It was a great 'send-off' for the Muleshoe Mules to begin their 1985 track season when they won their own relay held at Olton last Saturday. They scored 160.5 points to the second place finisher's 101.

The meet was a cooperative effort between two schools. Olton High School provided the track facility while Muleshoe organized the meet, coordinated

the entries and ran the meet off. The coaches said, "We would like to thank the Olton Schools for their hospitality and help in making the meet a success."

Involved in the meet were five schools, Dimmitt, Frenship, Memphis, Lubbock Roosevelt and Muleshoe. The Mules fielded two complete teams in the meet.

Strong showings were made by the Mules in several events. The distance events were the brightest spot in the meet. The Mules took first, second, and third in every event over 400 meters. The Junior Varsity, competing in the varsity division, also showed well in the distance taking two fifth places and two sixths.

First place finishers in the meet were Mark Moton, 300 meter hurdles; Tony Luna, both the one mile run and the two mile run; Ronnie Logsdon, 880 yard run and the mile relay team of Ronnie Logsdon, John Isaac, Tony Luna and Mark Moton.

### Referendum For Wheat To Be Here

Texas wheat producers will vote in April to decide if they want to extend the check-off territory from the existing 34 counties under the jurisdiction of the Texas Wheat Producers Board.

To learn more about the upcoming wheat referendum, producers in Bailey County and surrounding counties will want to attend an informational meeting sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on March 12, at Muleshoe, says Spencer Tanksley, county Extension agent.

The meeting will be at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum, located on Highway 84, and will start at 7:30 p.m.

Producers will hear from an Extension economist, Dr. Ed Smith, regarding the current wheat situation, outlook and changing wheat production trends in the state, says Tanksley. Also, the mechanics and timing of the referendum voting process will be discussed including recent changes in the commodity referendum law.

Following these discussions, Texas Wheat Producers Board representatives will present information on the existing wheat check-off program and the potential outcome of a total statewide effort, says Tanksley. There will be ample time for questions from producers regarding the program.

Although members of the Muleshoe Fire Department "Still can't believe it," at this point, it appears that the fire department will have new quarters later this year.

Tuesday morning, in a special meeting, the Muleshoe City Council awarded a bid for the construction of a new fire station at the corner of East Fifth Street and American Boulevard.

Ten bids were received for the proposed new structure, and were opened during the February 19 meeting of the City Council, however, no bid was awarded as the council elected to check thoroughly into all the bids, along with options and alternatives for the structure.

Bill McMorries, city engineer, studied the bids, and the city manager, Dave Marr, as well as several of the city council members, checked on building done by the lowest bidders, as well as checked with businesses who had done businesses with the lowest bidders.

"All the construction firms has excellent references," said Marr. "We checked with several businesses, and all had very favorable comments about the bidders."

After a brief discussion about the difference in cost between gas and electric heating, the bid was awarded to Hallmark Builders of Amarillo. The bids had come down between Hallmark and ADC Builders of Lubbock.

Hallmark's bid of \$117,289 for construction of the building was approved. The final bid by ADC Builders of Lubbock was \$120,608.

Marr said Hallmark would be notified Tuesday of the bid approval, and Hallmark would have 145 days to have the construction completed. Prior to Hallmark coming in, city workers will prepare the 10 lots purchased by the City of Muleshoe, and have them ready for construction to begin.

Jack Dunham, fire chief, was present for the meeting, and

said he was in approval of the proposed new building.

The building will be 50x125 feet overall; and will include a 75x50 foot storage for fire trucks and equipment; 50x50 feet for a meeting room, and will have a 30x20 foot basement. Trucks will come out of the building onto East Fifth Street, added the city manager.

For the past several years, the Muleshoe Fire Department has shared their building on East Anenue B with the Muleshoe City Police Department, with fire trucks stored in a small, older building across the street from the fire department meeting room. The fire department sub-station is at the Bailey County Civic Center and Coliseum.

