Rotary Hears Speaker On New Sunflower Seed

Child Abuse Week Set By Mayor

Texas Governor Mark White has proclaimed April 1985 as Child Abuse Prevention Month. Child abuse and neglect are tragic problems which may afflict as many as 10 percent of all children in Texas and actually resulted in more than 60,000 children being placed under protective services last year said Tom Bond, president of the Bailey County Child Welfare Board.

Child abuse and neglect not only cause immediate human pain, but also costs society by preventing children from adequately reaping the benefits of our education system, by contributing to problems of crime and incarceration, by causing victims to lack the self-esteem they need to successfully function as adults and by perpetuating themselves from one generation to another, he added.

There are numerous organizations in Texas providing and promoting services to assure the fundamental rights of all children which include the right to safe and nurturing family relationships, he reminded. Bailey County has a child welfare board. It is the purpose of the board to represent a community in developing child welfare and child protective services.

Thousands of children in Texas are abused physically, sexually, or emotionally each year. Child abuse reports can be made through a free HOTLINE by calling 1-800-252-5400. A caller can remain anonymous.

Muleshoe Rotary Club had several guests Tuesday, including the speaker, Jerry Monk from Kelley Green Seeds at Farwell, who spoke on Sunflowers, and the new strain of Sunflower seed now available.

After being introduced by Lucky Spurlock, who was in charge of the program, Monk showed slides about the new strain of Sunflowers and explained that the former Protein Processors had been obtained for a receiving and shipping point for the sunflower seeds.

He explained that Kelley Green Seeds would be a transfer point, but the main receiving area would be the Protein Processors plant location east of Muleshoe on Highway 84.

According to Monk, the new seed, Trisum is a high oleic sunflower with a greater shelf life than any sunflower seed in the past, and will be highly marketable.

He said, "Sunflower oil is excellent for both home use and the commercial frying industry. A highly desired cooking oil,

sunflower oil has no distinctive flavor and thus the natural flavor of foods are preserved. Sun flower oil has a high smoke point, and does not give off odors when heated to high cooking temperatures."

Also, the new sunflower oil produced has created the opportunity for even more possibilities when marketing, than just the deep-frying industry, he continued.

Possibilities include cosmetic and pharmaceutical products; chemical intermediates; plastics and plasterizers; textile softeners and lubricants; emulsifiers; metal working; petrol-

