The farmer has been trying to keep his sheep in winter with proper food and shelter there is no danger from lambs or any other disease in West Texas, except perhaps the scab, and that can hardly be called a disease, but is a parasite which can be easily killed by dipping in tobacco or the juice of the roo-poor or bear grass root.

The Texas Journal of Commerce recommends the employment of canine detectives and deputy sheriffs, and would have a select committee of Cuban blood hounds organized in every county.