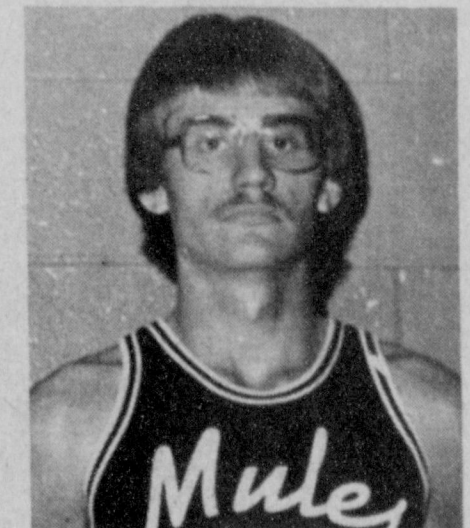

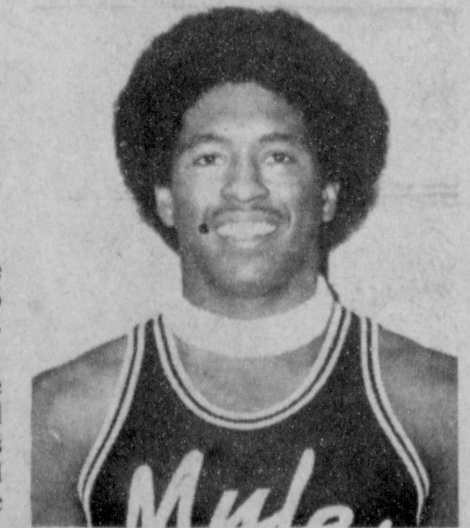
Idalou placed one player on the All-District team, Jim Pruitt.

Chosen as Coach of the Year was Ken Cleveland of Dimmitt.

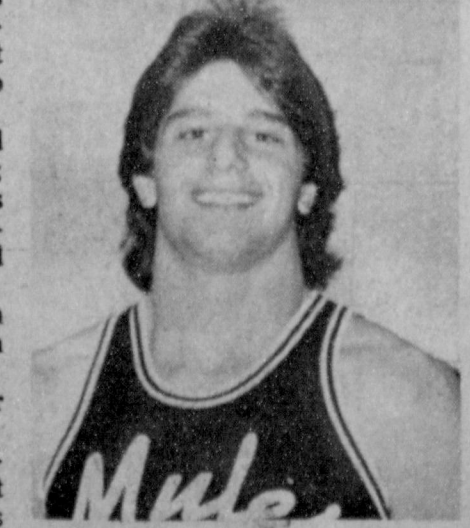
Coach Murray expressed appreciation to the fans who kept up with the Muleshoe Mules this year, and said the team really appreciated it.

# Baptist Group Makes Mission Trip To Mexico

Last month, some 39 men and women from Muleshoe, Sudan, Farwell, Littlefield, Sunnyside, Halfway, Pep, N.M., Dimmitt, Maple, Goodland and Friona, as well as Texico, N.M., went to Ojinaga, Mexico on a mission trip.

Comprised of members of the Llanos Altos Baptist Association, the group made their third trip to Mexico, to work on facilities for Spanish ministers and to conduct Bible studies.

In 1983, the group included 21 men and women who started construction of the men's dormitory and 32 went back in 1984 to complete the dorm area.

This year, the group constructed a roof and ceiling on the sanctuary which had been built adjacent to the dormi-

tories. Slides depicting their trip to Mexico will be shown at 8 p.m. on Friday, March 8 at the First Baptist Church in Sudan for all interested persons.

Starting out their journey from the Trinity Baptist Church in Muleshoe at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, February 3, several obstacles slowed their progress.

First was a ruined tire on the trailer carrying 15,000 pounds of sheetrock and plywood. This was followed by trouble at Plains with the pickup which was pulling the trailer. They had to return to Muleshoe for another vehicle to haul the supplies.

On arriving at Ojinaga after difficulties getting through the Mexican customs, the group

prepared to work. "The men had a lot of difficulty getting the material across," said Buster Kittrell, one of the men who made the trip. "It took much of the next day to get the truck across and start the building. Time and time again, the group saw the hands of God lead His people through every obstacle which stood in the way so the job could be completed."

Following each meal the group held a devotion and singing. The men prepared breakfast each morning, and the women prepared the other meals.

