# Columnist reminds everyone: 'We learn by what we do'

do... by experience, and sometimes by what we don't do.

At times, with open minds and a willingness to observe, listen and consider, we can grow in grace and knowledge. When we see a person who exercises these qualities we generally see a person who is well respected, and can be trusted.

On the other hand, people observe the things we do, how we conduct ourselves, how we relate to other folks, and they form opinions about us. Self promotion, however, in my judgment, is one of the least productive activities that we can get involved in.

One example, for about 12-15 years ago, I served as the co-editor of one of our papers. And as far as I know, or knew then, I had

We learn by what we a good relationship with the editor, who was also the owner. And we felt free to talk with each other.

> I think it's fair to say that people of our faith might be inclined to be a bit judgmental, and a little hard to get along with. Now, consistent with these thoughts, here's one thing that happened.

He told me one day that in every generation, among our people, There is one leader, a preacher, who seems to stand out a little above others, one who is better known and more highly respected than others — and the people look to him for guidance.

Then he looked at me with a little smile and said, "I would like to be that man in our day."

light. In fact I had never given much thought to anything like that, even though I knew that among all people, churches, business, political or others, such persons do become well known, and are called on.

But I would venture to say that very few of them really want to "be that person," as the brother

Now here, in effect, is what I said to him:

"That might be good if you can feel that way, if you can retain those thoughts in your mind, present yourself as minister of the gospel, committed to the best interest of the people,

and preach the truth at all times, and under all circumstances, it might work out for you. But I rather doubt your being able to do that."

For I seriously doubt that any of us can entertain thoughts of that nature and it not adversely affect the quality of our services.

If it should become apparent that we are about as interested in being the "big leader" as we are in the welfare and good of the people we serve, "at that point", so I said, "Our best days will be behind

And I'm afraid that's what happened with that brother. His church divided and he lost the fellowship and best wishes of the people with whom he had spent his church

I'm not saying that the brother's intentions were bad, for they were not. They were good. But he exercised poor judgment. And that reminds me of some of the Proverbs of Solomon: Wisdom, Knowledge.

And it seems to me that they are applied in that order. So let us note these scriptures in chapter three:

hath founded the earth"

"By understanding he hath established the heavens."

"By his knowledge the depths are broken up, and the clouds drop

down the dew."

It seems to me that these three things should be involved in all affairs of life... in that order.

As I understand it, application of these three things is essential to the successful handling of the affairs of life, whether we speak of being a preacher, selling automobiles, running for public office or whatever.

Understanding and appropriate is quite a chore. But we note verse one of chapter five reads;

"My son, attend unto my wisdom, and bow thine ear to my understanding."

I quoted this because "The Lord by wisdom it addresses "my son" as though he might have been speaking directly to one person. And it's the same in chapters six, seven and elsewhere.

> Now it's believed by some scholars that these Proverbs were actually written by David, Solomon's father. And that after his death, Solomon gathered them up and presented them to the public. Thus they became known as the Proverbs of Solomon, but were written by David. And verse eight of chapter one lends some support to that, for it

Now, back to verse two of chapter five;

"That thou mayest regard discretion, and As far as I know, the that thy lips may keep knowledge."

So again, in these two question, but with limited verses we find those three important words: Wisdom, Understanding and Knowledge.

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#### A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

#### Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

#### Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling to lock in 2009 taxes as the highest amount for 65 and older or disabled homeowners.) The over-65 homeowner's school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling, to a new home.

#### Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2008, you won't need to reapply for 2009 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 2009. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

#### ¡Varias exenciones de residencia pueden rebajar sus impuestos de propiedad!

Una exención de residencia reduce sus impuestos de propiedad. Por ejemplo, si su residencia tiene un valor de \$50,000 y Ud. recibe una exención de \$15,000, sus impuestos se calcularán como si el valor de su residencia fuera de \$35,000.

#### ¿Quién califica para una exención?

Cualquier dueño de una residencia principal el día 1º de enero tiene derecho a una exención de residencia de \$15,000 este año para rebajar sus impuestos escolares... y no importa si la residencia es casa, condominio o casa móvil. Los condados, ciudades y distritos especiales de impuestos tambien pueden ofrecer exenciones de residencia.

#### ¿Hay otras exenciones?

Si Ud. está incapacitado—o si tiene 65 años o más—tiene derecho a una exención adicional de \$10,000 en sus impuestos escolares de propiedad. Y si califica para la exención de 65 años de edad o más o está incapacitado, tambien tiene derecho a un "tope" permanente en sus impuestos escolares de residencia. (El condado, la ciudad o una universidad de dos años también puede adoptar un tope de impuestos en los impuestos del 2009 como la cantidad más grande para los dueños de hogar de 65 años o más o incapacitados.) La exención para los que ya cumplieron 65 años o más y el tope máximo se pueden transferir al esposo/esposa sobreviviente si el o ella tiene 55 ó más años de edad y es dueño/dueña de la casa en donde vive. Los dueños de 65 o más años de edad (o su esposo(a) sobreviviente de 55 años de edad o más) también pueden transferir el porcentaje del impuesto escolar pagado, en base al tope de su casa anterior, a su nueva casa.

