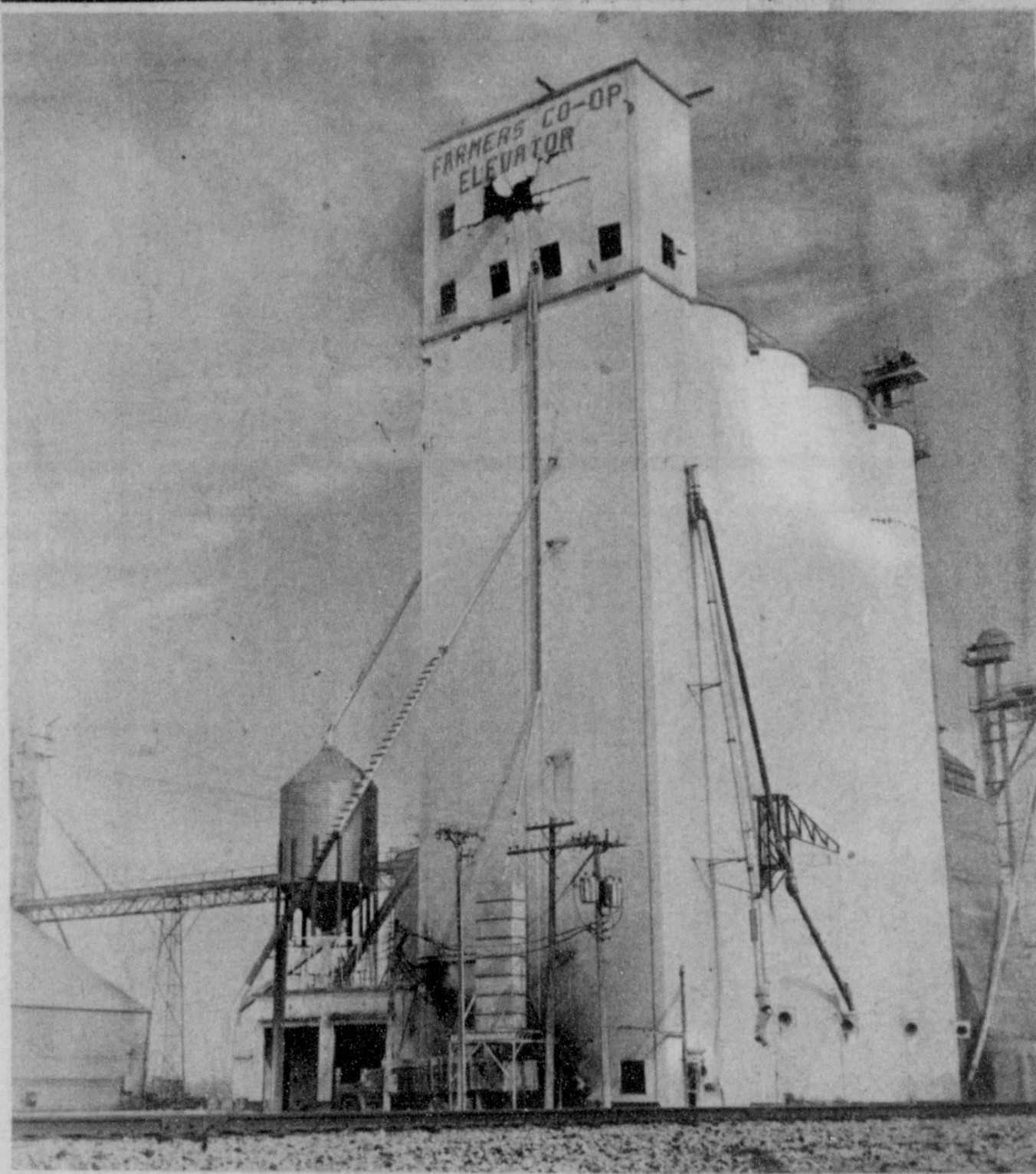

Road Rally Scheduled Saturday

Muleshoe Roadriders' Third Annual Road Rally is scheduled for this Saturday, March 16, in the Bailey County Coliseum. The big day gets underway with registration starting at 7 a.m. and the high point run will begin at 9 a.m. with the last bike out at 11:30 a.m. Bikers will be parading in Muleshoe, with the parade scheduled to get underway at 11 a.m. Connie Haight said the field events, which are the games, get underway at 12 noon with the public encouraged to attend the bike show at 4 p.m. Mrs. Haight said the evening meal will be served at 6 p.m. to the more than 300 participants expected for the all-day event. She said drawings will be held all day to present merchandise to the registrants.

