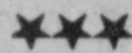

Independence Day Celebration Plans Started

Although July 4 is more than a month away, plans are currently underway for a fun and activity filled day. The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is planning the "traditional" celebration with a few new twists for 1985, according to Toni Eagle, CofC manager.

The day will begin early with a two-mile 10-K run for all runners. Activities around the Bailey County Civic Center will begin at 10 a.m. and continue until 2 p.m. including kid's contests, booths, entertainment, a golf tournament, water polo, adult contests and the World Champion Muleshoe Pitching contest.

A parade will be held at 5 p.m. through downtown Muleshoe and this year's theme will be "Freedom Fireworks." Entertainment, the 4-H barbecue and a community picnic will be held in the city park beginning at 6 p.m. and ending the day will be the fireworks display around 10 p.m.

Entries for the runs, booth space, parade and contests can be obtained through the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture office at 215 South First.

Monday afternoon, Memorial Day, more than 100 persons were in and around the community building, as they signed up, filled out forms, and were photographed to possibly be chosen to appear in the commercial to be shown in the Houston Area, and everywhere Blue Bell Ice Cream is sold.

School Reunion Will Highlight '24-'35 Classes

Two classes from Muleshoe High School will be specially recognized during a class reunion here on July 6. The first class due for special recognition will be the class of 1924, Muleshoe's first graduating class and the class of 1935, who will be celebrating their 50th anniversary.

A registration fee for the meeting, including registration, mixer, business meeting, banquet and dance, is \$10 per person and anyone planning to attend is asked to mail their registration fee by June 15 to James Glaze, Drawer A, Muleshoe, Tx 79347.

Getting underway at 5 p.m., all events will be held at the Bailey County Civic Center, and all graduating classes are encouraged to attend, not only the reunion, but come in a couple of days early and attend the July 4th activities.

According to the film company, the Happy segment, will be because the Happy residents are "not happy," because they do not have Blue Bell Ice Cream; the Needmore residents "needmore ice cream, because they do not have Blue Bell Ice Cream;" while Paradise is "in Paradise, because they DO have Blue Bell Ice Cream."

Each of the three communities will be featured eight to ten seconds in the commercial, which will have all three communities in the same commercial, said Cotts.

Local Campus Has Scheduled Fall Classes

Three classes will be conducted in Muleshoe for teachers as part of their continuing education classes, according to Elizabeth Watson, assistant superintendent of the Muleshoe ISD for curriculum.

She said an undergraduate course will be offered by South Plains College with a minimum enrollment of 15 for Government 232, which meets certification requirements for out-of-state teachers; Beginning Spanish 142, second semester; and Introduction to Sociology.

Also, Wayland Baptist University of Plainview will offer graduate courses of ED5305-Instructional Techniques and English 4306-Teaching English as a Second Language (ESL Endorsement).

From Texas Tech University, at the Muleshoe campus will be graduate courses in EDCI-5318-A course developing general understanding of the ways small computers can be used in education; EDCI-5321-Advanced Computer Programming, Tuition \$105-\$170 (depends on enrollment) three semester hour courses.

Opening the show on June 21, will be Ronna Reeves, backed by the Clay Blaker Band, before George Strait and his "Ace In The Hole" band take to the stage.

Recently, George Strait was named Country Male Vocalist of the Year for the nation, but it all wasn't easy for the singer, who is a native Texan.

When MCA recording artist George Strait released his first single, "Unwound," in the summer of 1981, it marked one of the most auspicious debuts in the history of country music.

He accomplished the rare feat of scoring a top ten single his first time out. What's more, his subsequent releases proved that George was no one-hit wonder. He fulfilled that early promise with a string of solid hit recordings, including: "You

Look So Good In Love," "A Fire I Can't Put Out," "Amarillo By Morning," "Fool Hearted Memory," and "Marina Del Rey," among others.

Simply stated, this soft-spoken, amiable Texan, is one of the most talented singers to emerge on the country music scene in the 1980s. Judging by the significant success and consistent quality of his albums and single release, George and his music will endure for many years to come.

