## Around Muleshoe

## Parallel Terracing Saves Time, Money

The estimated costs and returns from Parallel Terraces and Pipelines is from information I have gathered this last year. Parallel terraces can prevent or control washes and increase yields.

A parallel terrace consists of evenly spaced 1.4 foot ridges, with one third the distance between the ridges being level and some blocks. The average increase in yields is about one third more after the first year of installation. This is because the rainfall stays on the field instead of running off.

The yields stay about the same the first year due to cutting and filling during installation. A parallel terrace installation of \$75 per acre, with 61 percent cost share up to \$3,500 per year, should cost about \$12 per acre for 10 years.

What about pipeline installations and returns?

If you want to save water, time and labor and increase yields, replace that open ditch with underground pipeline. Every 100 feet of ditch in a 2,000 hour pumping season can lose 1.9 acre-feet of water or 619,115 gallons.

That's the same as a 450 GPM irrigation well pumping for 22.9 hours or a 700 GPM well pumping for 14.7 hours. The estimated cost to replace an open ditch is \$1.84 for just the PVC pipe. The average payback is about two years.

The system's efficiencies vary from 25 percent-40 percent for furrow irrigation to 75 percent-80 percent from furrow to pivot sprinkler installations. Most pivot sprinkler installations show an increase in yields of 10 percent-15 percent by applying the water more evenly thus having a more uniform crop.

The producer covers two to three times the acres per day. The Soil Conservation Service

Last Friday night at Friona, as the Mules watched a 20-13 lead melt away in a steady drizzle, the hapless Floydada Whirlwinds were finding themselves unable to contain the Littlefield Wildcats' Steve Green, who led the offense for the Wildcats in a 47-0 romp over the Whirlwinds.

This is the first year for the Floydada Whirlwinds to be in 2-3A football and they are finding it 'tough sledding.'

At the same time, the Mules are depleted by injuries and at least two players, who were expected to help lead the team's offense and defense, will not see action again this year. Knee injuries have taken their toll on the Muleshoe Mules.

However, the Mules certainly have not given up, and some good action is expected at Benny Douglass stadium in Muleshoe Friday night.

The Mules have expressed their appreciation for the fans who are continuing to back the team, and the large crowd who sat through thoroughly miserable weather at Friona last Friday night. The team said the do appreciate the fans who go to the games and continue to back them in their trek toward, hopefully, even a shared district championship this year. It is not out of the picture as yet.

## Weatherization Funds Given State Approval

Governor Mark White announced Thursday that the Texas Department of Community Affairs has released \$2,419,613 to contractors for the continuation of the Weatherization Assistance for Low-Income Persons Program.

Included in that amount was \$20,099 to the South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. of Levelland to be used in Bailey, Cochran, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum counties.

The governor said these funds will be available for the Fiscal Year 1985 program from fuel overcharge funds set aside by the 68th Legislature for this purpose and \$419,613 supplemental grant from the FFY 1984 Low-Income Home Energy assistance Program (LIHEAP) block grant funding.

Additional support will be added to the Weatherization Program later in the year from the regular 1985 U.S. Department of Energy funding for this program and from the 1985 LIHEAP funding.

### Explains New

### Farm Program

President Reagan's farm credit initiatives will be the highest priority of every employee of the Farmers Home Administration, National Administrator Charles W. Shuman, stated.

The President's plan, announced late last week, as a transitional program, is designed to help farmers caught in the cost-price squeeze who are experiencing severe financial stress and who show promise of success with an extra economic boost.

Under the plan, the Farmers Home Administration will:

--Reschedule up to 25 percent of a qualifying farmer's FmHA loan, to a maximum of \$100,000, for as long as five years with no interest payment.

--Guarantee a non-FmHA Borrower's farm loan if the lender is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the loan, up to the amount necessary to achieve a positive cash flow for the borrower.

She commented, "The annual Bazaar is a great place to do your Christmas shopping, and you will find items that cannot be purchased in retail stores."