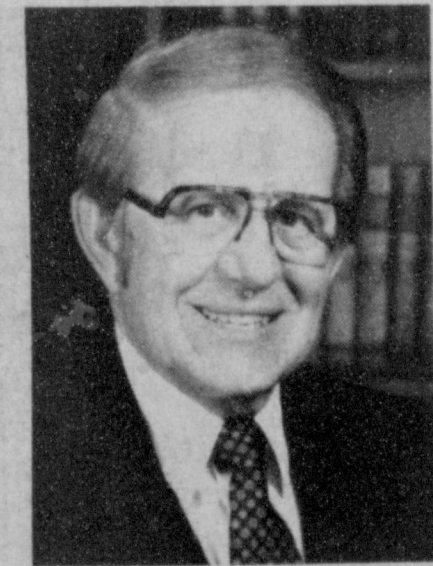

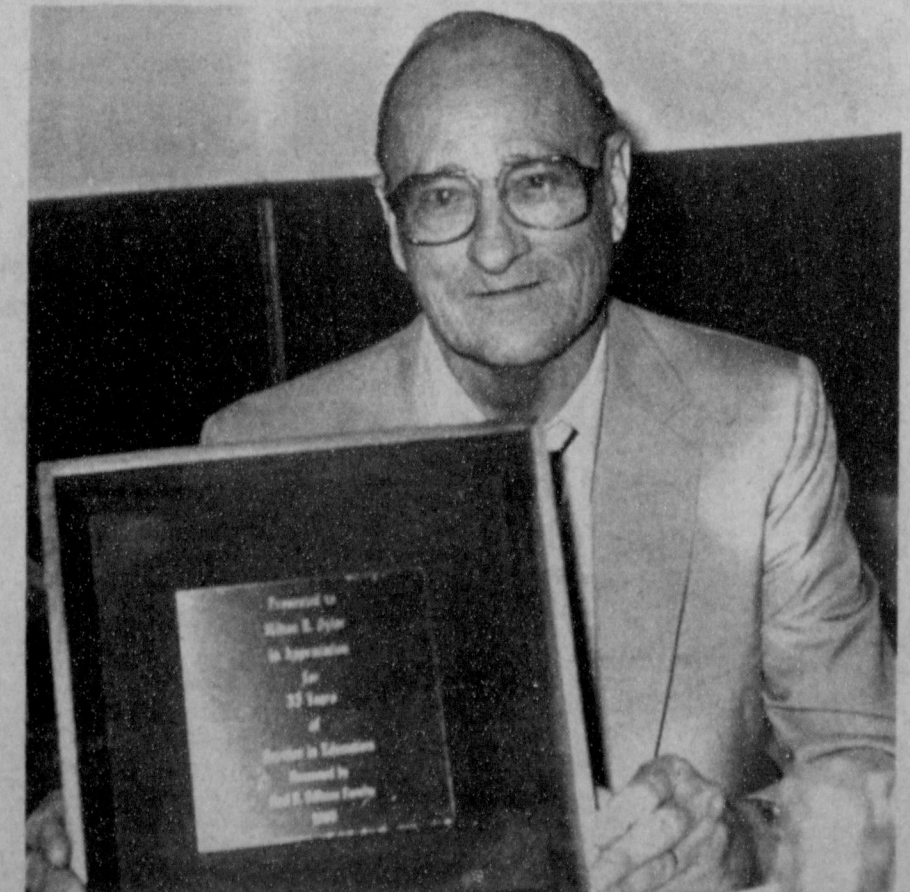
First Baptist Set Revival For Next Week

Varsity Track Continuing Winning Ways; 1st Again

Last weekend, the Muleshoe Mules track team earned their fourth track championship by taking the 3-A division trophy at the American Petroleum Insti-

tute Relays held on the campus of South Plains College in Levelland. The Mules were co-champions with Frenship High School, with both schools scoring 100 points each.

Rain delayed the meet for one day as storms on Friday prevented the preliminary races and most of the field events. The meet was re-scheduled to be run on Saturday with all heats timed and winners were determined by best times.

Several members of the Muleshoe team set personal records. David Medlin set two personal best in the 3200-1600 meter runs. John Isaac and Mark Moton ran best times in the 400 meter run. Both of these young men are members of the 1600 meter relay team which ran a year's best at 3:25.1. The two additional members of this team are Ronnie Logsdon and Tony Luna. Ronnie set his best mark of the year in the 800 meters. Eddie Perez and Chris Johnson got their best times of the year in 300 meter hurdles. Rudy Flores

had personal records in the 3200 and 1600 meter runs.

First place finishers included Mark Moton in the 400 meter dash at 49.9; Tony Luna in both the 3200 meter run at 9:49.90 and the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:43.90; Ronnie Logsdon in the 800 meter run at 2:00.01 and the one mile relay team of Ronnie Logsdon, John Isaac, Tony Luna and Mark Moton at 3:25.1.

Finishing in second place were David Medlin in both the 3200 meter run with 10:00.91 and the 1600 meter run with 4:44.90; John Isaac in the 400 meter dash at 51:70 and Norman Perez in the 800 meter run at 2:05.90.

Rudy Flores had two fourth place finishes, in the 1600 meter run at 5:03.00 and the 3200 meter run with 10:42.83. Eddie Perez had a fifth place win in the 300 meter hurdles with 41.95.

The track team will compete in the district track meet in Floydada this Saturday, beginning at 9 a.m.

Track coaches believe that six to eight members of the team have very good chances of qualifying for the regional meet, in seven different events.