George was born in Poteet, Texas, just south of San Antonio. Most of his childhood, however, he lived in the small town of Pearsall where his father taught junior high school mathematics.

"My parents were divorced when I was in fourth grade," George recalls, "So my Dad raised me and my brother. We have a sister and she lived with my mother."

After George's grandfather died, his father took over operation of the family's cattle ranch in Big Wells, some 40 miles west of Pearsall.

Although the weeks were spent in Pearsall, on weekends George went to the ranch with his father and brother.

Steer roping is still one of George's favorite hobbies, although he has little time for it now. "I never was all that great at ropin'. I just enjoyed doin'

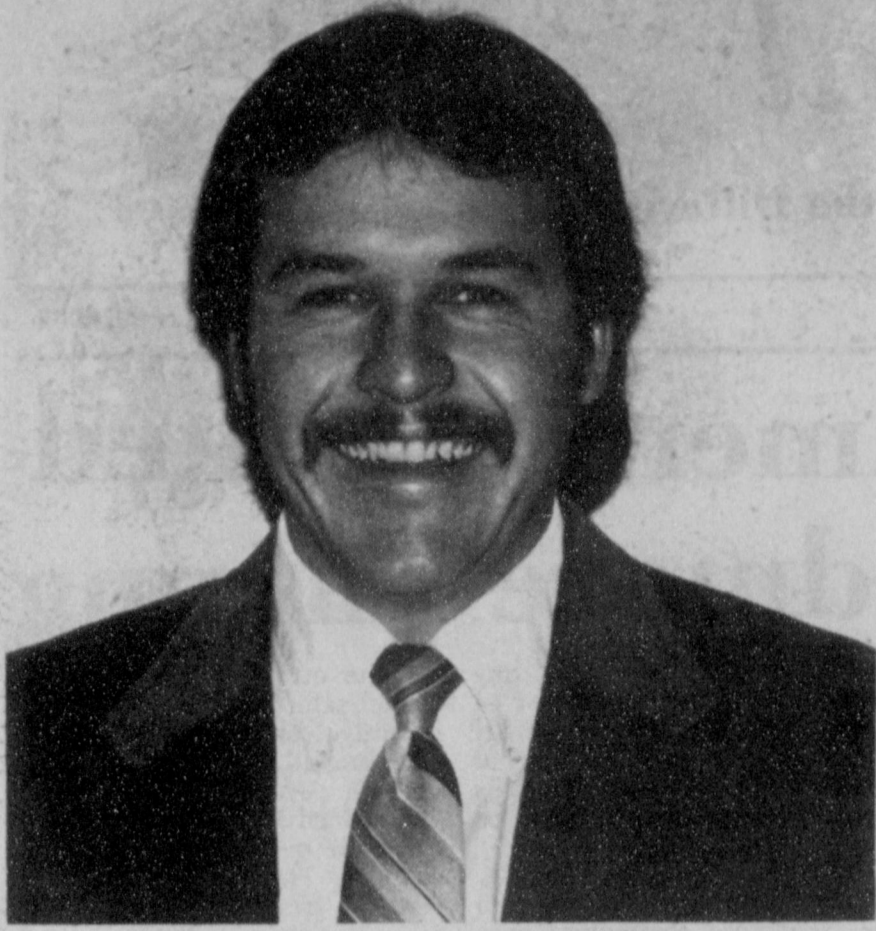

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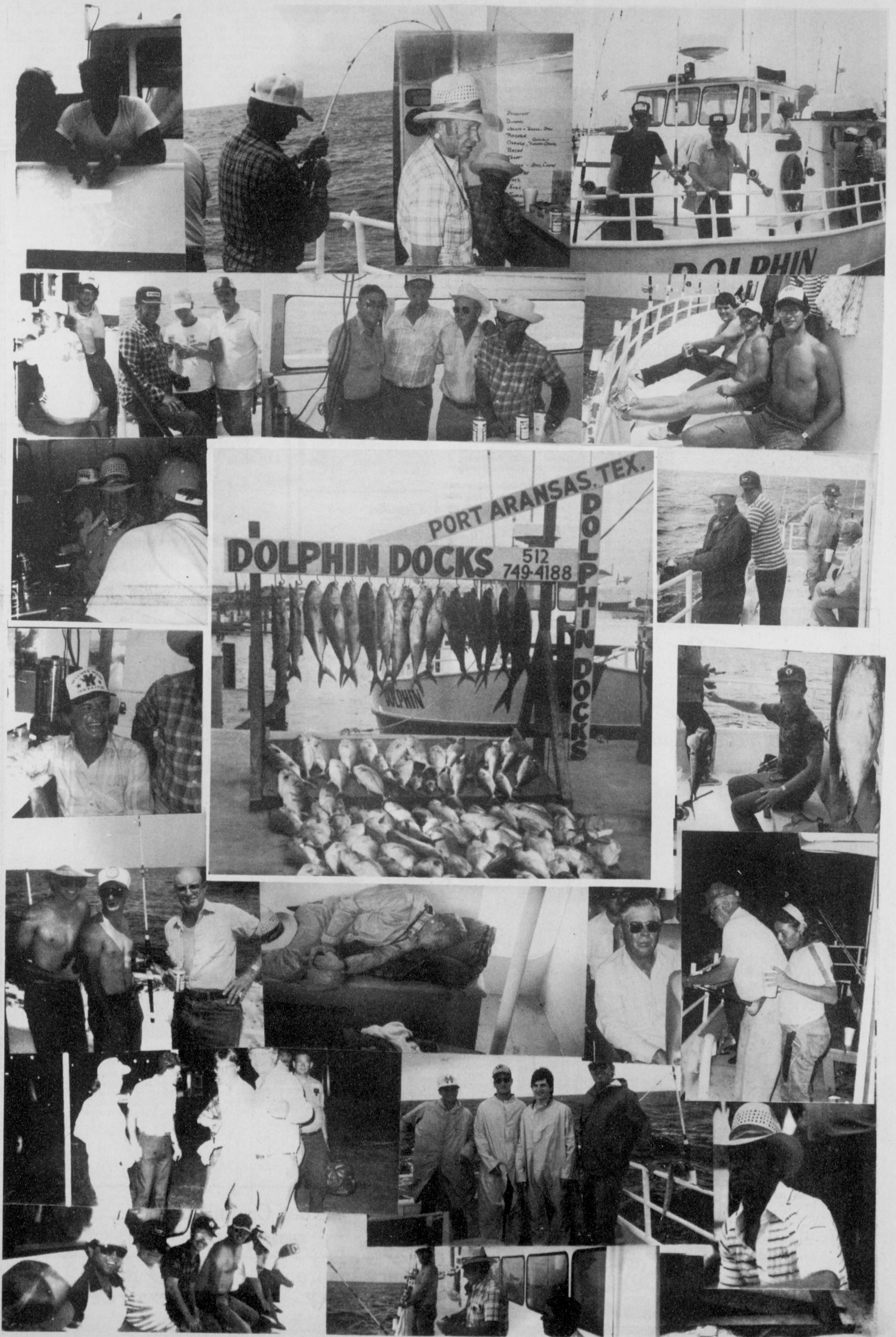

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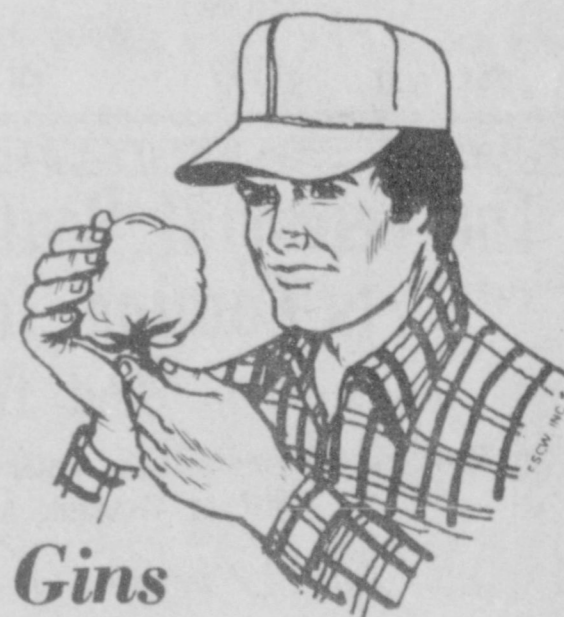

it. It takes a lot of time away from my family, so I kinda put ropin' on the back burner for now."