Vacation Bible School was conducted by some of the women for children five months to 17 years of age. On the first day, 30 children attended; this was followed by 79 the next day. On the following day, they decided to have school in the morning, and in the afternoon. In the morning service were 15 children, with 99 attending the afternoon school. Thursday morning, 20 children attended with an additional 104 in the afternoon and on the final day 25 attended the morning session, and 139 children were there for the afternoon session.

Other of the women made curtains for the church building and for the Spanish Ministers Institute, and one of the women taught Mexican ladies how to piece quilts, to crochet and to make pin cushions.

Counseling sessions were conducted for young married couples. The Spanish-speaking men in the group took charge of this portion of the week long mission. Six couples attended, and it was determined that the couples found the sessions very successful.

During the week, the men lifted 35 trusses, each weighing about 500 pounds to the top of a 10 foot wall. They also put on plywood for decking then roofed the building. Others sheetrocked the ceiling inside the sanctuary. Some of the men from Ojinaga started helping with the roof toward the end of the week, said Kittrell.

Daily, members of the United States group visited nearby residents and talked about the Bible and what it says about salvation. Kittrell said the people seemed to be eager to hear the gospel and several

persons decided to accept Christ. He said a total of 81 persons proclaimed their faith in Jesus after the sessions. Interpreters accompanied the persons who were unable to witness in Spanish, according to Kittrell.

Revival services were conducted each night by the people for the Llanos Altos Association and local Mexican people. The services were held in three different churches, plus one meeting in the mission.

Of the 39 persons making the trip, seven were preachers, along with eight Spanish speaking individuals, of whom three were preachers, added Kittrell.

Dedication of Ojinaga Institute was held on Friday afternoon, with Llanos Altos Association and Iglesia Bautista Bethel participating.

Making the trip from Muleshoe were J.R. and Maxine Carter, Buster and Wanda Kittrell, Nick and Pita Manzanarus, Nicky Cruse and B.C. Stonecipher.

From Sudan were Jerry Dodson, Dewey and Rosabel Coldiron, and Bryan Burns and Elsie Seymore. 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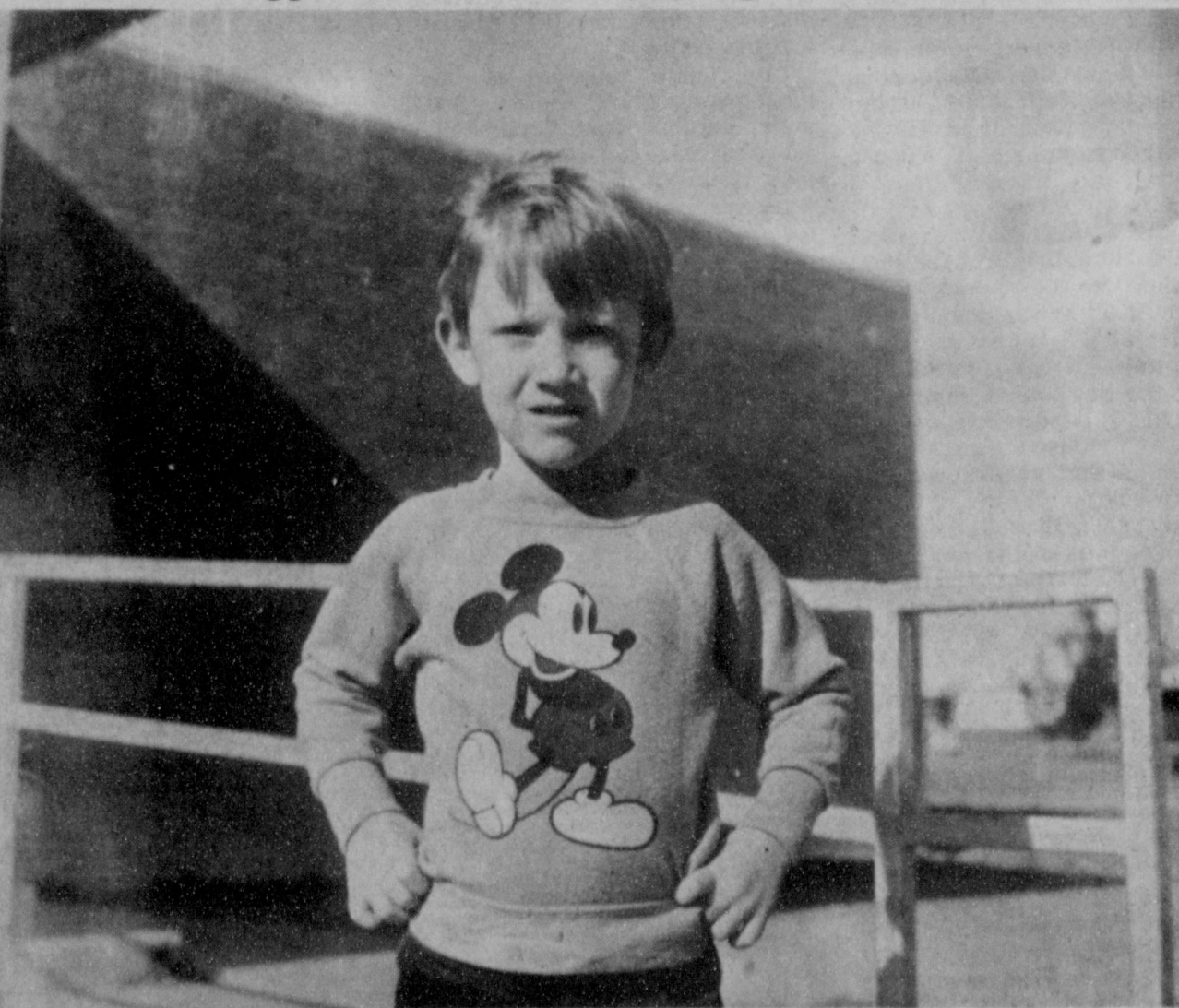