"This is what firemen have nightmares about," commented one member of the Muleshoe Fire Department Tuesday afternoon, as he surveyed smoke pouring from Farmers Co-op Elevator. An explosion, followed by billowing flames, erupted from the elevator at approximately 3:50 p.m. on Tuesday. Force of the explosion blew bits of concrete and glass more than two blocks away, showering them onto the tops of businesses, according to witnesses. A Sudan fireman, who was drinking coffee at the Pizza Hut, some two blocks from the explosion site, said concrete and glass peppered down onto the roof of the restaurant, as well as adjacent businesses. Firemen were summoned immediately, and on arrival, started fighting the fire in the lower part of the header house. It was noted that the west side of the header house had blown out on both the west and east sides. Also, the north side of the lift portion of the header house had blown out, spewing debris over a wide area.

Defensive Driving Course Slated Here Next Week

In an effort to help hard-pressed drivers, who find insurance rates skyrocketing in many cases, the Bailey County Farm Bureau has come up with a way to help with insurance costs. Next Monday and Tuesday, March 18-19, Bailey County Farm Bureau will sponsor a Defensive Driving Course from 6-10 p.m. in the Neal Dillman Elementary School cafeteria.

Any licensed driver may take the course, and when successfully completed by the principal driver of a private vehicle, a 10 percent savings on vehicle insurance results. Only the principal driver is required to take the course where one vehicle is operated, but, it MUST be the principal driver in order to take advantage of the 10 percent savings on insurance. Car - Motorcycle Wreck Injures Two Local Men

Two local young men and a man from Lubbock were injured at approximately 7:15 p.m. Sunday east of Muleshoe on Highway 70 in a car-motorcycle accident.

was the driver of the car, Cory J. Haggard of Lubbock. He is being treated for slight head injuries received in the accident.

At presstime, Kevin Dudley, 21, was reported to be in critical, but 'stable' condition in the intensive care unit of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he was taken following the accident.

DPS Trooper Lacie Kirk, who investigated the accident, said both vehicles were eastbound, and Haggard was beginning a left turn when the accident occurred near the center stripe in the west bound lanes. The motorcycle hit the driver's side of the car, with both occupants of the motorcycle being thrown from their cycle, which went partially under the car. Kirk said he was uncertain who was driving the motorcycle at the time of the accident, and said the investigation is continuing. A young Tennessee couple, passengers in the car, were uninjured.

Dudley had surgery on a broken leg, and still faces surgery on his jaw and face. Also a patient in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock is Robbie Vaughan, who is being treated for a broken leg and a broken shoulder. He was moved to a private room. Alcohol Abuse Number One Problem, Says ENMU Speaker

More than 35 people were in the courtroom at the Bailey County Courthouse last Friday night to hear Dr. Erick Jolly from Eastern New Mexico

University speak on alcohol problems. The program was sponsored by CASA (Citizens Against Substance Abuse.)

The speaker explained that although people become very sick when they are withdrawing from other drugs, withdrawal from alcohol can actually cause death, and must be handled properly. In discussing why people drink, it all seemed to boil down mostly to get the buzz-the effect; as a social activity-because friends do it; to change moods and for the taste. Also, alcohol is legal; it is available; effective; cheap; tranquilizing; and the dosage

Dr. Jolly said alcohol is the most common drug problem in any town, any size. He said alcohol is responsible for 50 percent of all auto accidents; more than 50 percent of adults who die in hospitals die from alcohol related deaths; it account for 40 percent of all assaults; and in Muleshoe alone, accounted for 89 percent of the reported violent crimes. It also accounts for 30 percent of all suicides and figures in 40 percent of the murders.

