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ARTISIAN WELLS

The successful sinking of an artesian well at Dallas, the completion of which was mentioned a few days ago, and from which a continuous stream of water flowed at the rate of two and a half gallons per minute, has called forth an interesting letter from Professor Jacob Holt, some extracts from which we give as being especially interesting to the people of this section.