#### ¿Debo solicitarla cada año?

No. Si recibió una exención de residencia en el 2008, no hay necesidad de solicitarla de nuevo en el 2009—a menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Sin embargo, si no ha recibido una exención en su residencia actual—o si ha cambiado de domicilio tendrá que solicitar una exención para el 2009. Si cumple 65 años durante este año, tiene hasta un año de esa fecha para solicitar una nueva exención. Si resultó incapacitado, tendrá que solicitar la exención de personas incapacitadas.

#### ¿Dónde y cuando debo solicitar mis exenciones?

Debe presentar su solicitud en la oficina local del distrito de valoraciones antes del día 30 de abril. Si necesita más tiempo, puede contactarnos en:

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#### **USDA** extends DCP, ACRE sign-up dates

County announced recently that USDA has deadline from June 1, to Aug. 14, for both the Direct and Countercyclical Program (DCP) and the forthcoming Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program.

This action extends the sign-up deadline by 10 weeks to give producers ample time to decide whether to participate in ACRE or remain in DCP.

"Extending the signup deadline for both these programs ensure that America's farmers have enough information and time needed to determine if ACRE is the right program for their operational needs," said Hanlin.

"The DCP and ACRE programs play a critical role in the farm safety net and it is vital that we act to support the hard work of the farmers we depend on," he added.

Sign-up for ACRE is expected to start in late April, with an official sign-up announcement to be made in the coming weeks. Producers can

ACRE payments are The original June made when both state and farm-level triggers are met.


By participating in ACRE, producers elect to forgo counter-cyclical payments, receive a 20percent reduction in direct payments and a 30-percent reduction in loan rates.

The decision to elect ACRE binds the farm to the program through the 2012 crop year, the last crop year covered by the 2008 Act.



The ACRE program was created in the 2008 Farm Bill to give producers an option in lieu of traditional counter-cyclical payments. Producers



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
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# High plains grower hopes to repeat 2008 success

Cotton growers on the Texas High Plains are accustomed to wind and sand, but 2008 created spring weather that was extreme even by their standards. In spite of the adverse conditions, many High Plains growers, including Joel Drake, produced a profitable crop with FiberMax® cotton varieties from Bayer CropScience.

"We had a hot, windy spring after the cotton came up — the wind just kept blowing and blowing," said Drake, who farms about 2,500 acres near Meadow and Ropesville. "When the early frost came, it set us back again, and I would say it was one of the roughest years that I remember."



# Soybean checkoff evaluates its programs

The soybean checkoff takes its investment of farmer checkoff dollars very seriously and as a result is continuously reviewing its own programs to ensure effectiveness and efficiency.

The United Soybean Board (USB) Audit and Evaluation (A&E) Committee is charged with reporting to the board the outcomes of any audits and evaluations performed on behalf of the soybean checkoff.

Each year the A&E program will do five to eight compliance reviews of the Qualified State Soybean Boards (QSSBs). These compliance reviews are intended to assist each QSSB with making sure its work is compliant with the Soybean Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act (Act & Order).

"The A&E program is a system of checks and balances," says Jim Stillman, A&E program chair and a soybean farmer from Emmetsburg, Iowa. "We are continuously reviewing and auditing programs, contractors and subcontractors to ensure they are doing what they are asked."

The QSSBs aren't the only ones being evaluated. Each year USB performs several sub-contractor audits intended to review their work. The audits are not only reports of how checkoff dollars are being spent, but also a way for USB to assist subcontractors with any checkoff compliance issues they may have.

The report can assure USB farmer-leaders that checkoff dollars expended on projects are being utilized in a manner that will create increased profit opportunities for soybean farmers while remaining compliant with the Act & Order. The A&E program performs between five and eight subcontractor audits each year.

The primary contractors for Domestic Marketing programs, International Marketing programs and Communications are audited every three years on a rotating basis.

The A&E program will perform one or two program evaluations each year to determine the program's effectiveness compared to its goals and the board's long-

eradication efforts, but we must eliminate non-commercial cotton as it can become a major breeding ground for this harmful pest."

Texas law prohibits the growth of noncommercial cotton in any boll weevil eradication zone except under a special permit issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Permits are only given for cotton grown for research, demonstrations or education. Commercial cotton fields, however, are monitored and treated when necessary.

Producers can destroy non-commercial destroyed immediately in order to reduce the risk of boll cotton through cultivation or with herbicides. 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

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#### **Harvesting cotton in Texas**



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




"We like to follow through and make sure we are spending checkoff dollars wisely and make sure we are getting value out of the checkoff," says Stillman. "We want to make sure the projects we look at are fully invested in improving the return on investment of checkoff dollars."

A recent study funded through the A&E program and conducted by Dr. Gary Williams at Texas A&M University determined the checkoff provides a \$6.40 return on every checkoff dollar invested. The return on investment study is conducted every five years.

USB is made up of 68 farmer-directors who oversee the investments of the soybean checkoff on behalf of all U.S. sovbean farmers.

Checkoff funds are invested in the areas of animal utilization, human utilization, industrial utilization, industry relations, market access and supply. As stipulated in the Soybean Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act, USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service has oversight responsibilities for USB and the soybean checkoff.
