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THE BATTLE OF SAN JACINTO.

The Story of the Struggle which broke the Power of Mexico.
To-morrow is the anniversary of the battle of San Jacinto—the occasion when General Sam Houston, commander-in-chief of the Texas army, defeated the Mexican forces, Santa Anna, and completely annihilated them. The San Jacinto is a river running through a portion of the eastern section of our state, and had a few hours' drive from the city of Houston. The memorable battle that was fought upon its banks, renders its name dear to every Texan. After Santa Anna had slaughtered and learned to what the handful of brave Texans who defeated the Alamo, he took an ostentatious march, maintaining a position near where he might not only be defeated but also the honor and patriotism of the people. General Houston determined to check his march, and did so by his tactics. He was the only one who was not South, from impetuosity of having killed Santa Anna, a most noble and courageous Texan hero, on the 19th of April.
