Tuesday morning at the Pete eight inches apart, but the new drill allows seeds to be planted four inches apart, increasing their chances for better yields.

Uebler Equipment Company of West Germany sent the experimental drill through eastern states, according to Bakker, who now lives in Kanas City, Ks. At this time, the new drill, which vaguely resembles some piece of outerspace equipment, is beginning to move in the Panhandle and onto the South Plains of Texas.

Starting out on the Fulcher farm, the equipment will also be used in the Lazbuddie community on the Gene Smith and Chunk Smith farms.

The new drill will spread the seed evenly, said Bakker, and the producer will only have to use the same amount of seed, and the same labor time as he did to produce the eight inch rows. This will save money, give the wheat room to grow and in the end, produce 10 to 15 percent more yield per acre.



Dear Bob,

Once again my spray can of paint has clogged before I've finished using the can. Poking pins into the little holes in the nozzle doesn't help. What else can I do?

Dear Ilene,

Don't despair and I'll share a secret. The paint does not come up from the can into the nozzle through just the tiny holes. Look for a small slit located to the side of the nozzle head tube. Gently recut the opening about one-quarter inch, replace the spray nozzle, shake the can vigorously and spray. One more thing, occasionally turn the little head so your can tilts a different way, allowing every drop of paint to get up and out.





a year and a half ago, it had already been tested in Germany and other locations in Europe for seven years, and it was thoroughly tested at Virginia Poly Tech University in the U.S. before it was put to the test in

A special chemical is released onto the field which makes the wheat shorter, sturdier and it will stand up under watering from the sprinkler circle, as well as stand up better under adverse weather conditions, explained Bakker.

With the new drill, "It's accurate, There's no guesswork growers are driving in the exact same place everytime. If

they were to drive over wheat early in the season and it grew back they might not be able to tell where they were before." the spokesman. "Driving over wheat weakens

it, and puts it under stress. That makes it more susceptible to disease coming in."

To put the wheel tracks in the right place, the grower chooses one of six rhythms or patterns on a chart. He simply pushes a button - it's all done by computers.

The air seeder keeps track of the number of trips across the fields. When one of the markers is lifted, that indicates to the machine that one trip has been made.

At the proper time, depend-ing on which rhythm was chosen, electrical esolinodes automatically cut off the seed flow to the right tubes feeding the right shoes. Thus, wheel tracks are made, he explained.

The seeder has a calibration chart, that shows where to adjust the seeder to different row widths. And, being relatively lightweight, it's easy to transport.

Assisting with getting the planting underway on Tuesday morning, was Fred Fewin of Fewin Industries, Inc. of Lubbock.

The Journal will be issuing periodic reports on the progress of the new experimental wheat crop in this area.

the clock, seven days a week. On Wednesday morning, a trip was made to West Plains Medical Center in an attempt to talk with Bob Haralson, the hospital administrator. However it was noted that Haralson was not available, and the Journal representative was told that he does not go into the office until around 9 a.m.

At presstime, Haralson had not returned a telephone call.

As Haralson was not available, the Journal representtive, along with Gerald Reid of Radio Station KMUL, visited at length with Bailev County Judge Gor-

Judge Green told the news media representatives that he believed perhaps the ambulance problem had been 'Blown out of proportion.' Judge Green said he received a call from Haralson late on Tuesday afternoon, and that the hospital administrator had assured him that adequate personnel had been lined up to keep the ambulances operating.

The County Judge also said that according to the contract between the county, who owns the ambulances, and the operators, West Plains Medical Center, any rate increases would have to be taken to commissioners court for approval. Judge Green said the current increases being charged by West Plains Medical Center had not been approved by commissioners court, and in fact, commissioners were not even aware that such increase was in fact, being charged.

Judge Green said, "As far as I know, we have an ambulance service. The contract between the commissioners court and WPMC calls for the hospital to operate the ambulance. If at any point we find it is not operating satisfactorily, we will do something about it. At this time, we have no concrete facts that the ambulance service has any major problem, but we will be checking into it.

Judge Green was also not aware that the ambulances only have a temporary state certification, with inspection for a permanent certification pending the addition of state required equipment for the ambulances.

According to the Judge, it is up to the hospital, who has the contract to operate the ambulance to provide proper personnel to operate the ambulance, to keep the ambulance maintained, with all costs going back to the county for payment, and reminded that the hospital cannot make a profit from the ambulance.

Bailey County is currently subsidizing the hospital with \$1800 per month for operation expenses, along with paying for all expenses, including gasoline for operation of the ambulance

According to an EMT who talked with The Journal, the ambulance service personnel had dwindled to only four persons, three of them volunteers, to keep the ambulances operational seven days a week, around the clock.

To certify as an EMT, 120 hours of school are required, and the training must be taken in Lubbock or Amarillo. The cost is approximatelt \$240 for each student, and some persons who expressed an interest in the training did not have the \$240 to pay out for training, along with taking off their jobs around p.m. in order to be in a


classroom at b p.m. in Lubbock. Also, classes are for four hours, which would release the student around 10 p.m. to return to Muleshoe, around midnight.

There may or may not be a problem with the ambulance service, or it may be out of proportion, but by mid morning

on Wednesday, many residents were beginning to voice their concern to both the newspaper and to the radio station in the continuing problems faced by West Plains Medical Center, the Muleshoe Nursing Home, and now the ambulance service operated by the hospital.



PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."


