## Winter Weather Releases Area Grip; Snow Melts

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### Something Special III Scheduled Saturday For All This Area

It's really Something Special!! Something Special III has been planned to be staged in the Sudan High School auditorium on the night of Saturday, February 9 at 7 p.m.

Originated by Kenneth Richards of the Anchor Brothers Band and the Sudan Chamber of Commerce, Something Special fills a double duty each time it is staged.

Richards explains that Something Special is designed to provide 'family entertainment' of the best quality, and the proceeds are used to help various projects in Sudan.

This time, the funds will be used to help pay for Sudan's new fire truck, which cost in excess of \$60,000. The new fire truck was a necessary purchase, as the state fire marshal had determined the older truck at Sudan was inadequate.

Headlining the show will be the Anchor Brothers Band, who will conclude the evening's show, and lead the grand finale. Other entertainment will be the ever-popular Wynon Mayes, a comedienne from Plainview; the Sunlighters, a gospel singing group from Idalou and Douglas Smith, a pianist in the Floyd Cramer style.

Tickets are on sale now at KMUL Radio and are \$4 for adults and \$2 for teenagers. Children under the age of 12 are admitted free. There is also a 10 percent discount for groups of senior citizens who attend.

Wednesday morning, the sun came out in a repeat performance of what has been the 'norm' for this week, bright sunshine, and slowly warming temperatures.

The National Weather Service has predicted that the warming trend would continue through most of this week, with most days being filled with sunshine, providing farmers with a chance to get back into their fields.

Although most of the crops have long ago been gathered, there is still cotton in spotted fields throughout the county, and surrounding area.

It was reported Wednesday morning that for the first time in more than a week, freezing precipitation of some type was not falling in the state, and mostly fair skies were reported statewide.

The same was not true in the deep south where thunderstorms, rain and ice continued its bombardment, forcing the closure of schools and leaving thousands of people without power in Tennessee. Up to eight inches of snow was predicted through the south as the storms that went through Texas continued its eastward trek.

Subzero temperatures continued to rule the northern Great Plains and major rivers in the midwest continued to be jammed with ice, slowing commercial traffic as far south as Mississippi and causing several barge accidents.

As Midland suffered through -11 degree weather, which is considered most unusual

weather so far south in Texas, the northern South Plains, which includes Muleshoe and Bailey County, was enjoying relatively balmy 20s.

For the third time this winter, the deepest snow, the coldest weather, and the most miserable driving conditions were in the southern half of the Con't Page 6, Col. 1

## Drink Tax Checks Are Increased

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$13.4 million to 220 counties and 427 cities as their share of

the state's mixed drink tax collected at the new rate of 12 percent during the fourth quarter of 1984.

The Texas legislature raised the tax from 10 percent to 12 percent, effective October 2, 1984.

Bullock said the state collected \$46.5 million in mixed drink taxes during the quarter, up 22 percent over the fourth quarter in 1983.

For Bailey County, a total tax of \$6,390.86 was reported, and the county received a check in the amount of \$958.58; while the city of Muleshoe received a check in the amount of \$537.21 on reported taxes of \$3,581.38.

Cochran County's share of the reported \$979.25 in the county was a check in the amount of \$146.89.

In Lamb County, Littlefield received a check in the amount of \$884.00 as their share of the reported \$5,893.33 in mixed drink taxes collected, while Lamb County received \$1,421.89

of the \$9,479.25 reported in taxes.

Wade Wheeler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wheeler, exhibited a fourth place lightweight Crossbred.