According to Dr. Jolly, although most people think of alcohol as a stimulant, it is actually a depressant. Also, he said coffee will not sober up a drunk person, it just makes an alert drunk. It does not give better coordination, and mixing drinks does not make a person more drunk, it just gives a person more of a hangover. Impurities in alcohol cause hangovers, cautioned Dr. Jolly, as alcohol is the most impure of all drugs. He said beer has both cyanide and arsenic with Everclear being the only pure alcohol available.

1984 Assault Prompts Lawsuit Filed At Lubbock
Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr said Monday afternoon the city had been served no papers, nor had they formally been notified of a suit filed against the City of Muleshoe and the city street superintendent, in federal court in Lubbock. Marr said that often in the case of a suit, the city would not be served for a week or more after it had been filed in Lubbock, and that he could not comment on a suit he had no personal knowledge of. According to the Saturday, March 9 edition of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal: "A couple is suing the city of Muleshoe and a city official for an alleged assault they claim the city covered up.

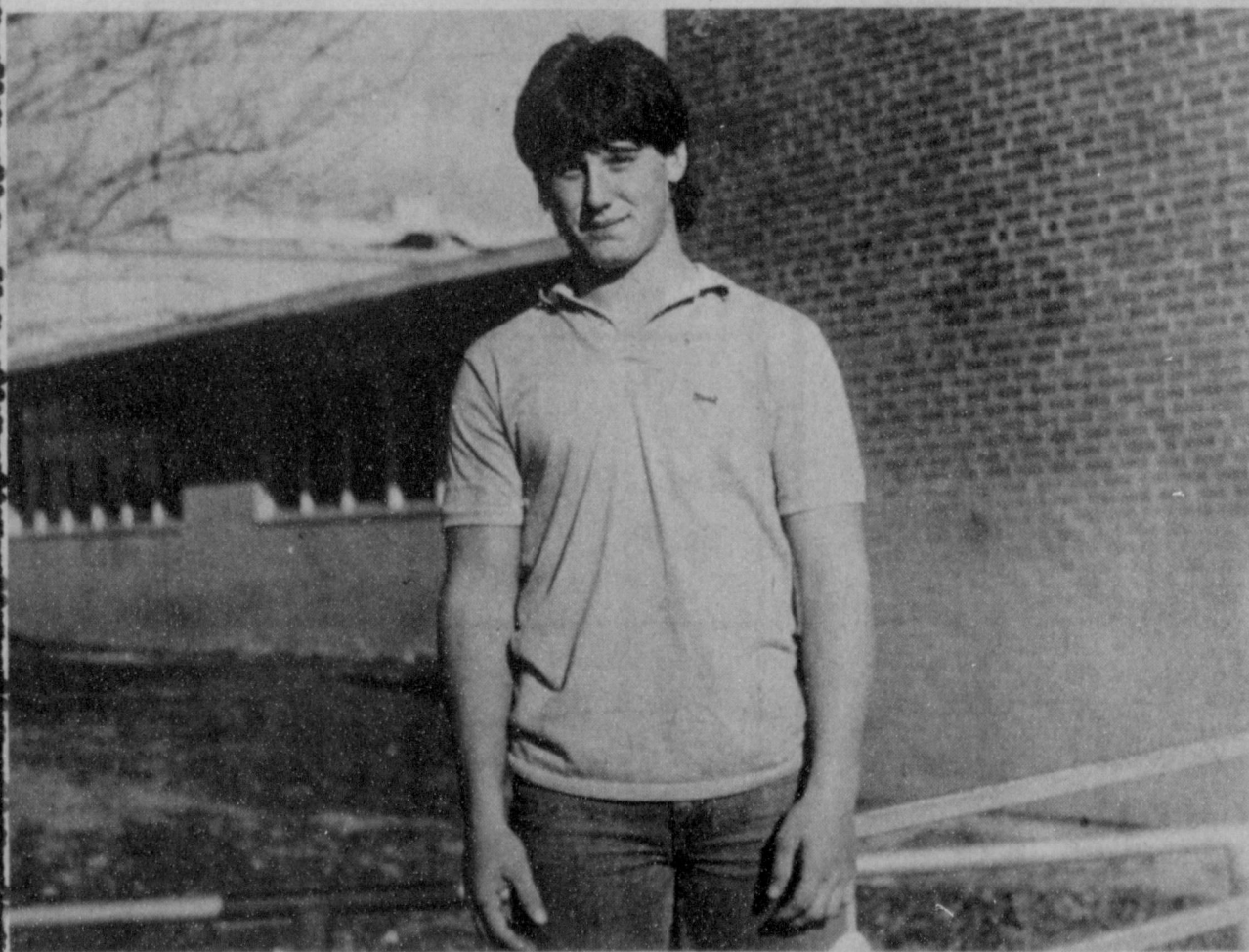

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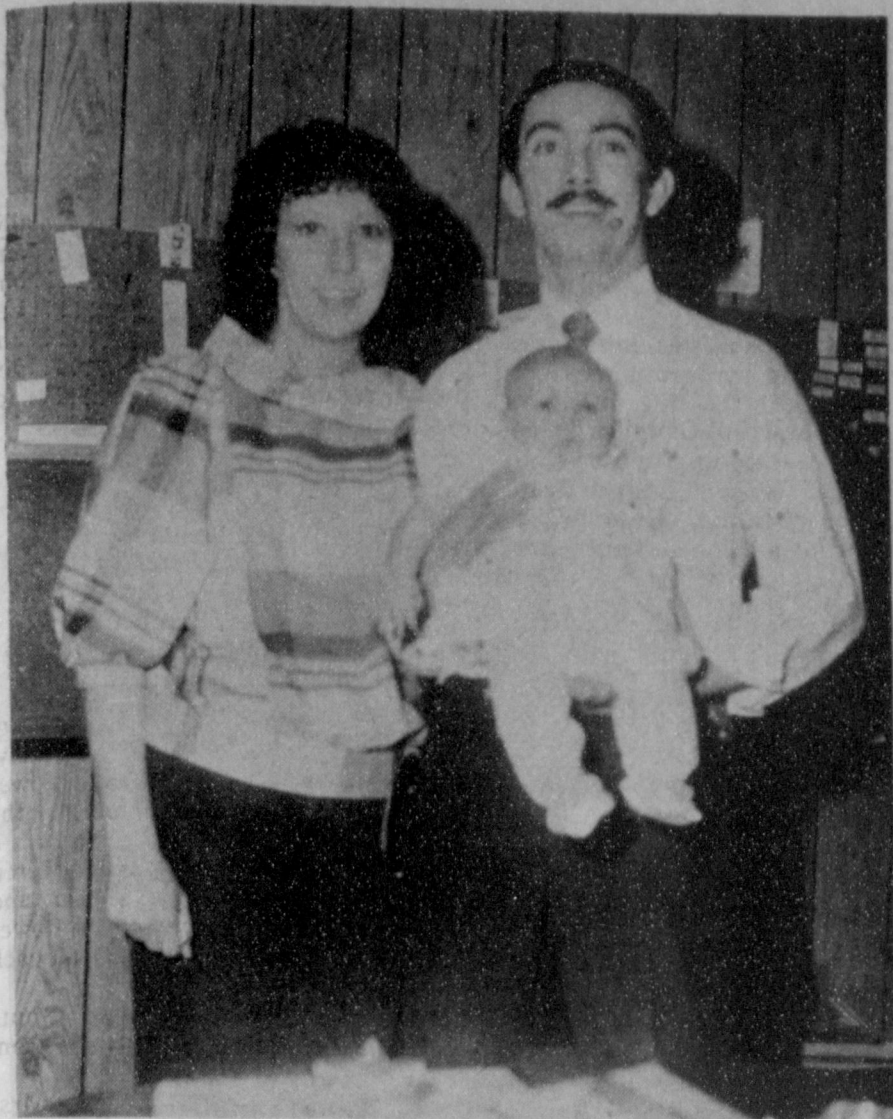

Buyers Can Cancel Door-To-Door Purchases

A new set of pots and pans, a Bible, burglar alarm or family photo album may seem like a good idea when a salesperson brings them to your door.

But what if you decide you don't want or can't afford the merchandise you buy from a door-to-door salesperson? You can cancel your order if you don't delay, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service consumer economics specialist.

