RAILWAY RUMORS.

WORDS OF WARNING AND CAUTION FOR THE SURETY ROUTE.

The New Orleans Connection—Its Advantages and Drawbacks.

An Express representative made the general rounds yesterday in search of railway news. San Antonio is an important prospective railway center, and it is in this direction, where a great and developing country lies, and through the average San Antonio still dreams of hopes to come, and does not realize that the hour for activity is at hand, yet matters are assuming shape, and per force of circumstances the A. must soon fall in with the common plan.

The completion of the New Orleans road, is hailed with joy, especially by grocery merchants, for such competition opens up a market in direct competition with the Texas and will tend to reduce prices on many of the staple articles. Again, the completion of the road that connects the Lone Star and the Crescent, Texas, is in arm with the finest and the best city of the south, and opens up to San Antonio a new avenue of trade and travel which will be of great benefit to her, her growth and her prosperity, while every freighter, every stage man, every business man and every laborer of the great, will feel the good effect of this new avenue of resource and income. It will carry away our raw produce—our cotton, sheep, hides and cattle, and send us back the dollars for them. These are some of the business men of San Antonio, and there are not a few others who think that the completion of Texas with New Orleans will prove even a greater benefit to the state than any railway construction of the past.

But one objection is raised, and that is to the double charge of ten cents per mile for passenger travel on one section of the new line. Several merchants of San Antonio think that men who will take such extreme advantage of a monopoly of business in one respect will do so in another, and instead of the cotton of Texas going directly through to New Orleans by rail, as it should, it will be forced to go by water. The laws of the state of Louisiana do not fix a maximum or minimum rate of charges for railroads, and hence the question of the new line has run up the passenger rate to ten cents per mile. They will carry about 1/3 the number of people and make about one-third as much money. The good will of the public has much to do with the success of any business, and less than the N. O. route the good will of the people of the Lone Star state, the opinion is that it will only get a small portion of their trade.

In a few days, however, there will be a meeting of officers of the three divisions of road connecting Texas with Texas, and at that meeting it is hoped arrangements will be reached which will enable all to work in harmony and for a common interest. The charge of ten cents a mile has aroused much bitterness of feeling that there is nearly as much doubt that it will be reduced to five cents as the maximum allowed to be charged under the laws of Texas.

In conversations with persons who have recently traveled on the night train of the G. H. & A. N.
