THE COMPRONENT ARTH MICE.

Washington, May 3.—The house democratic causens committee this morning is understood to have agreed upon a measure to be submitted to the canous, if concurred in by the senate committee, which underlie it. The bill to prevent military interference at the polis consists of the sixth section of the vetoad army appropriation bill, with the words "civil officers" stricken out and a provise added that nothing in the bill shall be construed as preventing the use of the army to enforce the process of the United States occurs, or put down resistance against the United States by armed men.

The democratic members of the house to-day held another caucus, and after an hour's deliberation definitely determined their line of action in regard to the army appropriation bill and agreed upon the exact terms of the measure, to be separately passed in lieu of the sixth section of the bill, it being agreed that all consideration of the remainder of the bill shall be deterred until this independent political measure shall have been acted upon by the president. It will provide in substance that sections 2002 and 2003 of the revised statutes shall not be construed as authorizing the presence of United States soldiers at the polis except under the orders of the United States, or in pursuance of constitutional requirements