A Federal Trade Commission (FTC) ruling allows a three-day "cooling off" period to cancel if the purchase is \$25 or more, says Bonnie L. Piernot. This rule applies only to door-to-door sales and not in in-store sales.

"The salesperson must provide a fully completed contract including the date of the sale, name and address of the seller, and a statement in large business type explaining the right to cancel within three days by written notice," she advises.

"The salesperson must also give you two copies of a separate "notice of cancellation" form, Piernot says. Then when you want to cancel the sale, simply send the notice by certified mail with return receipt requested so you can prove you canceled it."

The specialist points out that the contract and notice must be

in the same language the salesperson uses in the sales pitch. If the sale was made in Spanish, for example, then the contract-notice must be in Spanish.

If you have made payment, the seller must refund the money within 10 business days of receiving your cancellation notice, Piernot says. And after canceling the sale, you must have the merchandise--in the same condition that you received it--available for the for the salesperson to pick up at your home.

If you agree to ship the item back, the seller must pay the shipping costs. But if the merchandise is not picked up within 20 days, you may keep the goods without obligation," she says.

Piernot emphasizes that the rules does not cover total sales under \$25, sales of insurance and securities, sales of telephone orders and sales made entirely by mail.

How Much Salt In Snack Foods

If you like to munch on chips or other salty snacks, you may want to know exactly how much sodium you're getting.

Some manufacturers list sodium amounts in milligrams per serving on food labels, but they are not required to do so, says Texas A&M University Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten.

However, a recent study of 15 popular national brand snack foods, reported in the Journal of Food Science, provides some information on their sodium content, she says.

Researchers determined the average amount of salt in 100 grams -- or about 3 1/2 ounces -- of the snack. A typical single serving size bag of chips contains one to two ounces.

Of the products tested, pretzel twists had the most sodium with 2370 milligrams per serving. But saltines with 1794 milligrams, puff balls with 1190 milligrams and some corn-based snacks with 1014 milligrams are also high in sodium, she notes.

By comparison, Sweeten says that 1100 to 3300 milligrams of sodium is the recommended amount for daily intake.

"Even one serving of these snacks, assuming you can eat just one, provides a substantial amount of the day's allotment for sodium," says the nutritionist.

"Obviously, the salt content of different brands can vary, and the quantity of salt you eat depends on how much and how often you eat these snacks," Sweeten maintains.

She also explains that the researchers found a wide range of sodium levels within some of the individual products they tested, and snacks made by regional and local companies were not tested at all.

Salt, or more correctly sodium (salt is 40 percent sodium), is important to the body, says the nutritionist. However, excessive salt in the diet has been linked with hypertension, or high blood pressure. High blood pressure, in turn, may lead to heart or kidney disease or stroke.

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Transplant Patient Is Progressing 'Well'

Two-year-old Jaimie Newsom, a Tahoka native -- is in fair condition after undergoing liver transplant surgery at Children's Medical Center of Dallas.

After Jaimie had his 12 and one half hour surgery at Children's Medical Center on March 2, he was transferred to the Intensive Care Unit where he remained in critical, but stable condition. On March 6, he was transferred to a private hospital room, where he now is listed in fair condition.

Several months ago, The Storey Brothers group, "Gentle Country," held a special benefit in Muleshoe to help raise funds for Jaimie's surgery, which is expected to cost well in excess of \$100,000. Currently, funds

for Jaimie Newsom are still being accepted at both banks in Muleshoe.

According to Walter Andrews, M.D., director of the Pediatric Transplant Program and head surgeon of the transplant team, Jaimie's surgery went well and he is making "excellent progress."

"Jaimie is eating a solid diet, he is active and in good spirits," Andrews said. "At this point, his recovery is going very smoothly."

Like all liver transplant patients, Jaimie is receiving cyclosporine, an anti-rejection drug that he needs to take the rest of his life.

Jaimie was born with Alagille's Syndrome, a genetic disorder that leads to cirrhosis of the liver. In the more severe cases of Alagille's, liver transplant is the only successful treatment method.

