The city is over-run with pick pockets; these scoundrels have followed in the wake of the railroad and in many cases work on construction a few days at a time to give themselves the appearance of laborers. They watch around saloons for victims and rarely fail when a victim appears.

A report reached the city yesterday afternoon through a Mexican boy that two women had been murdered somewhere in the vicinity of the third mission. Deputy Sheriff Joe Smith was sent down to the locality by Sheriff McGill with instructions to locate all he could, and if necessary make arrests.

The authorities will sit all responsible when it is known that the beating was done by railroad men, and the fellow would have been killed had not persons belonging to the saloon interfered.

OUR FURNITURE EXAMINATION

Synopsis of the Evidence taken before U. S. Commissioner Roberts.

Thomas Booker, colored, a witness for the defense, being called and duly sworn, said: My name is Thomas Booker. I am 24 years old, and a native of the San Antonio postoffice. I know W. B. Alexander, and have known him ever since I was a boy. I know his general character for truth and honesty in this community. To the best of my knowledge it is true. From what I know of his general character, I would not believe under oath.

Being cross-examined, Booker said: I have heard so many talk of Alexander's character that I never made any note of it. This was mostly among the colored people. George Howell, now a partner in the Jewell saloon, is one of the parties that I heard speak of Alexander's character. I can remember any more in the city. I can remember three or four out of the city. I am occupying the place that Alexander formerly occupied. George Howell told me of his stealing and his lying, but I did not remember exactly his words. I did not know what was going on there until before I came up here. Lots of people stopped me on the street and asked me about the case. No one talked to me about my testifying in this case except the officer who served the subpoenas on me. Mr. Manning told me that I was subpoenaed and that I had to go to court. He did not say anything else. Mr. Breeman also told me that I was subpoenaed. That is all that I heard of it. I do not know what he was going to ask me. Mr. Manning asked me some time ago about William Alexander, and I told him that I knew him. I never told anybody else about the case. I would not believe William Alexander on oath. I have not talked to Mr. Manning or to any other person about the case. I did not know what questions would be asked me before I came up here.

Louis Dreyfus testified to the unreliability of the witness Alexander. Charles E. Norris, for the defense, said: I have been connected with the San Antonio postoffice three years, more or less. I think it was about this time four years ago that I commenced work there. Mrs. Norris was present at that time. I left the postoffice on the 1st of June, 1879. Mr. J. C. Manning was postmaster at that time. I know W. B. Alexander from the time he came to San Antonio. I was there when Alexander left the postoffice, but I could not state the date. I know why Alexander left the postoffice. On the 1st of June, 1879, Alexander claimed Mr. Manning had not paid him on his salary for one month or quarter. He claimed that he was entitled to the 14th day of May, 1880. I did not tell Alexander that I had signed the payroll for more money than I received. I did not tell him that I was the postmaster for the first quarter of 1880. On the 14th day of May I was called into the office by Mr. Manning and Mr. W. B. Alexander. Mr. Manning claimed that he had paid Alexander for the first quarter of 1880. My recollection is that Mr. Manning told him that he would not pay him the \$10, but that he was standing in line. He did not offer any inducement to make an affidavit against Mr. Manning, but there was a proposition made to me to sign an affidavit against Mr. Manning, and I refused to do so. I should have the best situation in the postoffice in San Antonio. This proposition was made to me recently. I don't remember the exact time. There was no other inducement offered me. No names were given. The party remarked that the witness would improve the position. I was then asked who the party was, but he hesitated, saying he did not want to get himself into trouble. Finally, however, he gave the name W. B. Alexander. Mr. Alexander made the proposition to me. Cross examined: A portion of the last quarter of 1879 was not paid for the first quarter of 1880. I was there as well as I can remember two months, lacking five days, and received \$250. I was registered letter clerk, and getting the money for the first quarter of the first quarter of 1881. I think I got \$60 per month. I got back some money on account of sickness. Mr. Manning asked me to sign an affidavit against Mr. Manning, and I refused to do so. I was paid for the five months, as I was sick, and he did not pay me for the first quarter of 1880. I received the \$250—what I signed for. When Mr. Sims made the proposition to me, I was at the Green Front. My occupation at that time was dealing money in the Green Front, a public gambling house. I did not see any colored people there. I had character of Alexander for truth and veracity, and declared that he would not believe him on oath.

The court adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning.

Dr. Hays Addressed the school teachers—Resolution of Thanks. The teachers of the city public schools assembled Thursday morning to listen to an address from Dr. Hays. He congratulated the teachers upon having so good a superintendent, the superintendent upon having a corps of earnest and efficient teachers, and the city upon having a teacher of high public education, which he said, was not surpassed in any city in the world.

Our town remains for the present incorporated. The vote stood 72 against and forty-five for the incorporation. It is in all respects the best thing that has happened to our town, much of which would have been avoided if Sheriff Night could have been removed, or if his bond had been forfeited and not gone for nothing.