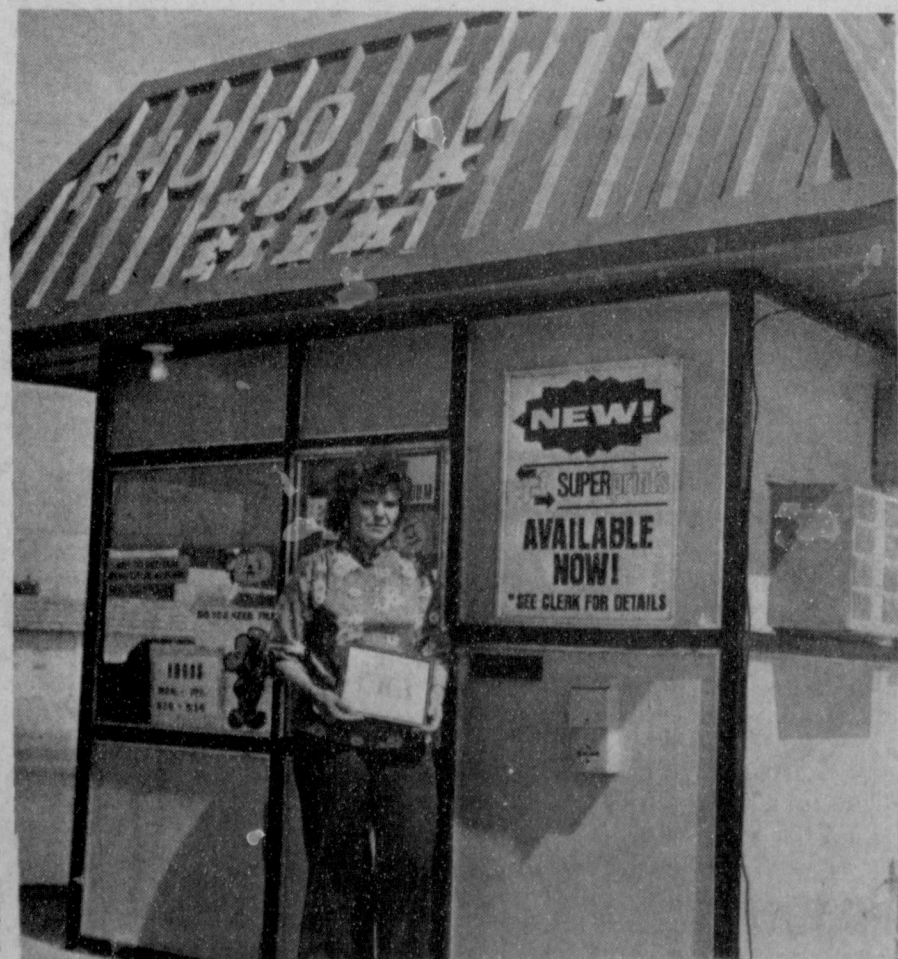
### HERO To Serve Mexican Supper On Friday Night

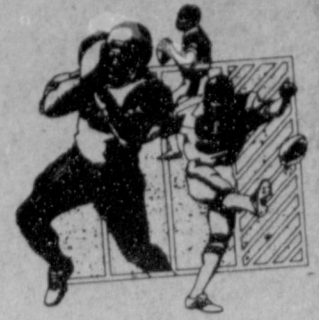

## Oklahoma State Set To Meet Nebraska

Normally, fans in the Big Eight Conference have to wait until the middle of November to see the game that decides the conference championship. And they may have to wait again this year as Oklahoma and Nebraska don't meet until November 17th. However, things might change in the interim. This Saturday, a powerful pack of undefeated Cowboys from Oklahoma State is going to challenge the supremacy of the Cornhuskers of Nebraska. Prior to their opener against Arizona State four weeks ago, we called the Cowboys (and Sun Devils) the strongest 4-time losers in college football last fall. The Cowboys lost to Oklahoma 21-20, and were beaten by Nebraska 14-10, finishing with a 7-4 regular season record. Oklahoma State went on to defeat Baylor in the Cornhusker Bowl 24-14. The Cornhuskers will be playing at home, and they already hold a tremendous lead in the series between the two schools, 22 wins in 24 meetings. Pat Jones is in his first year as head coach at Oklahoma State, replacing Jimmy Johnson who took over the reigns at Miami. It's difficult not to pick an upset in this one, but Nebraska will survive this stiff conference test.