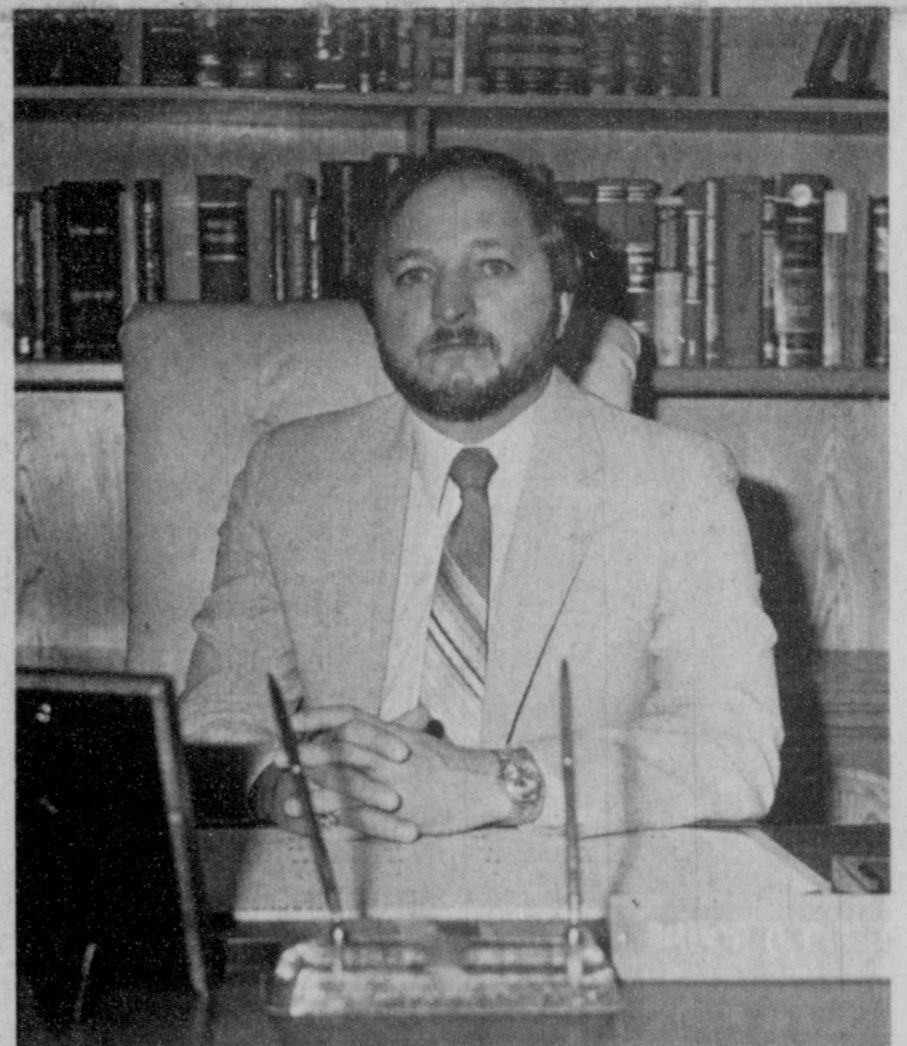
Also, a fourth place Heavy-weight Cross was exhibited by Greg Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Young.

Winning fifth place in the lightweight Crossbred division was Jeaniane Robertson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Darwin Robertson.

