Wednesday morning, the sun came out in a repeat performance of what has been the 'norm' for this week, bright relatively balmy 20s. sunshine, and slowly warming temperatures.

The National Weather Service has predicted that the warming. trend would continue through most of this week, with most days being filled with sunshine, providing farmers with a chance

Up to eight inches of snow was predicted through the south as the storms that went through Texas continued its eastward trek.

Subzero temperatures continued to rule the northern Great Plains and major rivers in the midwest continued to be jammed with ice, slowing commercial traffic as far south as Mississippi and causing several barge accidents.

As Midland suffered through -11 degree weather, which is considered most unusual

weather so far south in Texas, the northern South Plains, which includes Muleshoe and Bailey County, was enjoying



Parmer County received only \$22.72, with mixed drink taxes reported of \$151.48.

Texas cities and counties are receiving a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state. The state's general revenue fund received the balance--\$33 million--of the tax money collected.

The legislature reduced the city and county share of the tax to 12.5 percent, effective with the first quarter collections in 1985, and the state will then get the entire gain from the tax increase.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and citycounty rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's

Bullock said the mixed drink tax brought a total of \$167 million to state and local coffers

English competency may be true key to college success

COLLEGE STATION - All the emphasis on the importance of science and math in paving the way for success in college and a high tech career may be overlooking the true key to "making it," a Texas A&M University study indicates.

Good grades in high school English may be the best predictor of success in college, said Dr. Harold L. Pace, who conducted the research for his dissertation in educational administration at Texas A&M.

Pace, currently registrar at Louisiana Tech University at Ruston, came across that finding while looking at the effectiveness - or ineffectiveness, judging from study results - of college remedial work among students at Louisiana Tech.

'We found that grades in high school English and the number of English courses completed in high school were highly correlated with all success variables in college," he said.

In fact, grades in high school English were more highly correlated with grades in college math than were grades in high school math, Pace said.
