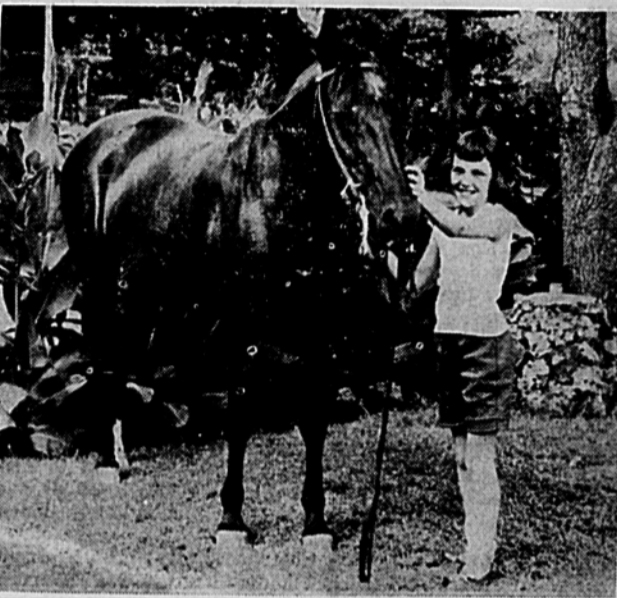
HAD A TELEGRAM from Congressman Omar Burleson Friday announcing that Clyde Manufacturing Co. of Clyde had been awarded a contract to manufacture some \$204,322 worth of food supplement for the Civil Defense office. Mr. Douglas Bonine and his people are to be congratulated on landing the contract for 869,000 pounds of the candy like product to be used in fallout shelters in case of nuclear attack. The supplement is to be made of sugar and corn syrup and is formulated to sustain life for quite a while. The contract is a boost for Clyde and for the entire county. Mr. Bonine is in the candy manufacturing business, and has done a good job with novelty items. It will take some five to six months to complete the contract and some 25-30 people will be working on it.

DID YOU EVER SEE okra pods that were three feet long? Mr. and Mrs. I. E. Warren have some growing in the yard on West Third. It is a special type that grows on a vine. They got the seeds from a relative in Arkansas. Thanks to the Warrens, we are enjoying some very fine Elberta peaches at our home. . . . looks like the fruit crop is going to be great this year. Civil War Marker Placed In Baird

Plans are underway for the erection of a Confederate Memorial Information Marker for Camp Pecan, C.S.A. in Baird, Mr. John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, announced today.

The marker will be placed on the courthouse lawn. Judge Byron Richardson and Mr. B. C. Chrisman, chairman, Callahan County Historical Survey Committee, have been assisting the TSHSC with the marker placement from this county.

"History is of prime interest to tourists," said Mr. Shepperd. "We must also not forget that through this marker program our school children can learn more about the history of the area and State."

Camp Pecan, a Civil War camp of the Texas Frontier Regiment, was located 21 miles southeast. It was established in 1862 as one of a line of posts a day's horseback ride apart. The number of men guarding the frontier were few. Trouble came from all directions with Indian threats and raids from the West and plundering renegades and deserters from the East. Food, supplies, clothing and horses were constantly scarce, but in spite of all these obstacles, these Confederates managed to effectively hold the frontier line of settlement.

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee, State agency for historical preservation, is in charge of research and inscriptions for the markers.

The marker is of Texas pink granite, stands five feet high and has the Texas star and wreath at the top.

County Historical Survey Committees, cooperating in the program are engaged in marking the graves of all Civil War veterans.

Farm-To-Market Road Will Be Constructed Near Baird

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$59,000 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in Callahan County in the Baird area, as part of the 1963 F.M. Road Program, announced District Engineer, J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

The District Engineer said 3.8 miles in this area will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of Elmer Harris, Resident Engineer, Abilene.

The work authorized for this county is part of the new \$24 million F.M. Road Construction Program just announced by the Texas Highway Commission. The Farm to Market Program

is a yearly road building undertaking of the Texas Highway Department under which statute specifies that \$23 million annually shall be spent for new F.M. construction. The 1963 program is financed for some \$24.1 million, more than a million dollars in excess of the basic statutory requirement.

New farm roads will be built in a total mileage being approximately 1,060. Of the new roads added to the highway system by this program, 69% are school bus routes and 65% are mail routes.

Texas now has a designated Farm to Market Road System of well over 36,000 miles including the new program, most of these

miles having been built since 1949 under an expanded farm road building program.

In 1962 the Texas Highway Commission revised its goal for farm road mileage upwards from 35,000 to a total of 50,000 miles. The ultimate 50,000 mile farm roads network will be developed over a period of years and geographically distributed throughout the state.

The following project will take place in this county: Approximate Location of Project, From I-20 to WCL of Baird Northwest to County Road; Approximate Length, 3.8; Proposed Character of Work, Gr., Strs., & Surf.; Estimated Cost, \$59,000.

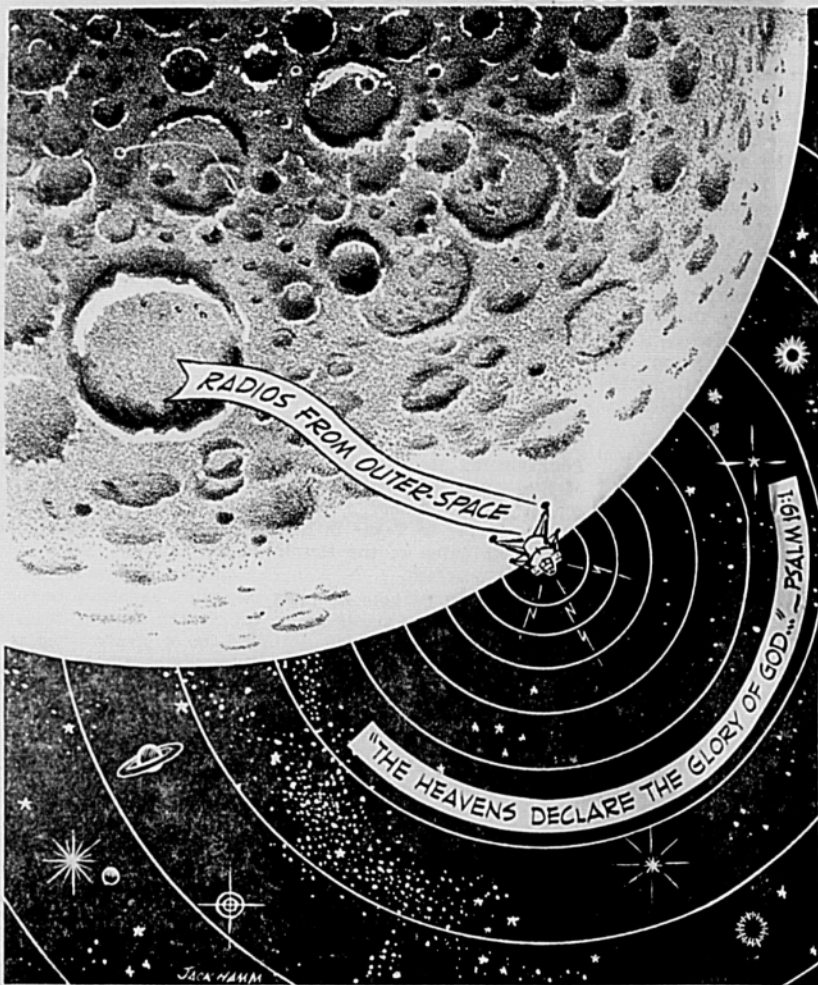