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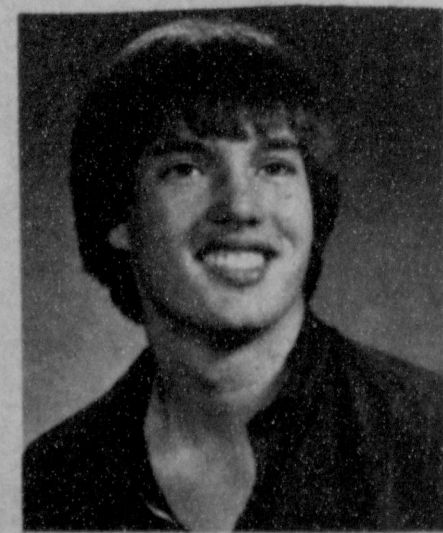
Brett Stegall Three Way's All-District

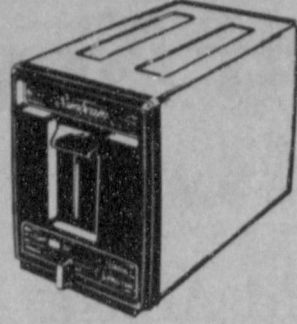
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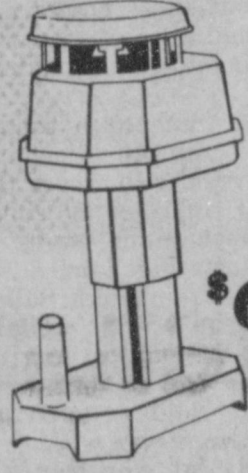
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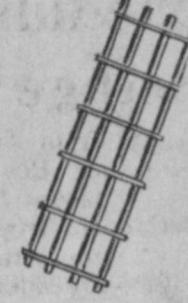


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4-Hers To Spend

Stint Abroad

Three Texas 4-H members will be embarking for six months of international living in June as part of the International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) Program.

The young people and their assignments are Duane Ehrhardt of Spring (Germany), Janet Boyd of Throckmorton (Portugal), and Clay Hamilton of Nacogdoches (Norway).

As IFYE representatives, these young people will spend six months living with host families, says Dan James, 4-H specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. In addition, many will work with youth programs to improve their language skills and pursue special interests.

The IFYE program offers a unique opportunity for 4-Hers to travel and live abroad and to gain a better understanding of customs and languages in other countries, James points out. This group of young people will then return to their communities to relate their experiences and to help bring about a better understanding of different cultures.

Herb Pills Can Be Dangerous

Herbs will add flavor and variety to meals. But herb pills and formulas are not special remedies for nutrition or health problems, and may be dangerous, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Herbal remedies have been touted as good for any number of problems from arthritis to obesity, says Mark K. Sweeten. Often sold in health food stores or by people who sell vitamins out of their homes, they are claimed to be "natural" formulas.

"If these formulas contained nothing but herbs, they would probably be harmless, so consumers would simply be spending their money for diet aids which have no nutritional value," she maintains.

However, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently recalled an herb pill supplement

product because it contained three powerful drugs in potentially dangerous doses, although the label listed only herbs as ingredients.

According to Sweeten, the government analysis revealed that each herbal pill contained an arthritis drug, a potent diuretic and a tranquilizer. The label suggested taking only 4 pills each day, but the product directions proposed 12 daily pills as the upper limit.

Since it may take some time to recall the outstanding supply of this herb pill supplement, the nutritionist advises consulting a physician before taking any herbal remedies or any other diet supplement.