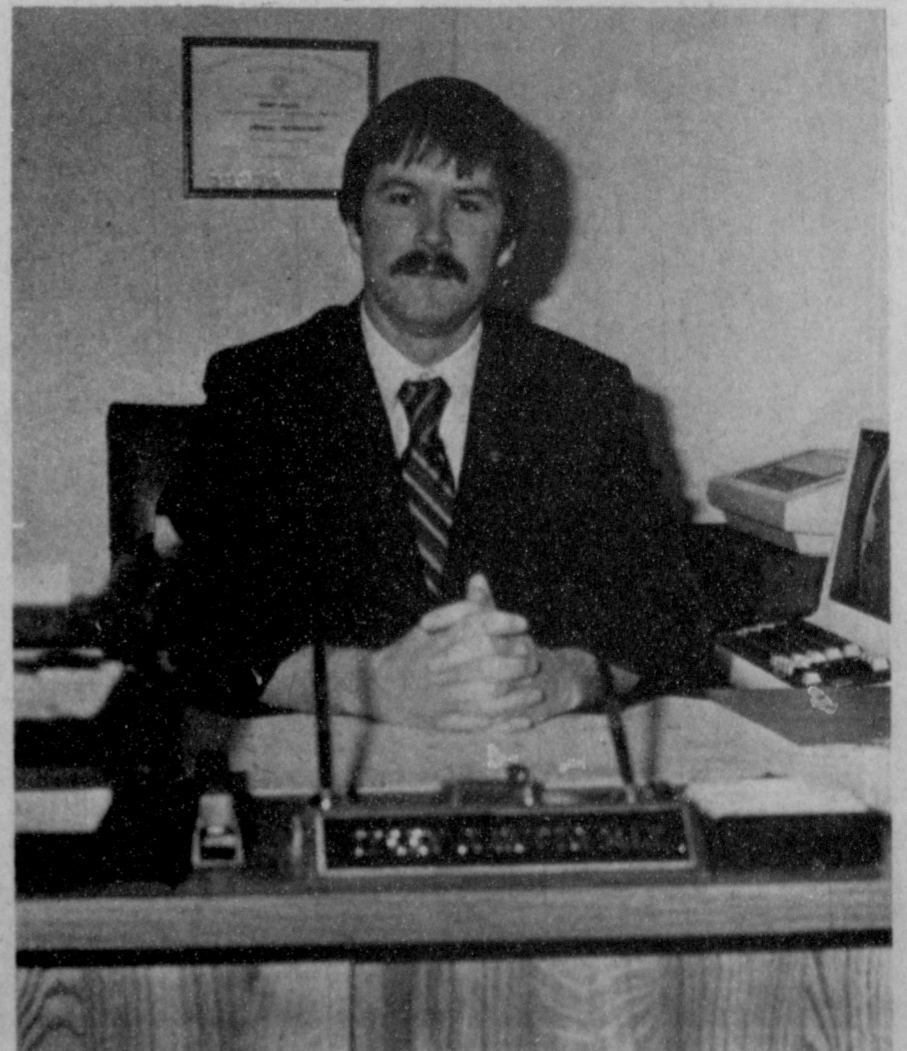

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## M.D. Anderson Hospital Project Gets Underway

Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has once again began their M.D. Anderson Hospital Project and the GFWC-TFWC Muleshoe Study Club is collecting some of the needed items.

Mrs. Betty Jo Carpenter said "The time has come once again for the club to ask your help in gathering together some of the articles that can be used at M.D. Anderson Hospital for patients as well as the patients

families. We have had some of our local people there and maybe through sending some of the things needed, we can have a part in helping in the future of some that we know and love, or just extending a helping hand to someone we do not know."

Some of the needed items are as follows: clothing, men's, women's and children's gowns, robes, pajamas and slippers. They need not be new, only in good condition. They are in dire need of men's size large pajamas and slippers, heavy on the large slippers, a golden opportunity for all who knit or crochet.

Beautyician needs: The beauty shop in the number one service offered by the volunteer department with only one paid employee...one patient must be beautified every 13 minutes; Blow dryers, curling irons, combs, wig heads, Norelco razors, scissors, shampoo and conditioners are a must as patients pay with only a Thank You.

Kitchen: Everything it takes to prepare and serve a meal, no glass, plastic plates, cups, soup/cereal bowls, glasses and pitchers, stainless steel knives, forks, teaspoons and serving spoons. Also pots and pans, skillets (large and small), utility baking pans, cookie sheets, coffee pots, blenders (many patients are on highly restrictive diets and quite ill while taking chemical therapy). Butcher and paring knives, measuring cups and spoons, peelers, graters, spatulas, sifters, strainers, egg turners, egg beaters, whisks, can openers, bottle openers, dish cloths and towels and pot holders and mats. These kits are checked out of the patient family library and are supposed to be returned...Many times they are not, as an oversight. The kits are in continual demand and answer a great need for the outpatient and their family.