Another conference match-up takes place in the Pac-10 Conference as pre-season favorite U.C.L.A. entertains Stanford. The Indians who hosted

Arizona State last Saturday took their place in the sun three weeks ago with a big 34-19 win over Illinois. They lost to Oklahoma in their opener 19-7. U.C.L.A., on the other hand, has not been impressive. They just sneaked by both San Diego State and Long Beach State, then lost to Nebraska 42-3. Stanford is the slight favorite in this one.

North Carolina travels to Clemson in an important clash in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Clemson will be too strong. Georgia should prevail over Alabama in a Southeast Conference struggle, and Miami will nudge Notre Dame.

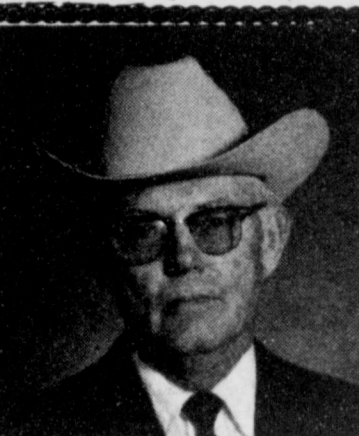

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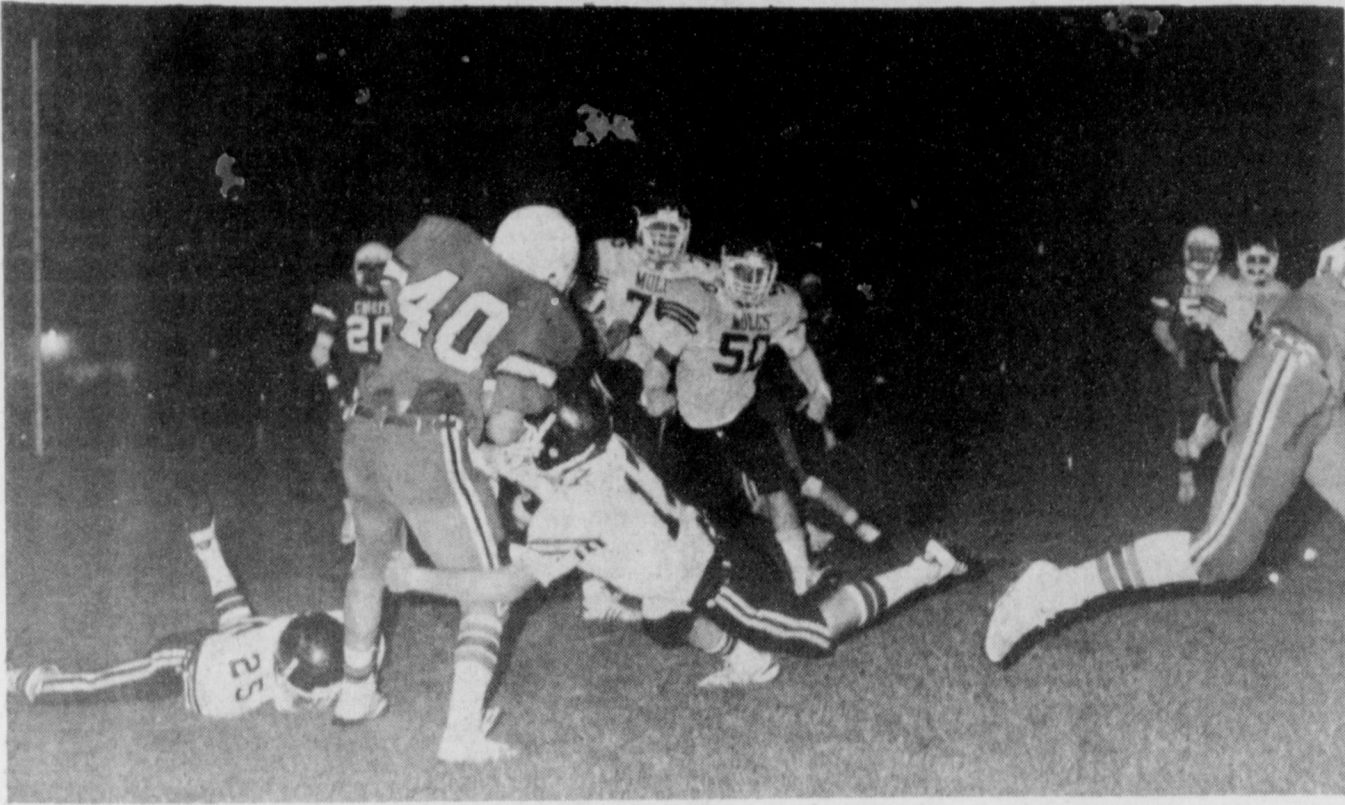