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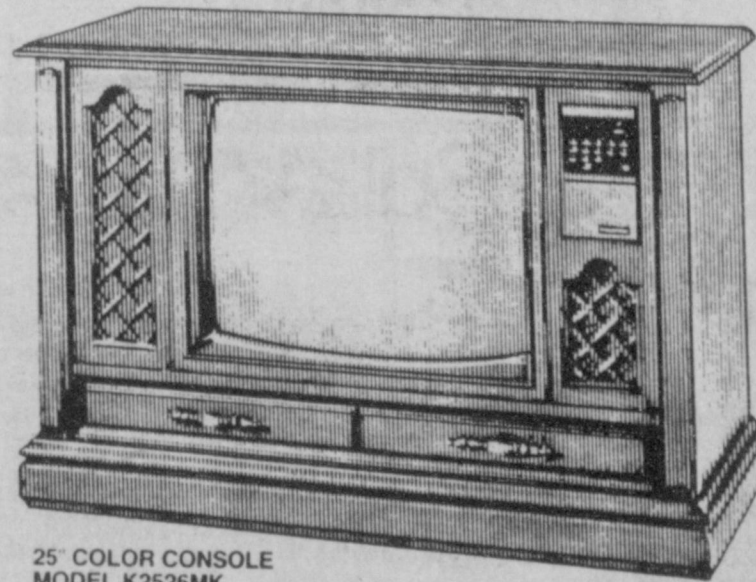
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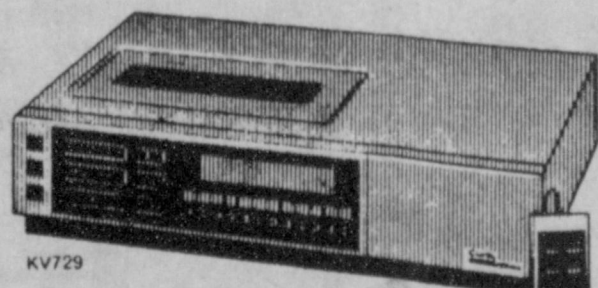
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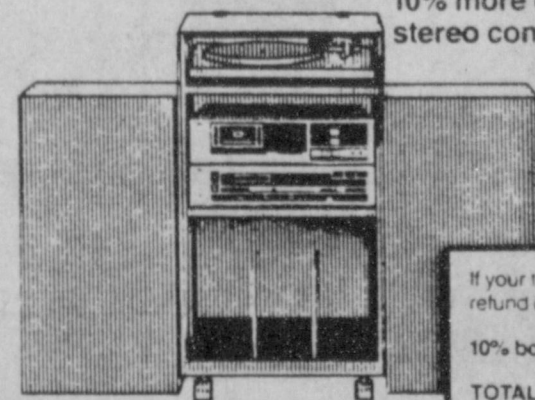

Good Buys In Protein Foods

Some of the best buys in meat, according to the latest survey by the U.S. Department of Agricultural (USDA), are beef liver, ground beef, chicken, turkey, ground chuck and pork shoulder.

The economy of a cut depends on the amount of cooked lean meat or the number of servings it provides, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

"Meat cuts that are relatively high priced and have little or no waste may be more economical than low-priced cuts with a great deal of bone, gristle or fat," she explains.

The USDA study also compared the costs of 20 grams of protein from different meats and alternates, Cooksey reports.

Some meat alternates, such as peanut butter and eggs, are as good a buy as less expensive cuts of meat. Some processed meat products, such as franks

and bologna, were found to cost more as sources of protein than pork roasts and some beef roasts.

But many meat alternates and meat products require you to eat more than you normally would to get the same amount of protein, advises the nutritionist.

For example, a 3-ounce serving of cooked lean meat, poultry or fish provides about 20 grams of protein or more. But it takes four and one-half tablespoons of peanut butter, four frankfurters or 10 slices of bacon to provide that same 20 grams of protein, she says.