Library: books and magazines, paper back books (high preference for westerns).

Floral: tall bud vases, needed by the 100s. MDA Volunteers grow the roses on the hospital grounds.

Amusement/games: cards, dominoes, checkers, monopoly and etc. time is no object.

Postal service: wanted,

stationery, writing paper, envelopes and stamps.

Millinery: soft fabric, knitted or crochet caps and bonnets for children and women.

Small gifts: Would brighten patients lives on special occasions, holidays and birthdays. Perfume, cologne, after shave, note cards and other personal gifts would be perfect.

Aunique pillow: compliments of Evelyn Hicks, Key District, the "Reach for Recovery" Pillow is used not only for women who have had mastectomies but are also very popular with the children. The standard pillow is 10 inches

wide and 19 inches long.

Nylon stocking: Two hundred legs are needed to fill one 10 inch by 19 inch pillow. That is 100 pairs of panty hose. Give these stockings to the club members who are sewing the pillows. You may donate fabric too.

Own a Beta Max: Tired of re-runs. Suffer no more, send your old movies to MDA to be used on the new TV/Beta Max.

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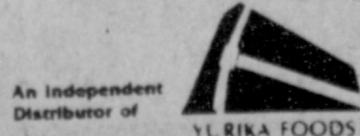

Simply divide the total cost by the number of times you estimate you will wear the garment. Because wool clothing is durable, resists tearing and often doesn't show wear, it can generally be worn for several seasons, she explains. So the per wearing cost of buying "investment" clothing such as a wool suit may be lower than the cost of less-expensive clothing worn for a shorter time.

