ANOTHER VETO.

The feature of the judicial appropriation bill upon which the president has his objection is that prohibiting the use of any part of the money appropriated for the payment of U. S. deputy marshals employed at stations, and the forbidding any officer of the government to make any contract or have any liability for their payment. Mr. Hayes says:

The principle of this bill is that the power vested in congress to originate appropriations involves the right to compel the executive to approve any legislation which congress may see fit to attach to such bills under penalty of withholding the means needed to carry on the essential functions of the government. This is no great a problem that it is rather wonderful that it has been formally enunciated in an executive message which it is fair to presume was read and approved by a cabinet containing several members who are distinguished as lawyers if not as statesmen, and who must have felt the proposition absurdity of the sort of reasoning involved in the assertion. The actual "principle of the bill" is that, the constitution having invested the house of representatives with the sole right to originate all fiscal measures, the support of the government, the money has the character of a public debt, and the house should be appropriated and what shall not. It was for this reason, and with this very purpose in view, that the framers of the constitution placed this power over the purse of the country in the hands of the people's branch of congress. Furthermore it has been questioned that the right of originating appropriations carries with it the power to impose conditions and restrictions upon its disbursement, as has been done in the case of the army bill by forbidding the use of any money appropriated for the transportation or payment of troops to be used at stations. But the president has nothing better to offer in the way of a reason for the veto, and thus attempts by a sophistical statement of the law to reverse the real principle of the veto. According to the Hayes idea, the president has the right to dictate to congress what appropriations shall be made, and to stop the wheels of government by his veto upon such appropriations as he deems unwise. The practical question of this monstrous doctrine is to take from congress its constitutional power of originating and controlling the fiscal affairs of the country and to transfer that power to the president. The veto message of Hayes is remarkable documents, and will serve the democrats as excellent campaign tracts next year. Collected Diagrams to the London Times. Doctory, or robbery by armed gangs, is assuming alarming proportions in the Decatur, especially in the French district. For some time past, the French district has been scouring the country and committing a series of daring attacks on houses and villages. They seem to form part of a regular campaign, on the opposite side of the Bombay harbor. They entered the house of a rich man named (Jesse) Paul, formerly down of Baroda, and after working several hours, carried off property valued at 75,000 rupees. On Tuesday night the Boothwall and Walsingham, both of which were on fire simultaneously and totally destroyed, together with several adjacent houses. It seems beyond doubt that both fires were the work of incendiaries, and they are generally attributed to the Decatur. Boothwall and Walsingham, the magistrate court and several public offices, while Walsingham was occupied by the government high school and the educational department offices. The records of this court and all these offices are lost, as also the government book depot, with books to the value of 45,000. Altogether, about fifty houses have been destroyed, the loss of property being very great. The fire was probably caused by some more damage but for the assistance rendered by the 7th Highlanders, now quartered at Poonah. Great excitement is prevailing in Bombay, and the Decatur has carried their audacity to the point of sending a manifesto to the Bombay government. In this remarkable document they inform the government that great relief prevails in the country; that unless employment is provided for the people, native troops encouraged, taxes reduced, and the salaries of high-paid Europeans cut down, they will not cease to plunder, but will extend to European property and the confined to natives. They go on to say that they will kill the governor of Bombay on his way to Mahabharat, will hang the members of the cabinet, will carry number of rapine throughout the country, and stir up another mutiny and massacre of Europeans. The manifesto ends by warning the governor that unless he does better with the result of the price of 1,000 rupees will be put on his head. Four persons, describing themselves as Hari Nank, Rajah G. H., Kumbhakar, head clerk, and Wadkar, a small shopkeeper, minister to Swajee II, appended their signatures and seals. The government, which was at first inclined to leave the matter in the hands of the local police, now taking more energetic measures. A considerable number of troops have been told off to patrol the country, and a reward of 1,000 rupees is offered for the capture of Walsingham.

Collected Diagrams to the London Times. Doctory, or robbery by armed gangs, is assuming alarming proportions in the Decatur, especially in the French district. For some time past, the French district has been scouring the country and committing a series of daring attacks on houses and villages. They seem to form part of a regular campaign, on the opposite side of the Bombay harbor. They entered the house of a rich man named (Jesse) Paul, formerly down of Baroda, and after working several hours, carried off property valued at 75,000 rupees. On Tuesday night the Boothwall and Walsingham, both of which were on fire simultaneously and totally destroyed, together with several adjacent houses. It seems beyond doubt that both fires were the work of incendiaries, and they are generally attributed to the Decatur. Boothwall and Walsingham, the magistrate court and several public offices, while Walsingham was occupied by the government high school and the educational department offices. The records of this court and all these offices are lost, as also the government book depot, with books to the value of 45,000. Altogether, about fifty houses have been destroyed, the loss of property being very great. The fire was probably caused by some more damage but for the assistance rendered by the 7th Highlanders, now quartered at Poonah. Great excitement is prevailing in Bombay, and the Decatur has carried their audacity to the point of sending a manifesto to the Bombay government. In this remarkable document they inform the government that great relief prevails in the country; that unless employment is provided for the people, native troops encouraged, taxes reduced, and the salaries of high-paid Europeans cut down, they will not cease to plunder, but will extend to European property and the confined to natives. They go on to say that they will kill the governor of Bombay on his way to Mahabharat, will hang the members of the cabinet, will carry number of rapine throughout the country, and stir up another mutiny and massacre of Europeans. The manifesto ends by warning the governor that unless he does better with the result of the price of 1,000 rupees will be put on his head. Four persons, describing themselves as Hari Nank, Rajah G. H., Kumbhakar, head clerk, and Wadkar, a small shopkeeper, minister to Swajee II, appended their signatures and seals. The government, which was at first inclined to leave the matter in the hands of the local police, now taking more energetic measures. A considerable number of troops have been told off to patrol the country, and a reward of 1,000 rupees is offered for the capture of Walsingham.