"I started listening to Merle Haggard, George Jones, Hank Williams, and Bob Wills," George notes. "They were the main musical influences in my life."

He also sang with several "garage bands," which he claims, "never really got out of the garage. We played 'Gloria' and things like that."

After he and Norma, his high school sweetheart, ran off to Mexico and got married, George attended Southwest Texas State University for several semesters before enlisting in the Army.

Ironically, the Army proved to be the beginning of George's singing career. "When I joined the service in 1971," he says, "I had it in the back of my mind to be a singer. I wound up stationed in Hawaii and there I had the time to learn how to play the guitar. I figured if I was gonna get serious about music, I better get started."

George bought himself a cheap, beat-up, old guitar, which was all he could afford on his Army pay, and some Hank Williams songbooks. "I started teachin' myself to play the guitar and tried to learn enough songs to get a band together so I could start playin' the clubs," he says.

As fate would have it, the post commanding officer was organizing a country band composed of military personnel. George, who was working in the post's payroll department, auditioned as the singer and got the job. "I spent my whole last year in the Army singing in a country band," George grins. "I didn't even have to wear Army clothes! We had a great job."

Following his discharge from the service, George and Norma returned to Texas where he enrolled again at Southwest

Texas State. George wanted to complete his education, but music was still very much on his mind.

He put up fliers on campus bulletin boards, advertising himself as a singer. The ad led to the formation of the Ace In The Hole Band. George was looking for a band, and the group was looking for a singer. Over the next six years, George and the band evolved into a popular country attraction.

The band played five nights a week at Clubs, honky tonks, weddings, and private parties within a 200-mile radius of San Marcos. Meanwhile, George attended classes during the day, and in order to supplement his income, worked on a nearby cattle ranch.

After graduating in 1979 with a degree in agricultural education, George worked fulltime managing the cattle ranch while continuing to gig with the Ace In The Hole Band and pursued his musical dreams of recording.

"It was pretty hard going," George notes. "There were about 1000 head of cattle on the ranch, and I was responsible for doing everything. Ranching isn't 9 to 5; it's more like sunup to sundown. I'd have about half an hour to get cleaned up and get to that night's gig."

The band became increasingly popular as an opening act for major concerts, and they even recorded several songs for D Records in Houston. But success was not forthcoming just yet.

As time wore on, George nearly wore out. "I was goin' to quit singin' altogether," he admits. "I didn't feel like I was makin' the progress I should be. I had made three trips to Nashville and done sessions on my own before I ever signed with MCA. I don't know if I was doin' as much as I could have, but I sure was tryin' all those years."

Insect Workshop Scheduled

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Bailey County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 4, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Spencer Tanksley, county extension agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second workshop is scheduled for July 9 in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.

Conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the workshop was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension, part of the Texas A&M University System.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for

insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, Tanksley said.

Dr. James Leser, Extension entomologist, will begin the workshop at 8:30 a.m. outlining the scope of the training and explaining general concepts of pest management, pesticide safety and sampling.

Dr. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on trips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-entomology headquarters at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests.

An afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension agent entomology, based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on cotton.

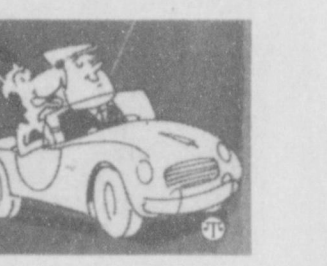

Just take a few tips from the experts on canine car care: Do take the dog on short, frequent trips before going on a long trip, teach the dog to stay in one place in the car and to obey commands, take along a favorite toy and keep extra drinking water on hand. Don't allow the dog on the front seat or its head outside the window, or leave the dog alone in the car in hot weather. ***