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## Sudan Basketball News

In an auditorium with an estimated 2,000 persons at the Texas Dome Tuesday night the Sudan Hornets bowed out of the State-bound race to their long-standing rival, Nazareth Swiftettes.

Most of the Sudan fans expected it to be a much closer game in the 55-40 loss in the Class IA Area playoff but the fans remain behind the Hornets as a trip to Area play-offs is an accomplishment in itself.

In the opening play, Sharla tipped the ball to Jeannia and with less than a minute into the game, Joann made one from the field and Sharla sank another one before Nazareth hit their first bucket. The Hornets could not hit the bucket for next several plays and Nazareth stole the ball and sank another. With 2:31 showing Sherri intercepted the ball and with a good drive back, missed the bucket. Nazareth rebounded and sank another making the score 10-4.

With the ball passing through all Hornets hands, Joann hit for 2. Sharla stole the ball and with six seconds to go, she sank another for a 10-8 score at the end of the first play period.

With the ball being tossed back and forth among the Hornets, Nazareth intercepted and Susan fouled. Naz. quickly brought the score to 14-8 when Sharla fouled and Nazareth sank a free one for 15-8.

Jeannia recovered the ball and passed it to Joann who got in a jumper for 2. Shawnda fouled and with 6:14 showing, Nazareth hit 2 free ones 17-10. Nazareth fouled and after Shawnda got in one from the floor, the coach questioned the refs on the foul and Shawnda did get 2 fts sinking one 17-15. Nazareth hit again and Jeannia took the rebound and the Hornets had the ball with Nazareth again fouling on Sharla who sank both free ones. Naz. hit again. With four turnovers in less than thirty seconds, Naz took the ball and hits again with Shawnda getting the ball and Joann gets her first foul of the game and Naz sinks one free one.

In the 4th play period, Naz took the ball and instantly sank one for 2 taking a bigger lead 38-27.

Naz got in another free one and fouled on Shawnda who missed. The Swiftettes sank an 18 footer and Sharla got in a good one 41-29. Jeannia fouled and Naz got in both free ones 43-29.

Sherri got in 2 free ones before the Swiftettes hit again 45-31 with 5:11 left in the game. Joann gave Naz two free ones and then they got in two more before fouling on Joann who sank one. 51-32. Naz. again took the ball and hit and with 2:08 left, Sherri sank a good one 53-34.

The Hornets had 15 total fouls and Naz 19. Both teams had 22 rebounds with Shawnda getting 8 of those for the Hornets. Hornets had 5 assists with Sherri and Shawnda two each. Sudan had 13 turnovers while Naz had 9. The Hornets end their season 25-2 losing both of those to Naz, who has won 63 consecutive games and now go on to Regional.

