THE NEW CASES AND DEATHS AT MEMPHIS. Memphis, August 18.—Eight cases were reported to the board of health up to noon, of whom six are white and two colored.

Havana, August 18.—One hundred deaths from yellow fever occurred here last week, being an increase of seven as compared with the week immediately preceding.

A Thrilling Incident of the Late War. While Gen.
