CHINESE CHEAP LABOR

How a Certain Factory in China Won't Pay Large Dividends on Retention Wages

What is known in Chinese politics as the Young China party, that is, those who believe that the manifold evils of the country are to be remedied by the retention of the arts, sciences and manufactures, have obtained imperial permission to start a factory at the city of Shanghai.

It would have been supposed that in a country so averse to foreign competition in the home industry of this kind would be especially favored in the matter of taxes, but the Chinese government has shown otherwise.