istance program provides help to low-income households, with priority to elderly (60-plus) and handicapped, in weatherizing their homes. Weatherization includes caulking around windows; weather-stripping windows and doors; repairing broken windows; and insulating attics, floors and walls.

Governor White said the major goal is to stop air-infiltration of the home, thereby creating a more healthful living environment, conserving energy and reducing the impact of higher fuel costs on low-income families. The maximum limit per housing unit for the program is \$1,000 unless a special waiver is obtained. Under these guidelines, approximately 2,500 homes will be weatherized with this funding, added the governor.

Funds are provided through a performance-based contract to approximately 53 contractors to provide these weatherization services statewide. Distribution of the funding is based on a formula considering each area's climatic factor and the number of sub-standard homes.

of Farmers Home, the Rescheduling, will be the number one priority of everyone in the agency," Shuman said. "The first meetings with staff from across the country was held Friday, September 21, 1984, when all the state directors and farm program chiefs met here."

"Special project managers are being appointed in the National Office to see that all the necessary regulation changes and instructions to FmHA field offices, are completed post haste," he said. "We will begin examining loan dockets within a matter of weeks so that this part of the program can be underway by January 1."

Shuman said the necessary steps to implement the guarantee portion will be taken "in ample time to meet the spring lending season."

Borrowers under this plan must meet the general eligibility requirements for FmHA's farm operating and farm ownership loans.

As another part of the President's initiative, FmHA will contract with local farm financial and management experts to help prepare and analyze credit statements and loan applications as part of an effort to speed loan processing.

And, in a limited number of states, contracts will be signed with lending institutions for the servicing of loans themselves.

Preston Scoggin, president of the SCAC, then gave a report from the Muleshoe Heritage Founda-

tion on the progress of the Muleshoe Depot and other historic buildings. In his report it was stated that progress is being made on moving the Depot and planning and placing it and the other buildings on the property donated by the county. This land is located beside the Muleshoe Civic Center and will enhance the area upon completion.

Another "Citizen of the Month" was selected for October and will be revealed at the next SCAC meeting, which will be held on October 24 at K-Bob's Steakhouse.

### News From The Office

Muleshoe High School students received first six weeks report cards on Wednesday, October 3. It is most important for students and parents to remember that these reports must be signed and returned to the teachers.

In addition to report cards, principal Wayland Ethridge stated that part of the new house bill requires that a letter accompany any report card which has a failing grade on the card. The letter is stating facts concerning the law which requires a parent-teacher conference between any failing students and the teacher. Parents should read any of these letters received, sign them, and check the time they will confer with the teacher concerning the unsatisfactory grade. Ethridge emphasized that not only is the school following this procedure simply because of the new regulations for all Texas schools, but that the real purpose of the conference is to enable teachers and parents to discuss a student's work, his performance level, any handicaps he may have, or any item related to his or her underachievement in the hopes to correct the situation. Ethridge stated, "With parents and teachers working together for the total welfare of a student, there is a much greater chance of the student being successful."