Sharla had 5-3-4-13; Sherri 2-4-1-8; Jeannia 1-3-3-5; Shawnda 1-3-4-5; Joann 4-1-4-9. The Hornets hit 14 out of 23 fts and Naz. hit 13 out of 17.

The Sudan Hornets won Bi-District Friday in an easy win 72-16 over Sundown.

Sharla started the evening off when she tipped off to Shawnda and Jeannia sank the ball with just one half minute into the game. Sherri followed with another in just minutes with Joann sinking another one and Sharla fouled giving Sundown two free ones. Joann quickly sank another one and Sudan fouled again with Sundown making only one count, making the score 8-3.

Sherri hit a jumper and Jeannia rebounded and sank another one. Jeannia fouled and Sharla intercepted the ball and with 1:33 to go in the first quarter, passed it to Shawnda who went full length of the court for another basket. Joann stole ball and with a fast break, sank a nice lay-up making a halftime score of 36-7.

In the 3rd quarter, Shawnda, Sherri, Sharla each hit and

Jeannia hit twice in the first three minutes bringing the score to 46-7. Sudan fouled and Sundown made both free ones.

Shawnda and Sherri each sank another one and Shawnda fouled. Jeannia took the rebound and went full length for 2 bringing the score to 52-9.

Keitha took the ball and passed it to Shawnda who sank another one with Sundown also sinking another 56-13.

Sundown fouled on Shawnda who sank another one and Keitha fouled on Sundown who missed both free attempts and Keitha shot as buzzer sounded no good.

In the 4th, Shawnda sank another one followed by one for Sundown Sharla hit again bringing the score to 61-13. Sundown sank one as did Sharla 63-15. Sudan fouled again and Sundown missed free one--Jeannia took the rebound and Sherri and Sharla each hit the bucket making a score of 67-15 with 3:58 left in the game. Jeannia hit again. 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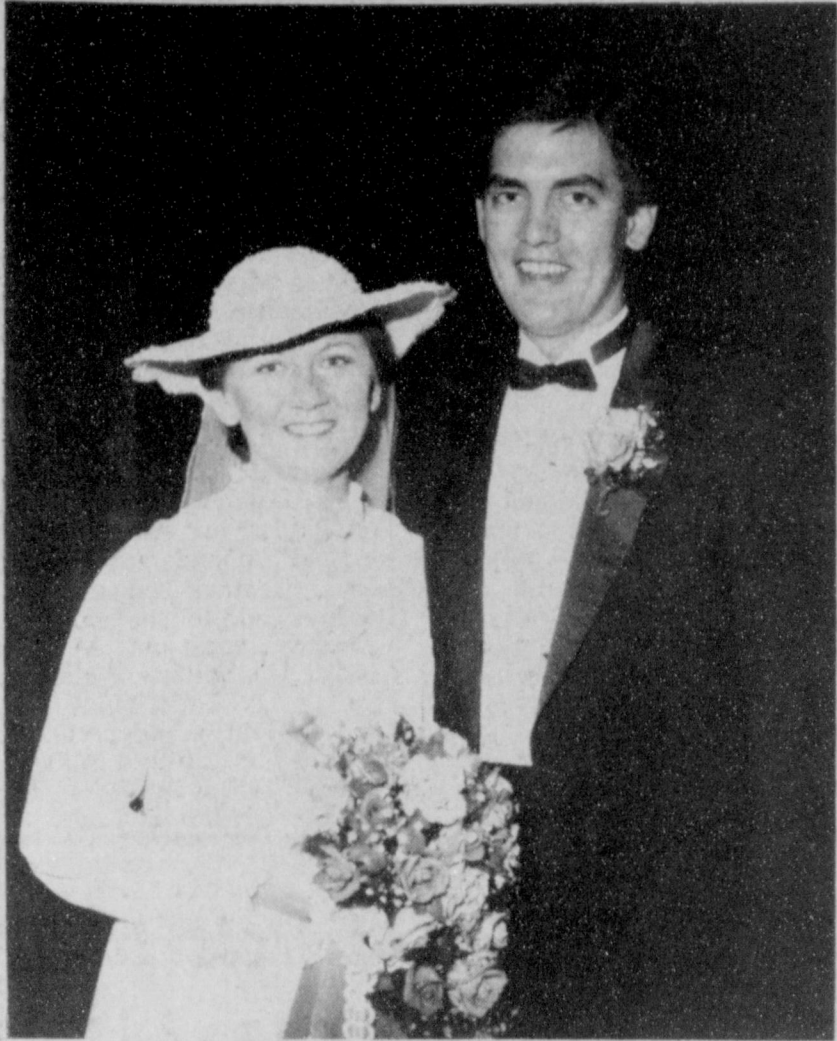
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# Afternoon Ceremony Unites Miss Wachtel, Hooten

