straight a line as possible to point where stock are to be penned.

Mardis added that to be able to compete, a dog must know approximately five herding commands.

"Competition is open to all breeds of stock dogs, but

Proposed Changes Affect School Activities

Much controversy is surrounding the proposed New 19 TAC 97.113, a bill relating to "Student Absences for Co-curricular or Other Activities."

According to the new bill, which has now had its second reading: "School districts shall not schedule, nor permit students to participate in, any school related activities on or off campus that would require, permit, or allow a student to be absent from class in any course more than "TEN" times during the 175-day school year.

"A student may participate in co-curricular or other activities on or off campus that require absence from one or more classes only if; that student must have obtained and maintains a 70 grade point average in at least four of the academic courses in which the student is enrolled for the prior and

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current semester, and that student does not miss any class in which the student does not have and maintain at least a 70 point grade average.

"A school district may apply to the Commissioner of Education for specific exceptions on individual students based on hardship or unforeseen circumstances. The Commissioner may grant or deny that request at his discretion, and the commissioner's decision shall be final.

"School districts shall develop a policy which implements this rule including a provision regulating the number of times a student can be absent during any one semester course (one through ten)."

The controversial new rulings are expected to have far-reaching effects on many aspects of the students' life, including many of the activities including band, FFA, FHA, speech and drama, athletics, and all other activities not conducted right in a classroom.

Below is a letter sent by one concerned parent to the State Board of Education. Mrs. Huckaby suggests that other parents send messages, especially telegrams, to the State Board of Education prior to this Saturday, when the third and final reading of the above proposal is made and thus becomes law for the students to follow in years to come.

Dear Sir:

I am writing in regards to the proposed new 19 of the Texas Education Code 97-113, regarding student absences.

I am aware that in this proposal students will be restricted to missing up to but not more than 10 days of school per year on extra curricular activities.

I would like for you to closely consider this matter and how it affects our students and children. I feel they learn a great deal from their extra curricular activities and our children need to be prepared to enter society when they complete their years in school. I feel that these extra curricular activities prepare them for this,

Scott And Gregory Will Be In Runoff

Last Saturday, a total of 1595 Bailey County voters, of the 3,666 registered to vote went to the polls in the Bailey County Primary elections. This represents 43 percent of eligible voters who trekked to the polls on Saturday.

The election resulted in one local runoff. No clear-cut winner came out of the race for Commissioner, Precinct One, and the names of incumbent R.L. Scott and R.O. Gregory will be on the Democratic special runoff ballot on June 2.

Scott received 210 of the 474 votes cast for 44 percent of the vote of Gregory's 137 votes and 28 percent. Candidate Marshall 'Catfish' Williams received 92 votes for 19 percent and G.L. 'Hoss' Gibson had 35 votes for seven percent.

James Warren, incumbent Commissioner for Precinct Three, lost out to Joey Kindle of the Three Way community. Kindle received 325 of the 495 votes cast for 65 percent. Warren had 170 votes for 34 percent.

In the only other contested local race, incumbent Bailey County Sheriff Bob Henderson held onto his job when he defeated challenger Tom Watson 860-673. The votes show that Henderson received 56 percent of the vote with Watson taking the other 44 percent.

For United States Representative, District 19, Bailey County strongly supported the candidacy of Don R. Richards, who will be in a June 2 runoff with Thomas M. Richards. Don Richards received 855 votes to 317 for Thomas M. Richards. This gave Don Richards a 56 percent advantage locally over the 21 percent of the vote received by Thomas M. Richards.

Bailey County Republicans also gave 34 of the 36 votes to President Ronald Reagan, with one uncommitted.

In other contested races statewide on the Bailey County Democratic primary ballot, John Hill received a landslide vote of 1067 to take the county nod for Chief Justice, Supreme Court. His opponent Sears McGee, received 182 votes here. Hill will face John L.

tennis players from Watson Junior High participated in the district tournament at Abernathy on Monday.





Creative Woman

Topics to be presented on "The Creative Woman" show on May 15 and 19 include machine piecing and some buying tips for blouses and shirts. Mary Lu Stark,

owner of "The Quilt Works" in Albuquerque will be a guest on the show and will demonstrate machine piecing. Viewers will see a triple rail strip-pieced quilt as well as the double-rail quilt and several other popular quilt patterns. Ms. Stark has an interesting technique for stitching units of fabric together to eliminate having to stitch the individual one-inch squares together to form the pattern.

On May 17 and 20, viewers will learn about sewing machine care and maintenance and using oven cooking bags. Ann Silva and Kaye McCown, associated with Ann Silva's Bernina Sewing Center in Albuquerque will discuss lots of money saving techniques home sewers can do to eliminate the need for calling a sewing machine repairman. They will also discuss proper needle sizes, what to look for in buying a sewing machine (both new and used) and ways to make a sewing machine last a lifetime. On the other side is Treasury Secretary Donald Regan and the optimists. They complain about undue stress of everything negative and light dismissal of much that's positive.

The Republicans this year have history on their side. Most election years have been good business years and usually there's a good stock market in the last half of election years.

Interestingly, most brokers on Wall Street say there'll be a nice rally if President Reagan is re-elected. And most brokers believe the stock market is still a bull market.