Ethridge also stated that it is mandatory that a written letter be sent to parents of students who do not return signed letters or report cards. However, he stated that if all students are cognitive of the requirement and return letters and cards on time, there should be little need of a follow-up mailed letter.

When discussing some of the problems of students who may not be doing satisfactory work, Ethridge stated that the school system wanted to emphasize again that the tutorial program is available every Tuesday and Thursday from 4 until 4:45 p.m. for any student in high school to receive help with classes or lessons. He also made mention that the tutorial program is not program primarily for under-achievers, but it is a program for all students. Many students who make top grades go by for explanations concerning things they may not quite understand, and many simply stay for extra help in order to achieve higher scores in classes. Ethridge emphasized, "The program is for all students of Muleshoe High and all are invited to attend the sessions."

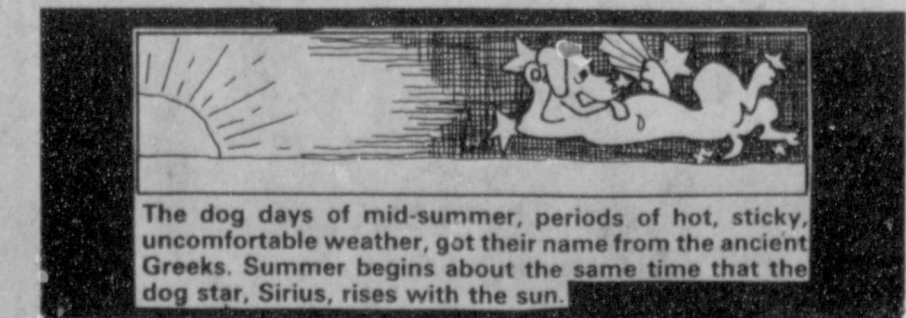

**Texas A&M, IBM developing programs to teach statistics**

Two divisions of The Texas A&M University System have entered into a \$220,000 research and development effort with IBM to develop "user friendly" programs for teaching basic statistics to college students on the IBM Personal Computer.

Under terms of the contract, IBM will supply \$100,000 in direct support and equipment valued at \$120,000.

Texas A&M's Statistics Department and the Computer Technology Division of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station (TEES) will perform the research needed to develop a prototype software package that students could use to learn statistics on IBM Personal Computers.

TEES is the engineering research arm of The Texas A&M University System.