The average hospital stay for a pediatric liver transplant patient is 60 days. After being released from the hospital, these patients return to Children's for physical exams and tests on an outpatient basis. But other than the cyclosporine treatments (which can be taken at home, orally), liver transplant patients can live normal, active lives like other children their age.

Jaimie, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Newsom, is the ninth liver transplant patient at Children's since the program began in September of 1984.

can be regulated.

Epileptic seizures and D.T.'s (delirium tremens) are two of the physical effects of alcohol abuse, says Dr. Jolly.

He discounted that alcohol is beneficial for some illnesses, saying, "There is no disease for which alcohol is the best available drug."

He also said that alcohol has become a problem when it has control over your life.

The speaker said alcohol troubled persons need treatment for alcohol when alcohol decreases the quality of their life; affects the individual and his family socially, financially, emotionally and physically.

Dr. Jolly also said that every often, when parents deny a child has a problem with alcohol, it is because the parent is also involved with alcohol. "If we don't have clean houses," commented the ENMU professor and counselor, "We don't have clean schools."

He suggested that parents think about cleaning up the alcohol problem in their life, if they have one, and check to see what effect it may be having on their own children.

Several persons stayed after the meeting to visit more with Dr. Jolly.

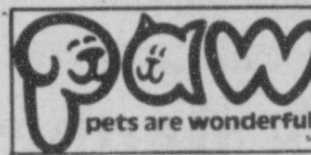

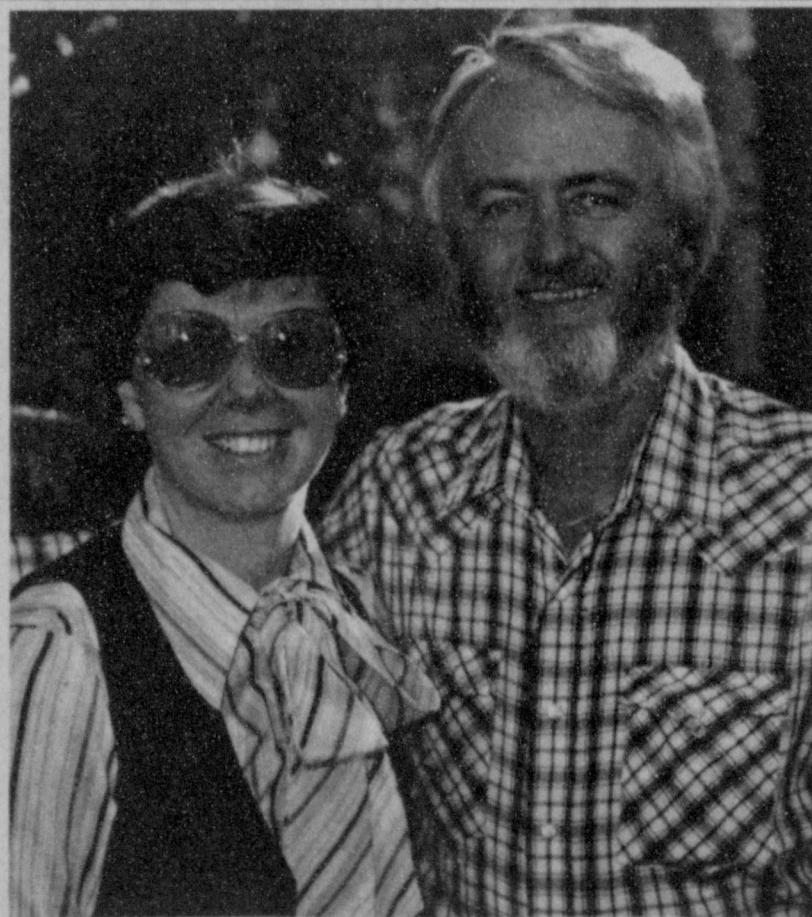

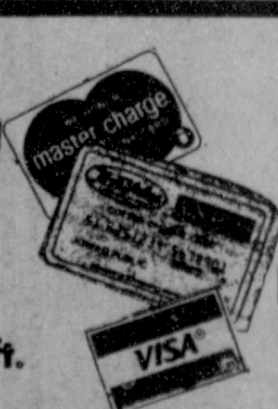
