BUDDGET FROM AUSTIN.
THE OLD ALCALDE'S REPLY

AUSTIN, November 24.—The various departments of state observed Thanksgiving day to-day, and, consequently, there is nothing of interest to report from the state department. In some cities whose church members are of such peculiar style that it would be letting them in cheap at twenty-five dollars. But it is very doubtful if children will be sent on any great extent in the twenty years of age, for fifty cents.

German Releiving. They resolve that they will oppose the nomination of either of the parties in this state office, and recommend to the greenbackers of each county to act independently, make their own nominations and support their own tickets. They are doubtless impelled to this action by the fact that with all their share in the capital stock of a gold-mining enterprise, they receive no dividends, and are "progressing backward."

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat attacks the Chicago tariff convention struck out vigorously against two obstacles to the free-trade movement, an American merchant marine. One is the crushing influence of local taxation, and the other is the attempt to make navigation monopolies pay the expenses of the convention. The merchant marine of the United States is often underestimated. English ships employ pay rates on their earnings; American on their capital. Suppose two ships each costing \$600,000, and each carrying 1000 tons of cargo, and each making 2000 miles in a year, the American pays 5 per cent on \$200,000, or \$10,000, to see which will come out best in the competition.