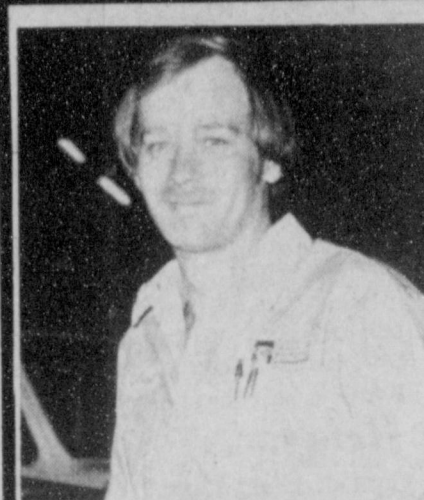

## FmHA New Regulations Expected To Aid Farmers

New Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) regulations allow commercial banks and other lenders to "write down" interest rates for farm borrowers who could not otherwise get a production loan for spring planting, according to Texas FmHA State Director, J. Lynn Futch.

The regulations, published in the Federal Register February 15, are in addition to earlier rule changes which helped lenders make loans to some farm borrowers who were having trouble making payments on their loans.

The earlier changes, announced last September, offered an FmHA guarantee on a portion of the loan if the lender agreed to write off at least ten percent of the principal. The FmHA guarantee is an agreement that the Federal government will make up part of the loss to the lender if the borrower defaults.

Banks and other lenders told FmHA that they could help more farm borrowers if they could write down interest rates instead of, or in combination with, writing off part of the principal. In response to their requests, FmHA made the rule change allowing the interest write down in exchange in lieu of write off. The borrowers loan payments must be the same under this option.

Futch said the new rules will enable many lenders to help some farmers, whose loans are classified as substandard. "Lenders, who feel this Debt Adjustment Program can help, will review loans they now have with farmers who are having trouble repaying. They will determine whether or not the farmer could make payments if the loan is reduced by at least ten percent. If so, the lender can come to FmHA to get our guarantee on part of the remaining debt.

"With the assurance that a large portion of the debt is

guaranteed, the bank or other lender is in a better position to extend credit to farmers for production expenses this spring," Futch added.

"Even this additional assistance will not reach every farmer who is having economic problems. The farmer must be able to show that debt payments can be made within the expected cash flow. To do this, the farmer's expected income from all sources must exceed payments by ten percent. Expenses include debt payments, tax payments, and family living expenses, as well as production.

"With the cooperation of banks, other lenders, and FmHA, many good farmers, who, for reasons beyond their control, are suffering financial stress will be able to continue their operations," Futch added.

The new regulations are being sent from the national office in Washington to the nearly 2,000 local FmHA offices. "Official agency instructions will be sent to local offices, including the 136 offices in Texas as soon as possible," Futch concluded.

