NATIONAL CAPITAL NEWS.

Washington, May 15.—In the senate Mr. Cockrell introduced a joint resolution authorising and requesting the president to open correspondence with the republic of France with a view and for the purpose of negotiating a proper treaty of reciprocity and commerce with that government, on terms alike honorable and just, three commissioners to be appointed on behalf of the United States preliminary to making such treaty. Referred to the committee on foreign relations.

Mr. Beck explained the provisions of the bill as amended, stating that the increase by the senate was \$94,500, making the entire sum of \$18,541,000. Among the amendments were \$18,000 for mists, \$27,000 for the interior department. Additional to the appropriations in the bill for these purposes he suggested that, reforms should be made by a reduction of the number of storekeepers and gaugers under the commissioner of internal revenue.