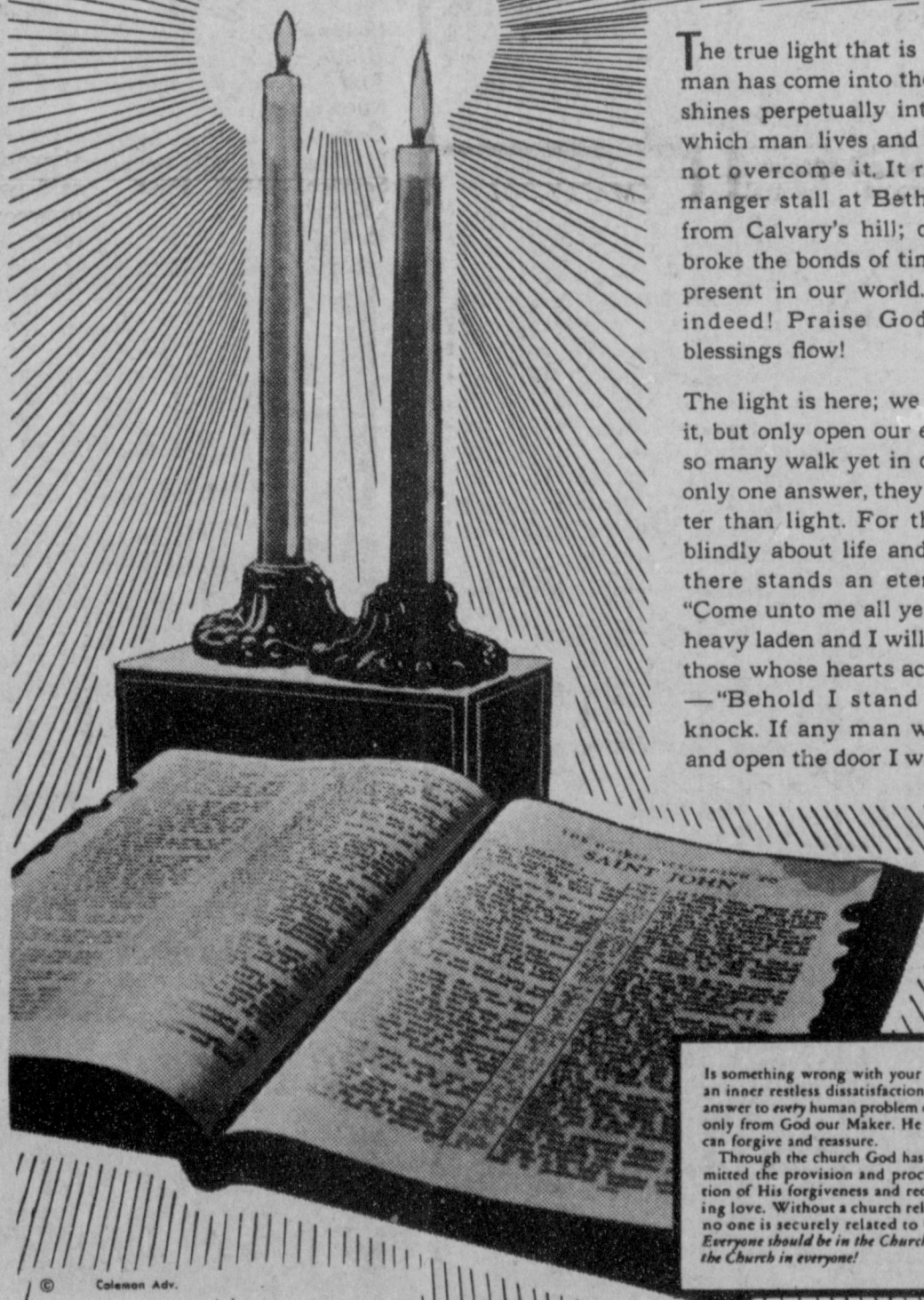

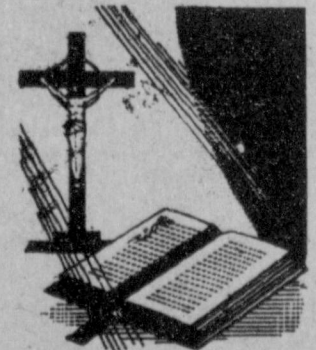

**Texas A&M develops software to teach high school science**

Bio-Systems, a Houston-based medical technology firm and subsidiary of Healthdyne Inc. of Marietta, Ga., has awarded a contract to Texas A&M University to develop high school science lessons that can be used with Texas Instruments, IBM or Apple computers.

"The programs will be used to teach biology, chemistry and physics laboratory lessons to pupils in grades 9-12," said Texas A&M researcher Dr. Jon Hunter, project coordinator.

Unlike other self-paced computer programs for learning, the Bio-Systems lessons feature colorful and detailed graphics of scientific principles and step-by-step procedures for performing laboratory experiments, he said.

In addition, students use a variety of sensors and a computer interface module — developed at Texas A&M and sold by Bio-Systems — to obtain results from their projects, explained Hunter, an associate professor of bioengineering and veterinary physiology/pharmacology.

Bio-Systems has been active in supporting a number of Texas A&M science training programs, including a summer session that draws participants from across America and from other countries, noted Hunter.