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

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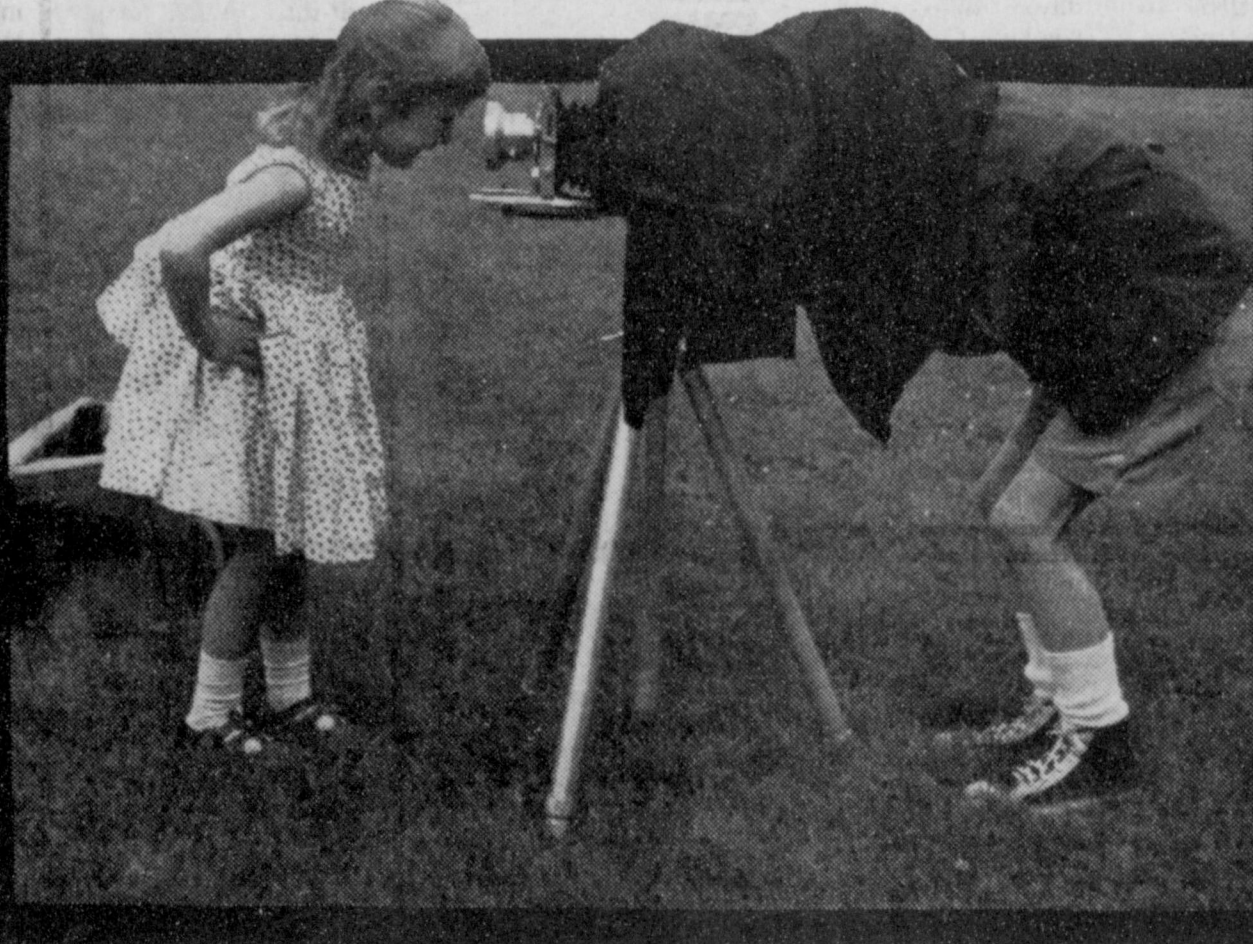
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"I DON'T SEE ANYTHING"

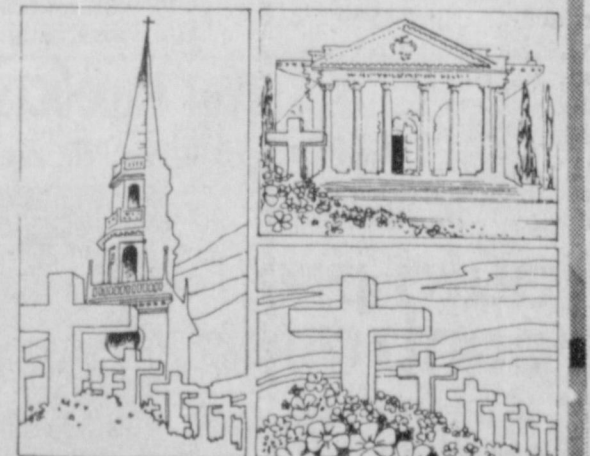