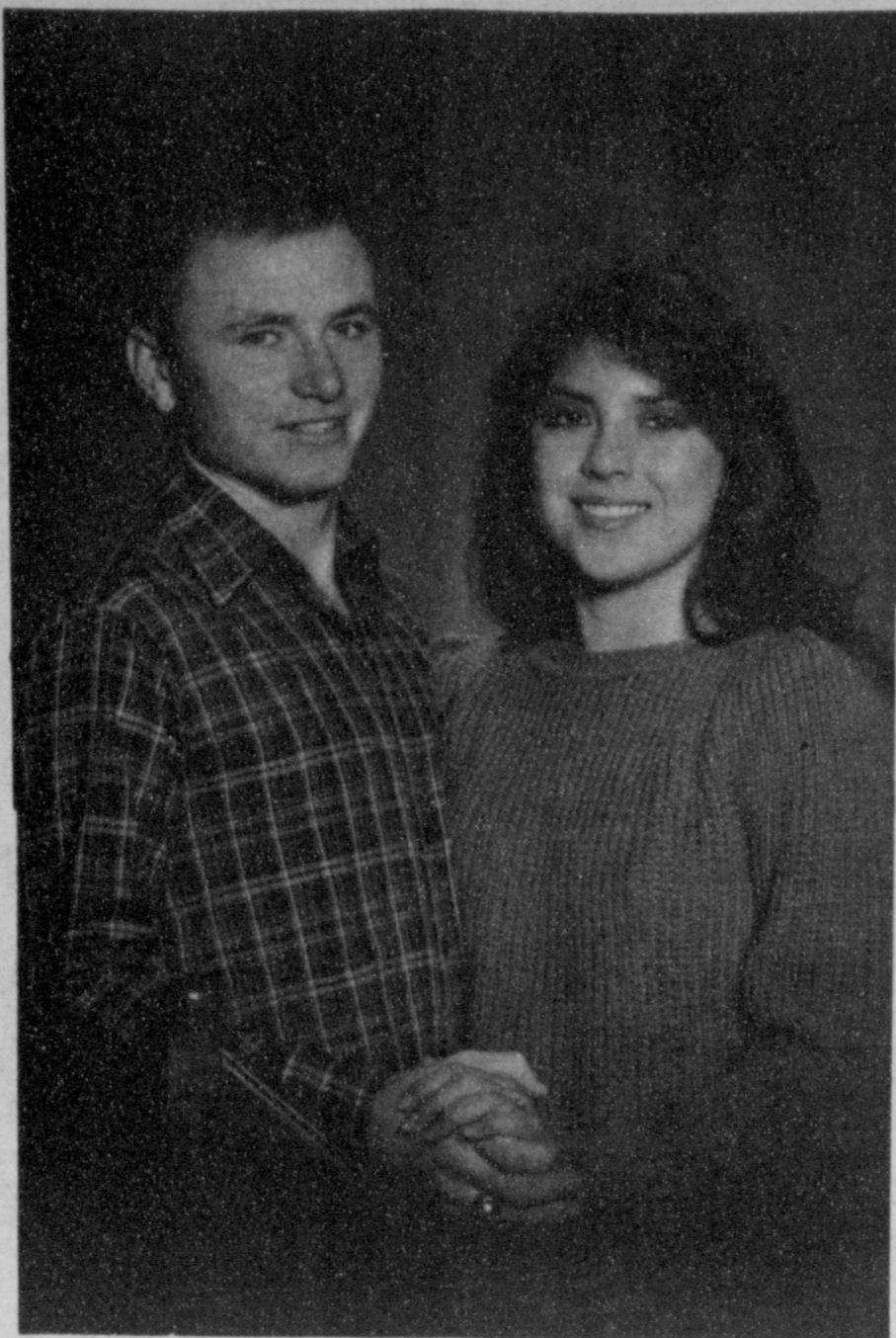

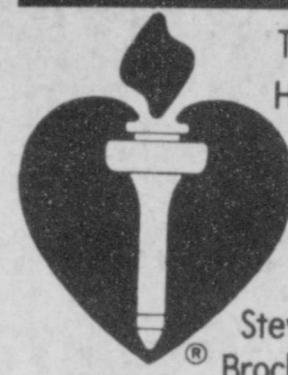

state, while the northern areas stayed drier and warmer.

Although extremely cold weather had been predicted from National Weather Service for Tuesday, the sky was clear after a little fog early in the morning, and bright sunshine took the temperature just above 40 degrees.

Remaining patches of snow from the previous week were beginning to melt in shady areas, and streets were drying out.

On Saturday, Midland recorded -11 degrees, while the official low in Muleshoe was only -1, also, Midland had several inches of snow on the ground while Muleshoe had less than three inches.

Also, the nighttime lows have continued to be in the 20s since the weekend, with daytime temperature showing a marked increase over the highs recorded last week.

Although light snow fell during the afternoon on Monday, it quickly melted. Monday morning early, sleet briefly covered the ground, but intermittent sunshine melted all the sleet cover before noon.

On Sunday, as this area had a brief respite from winter's onslaught, travel advisories were posted in much of southern Texas, with freezing rain reported in both the Kerrville and San Antonio areas, promoting the closing of interstate highways after numerous accidents were reported.

What really made this theft unusual is that the mortuary vehicle contained the body of a 59-year old white male. Dispatcher Williams said the man's body was wrapped in white sheets, and had been autopsied. He had grey hair and eyes, and other physical description.

As this was going on, the first ambulance dispatched to Lazbuddie brought in a youth from the local hospital.

Then everything got quiet, and routine was back at the radio room at the Muleshoe Police Department Radio Emergency Services...it was intermission time....

Parmer County received only \$22.72, with mixed drink taxes reported of \$151.48.

Texas cities and counties are receiving a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state. The state's general revenue fund received the balance--\$33 million--of the tax money collected.

The legislature reduced the city and county share of the tax to 12.5 percent, effective with the first quarter collections in 1985, and the state will then get the entire gain from the tax increase.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said the mixed drink tax brought a total of \$167 million to state and local coffers during 1984.