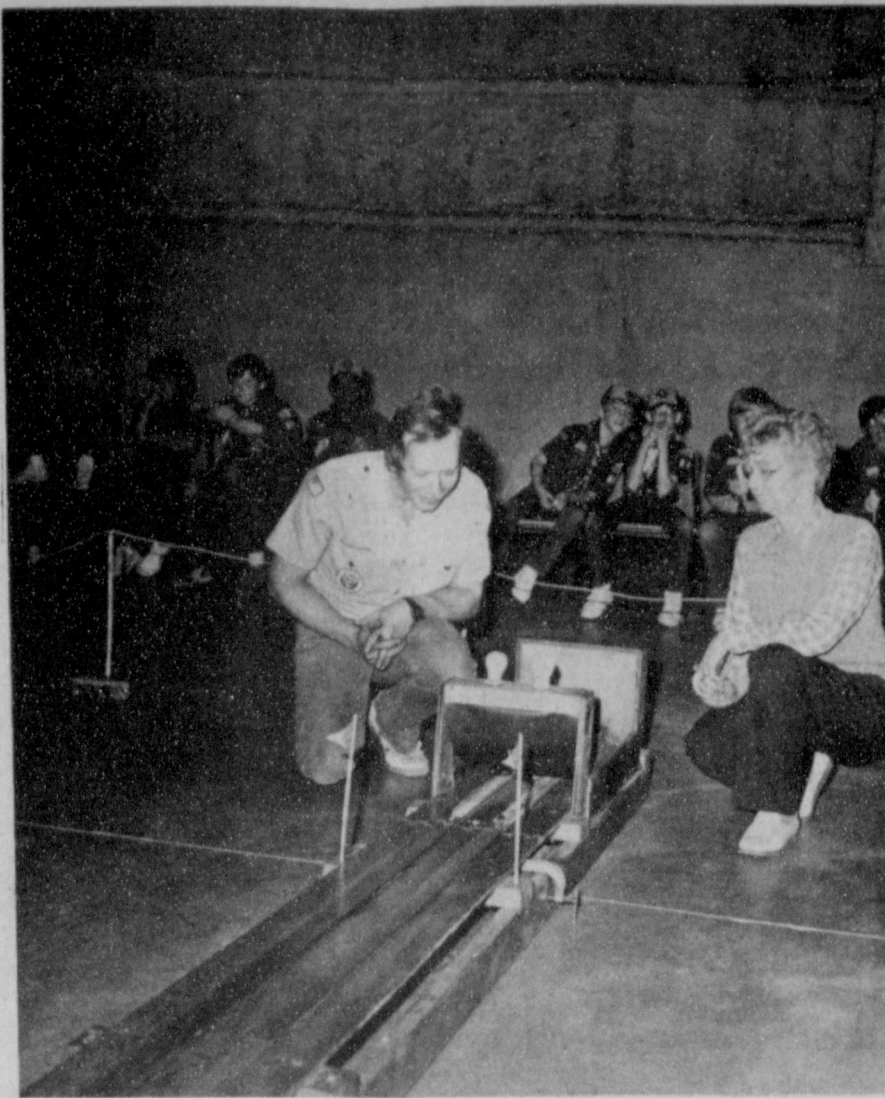

all have seen the results of this. Residue in fields, stubble, stalks, and mulching can greatly reduce erosion. Wind strips and wind breaks are most effective when laid out across prevailing wind direction during the critical erosion period.

On a flat field, a wind strip provides shelter 10 times the height of the barrier. Low tillage operations such as drilling wheat in remaining residue is a good way to control erosion and bring in extra income during the winter months by grazing livestock.

The Soil Conservation Service located at 111 East Avenue D can assist producers in controlling wind erosion on their land.

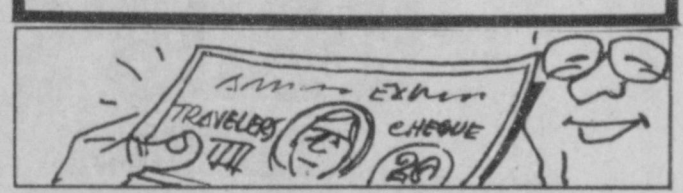

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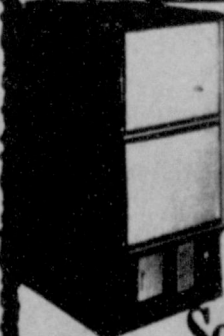
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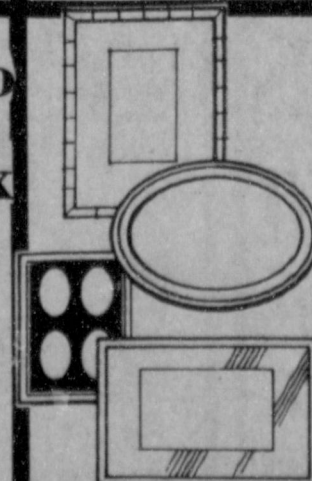
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
