Hospital District Facts

(1) The old hospital district, which included all of Bailey County, was officially dissolved and terminated on May 12, 1986. Six members voted for termination, one against. All outstanding bills were paid.

(2) On June 21, 1987, a legal notice, as required by law, was placed in the Bailey County Journal, which in effect, stated that notice was given that a bill to be entitled "An Act Relating To The Creation Of The Muleshoe Area Hospital District" was intended to be introduced in a Called Session of the 70th

(3) If this bill could be placed on the agenda by the Governor, introduced and passed, then the enabling legislation would authorize an election to be called to vote on a hospital district for

The legislation, if passed, would not create a Hospital District, it would only authorize a local election to determine if a hospital district should be created.

Sales Tax Rebate Reflects Small Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$53.6 million in sales tax rebates to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 6.5 percent compared to payments made in the same period last year.

Muleshoe received a check for the current period in the amount of \$16,271.30, up considerably over the \$13,399.90 received for the same time a year ago. However, Muleshoe is still running some 8.77 percent behind receipts from a year ago, when to date \$115,266.22 had been received, compared to the current total of \$105,152.83.

In Cochran County, Morton received \$3,794.64 for the current period, compared to the \$3,374.85 from a year ago. They reflect a decrease for the year of 11.17 percent, with current payments a year ago showing \$30,342.80, compared to the \$26,954.11 for the same period

Littlefield shows a 5.20 per-

cent deficit for the year, with receipts of \$137,206.00 to date for this year, compared to \$144,729.11 at the same time last year. Their current payment was \$17,238.50, compared to \$16,867.53 for the same rebate period in 1986.

In Friona, a 6.12 percent decrease for the year is noted. Total receipts at this time last year were \$60,141.23, compared to current payments to date in 1987 being \$56,459.06. Their current payment was \$7,555.06, compared to last years' payment for the same period

Houston's check was the largest -- \$8.5 million -- bringing total payments in 1987 to \$75.2 million, down 8.5 percent over 1986. Dallas received \$6.1 million for a total of \$56.3 million in total payments for

Fleahopper infestations have increased dramatically in cotton fields in our area this past week as reported by Allen Knutson, Extension Entomologist. Fleahopper numphs (immatures) are most common while adult numbers are low, often 10 or less per 100 plants. Since numphs are much smaller than adults and don't fly, "quickly" scouting methods such as beating a cap aginst the plants to scare out the fleahoppers just won't work for nymphs.

The older cotton seems to have more fleahoppers at this time than the late May and June cotton. Infestations have typically ranged from 20-40 numphs/100 plants, with some fields having 100 nymphs/100 plants. Remember the treatment threshold is 25-30 fleahoppers/ 100 terminals and a declining percent, square set (less than 90% first week, less than 80-85% the second, and less than 75% the third week of squaring).

Fleahopper nymphs are commonly seen in the terminal area and on smaller squares lower on the plant. Newly hatched numphs are whitish until they feed, while older numphs are pale green to green. Nymphs have long legs in proportion to their body and run very quickly Since the nymphs are so small, is necessary to carefully examine each square and the terminal to detect numphs. Immature pirate bugs, a valuable beneficial, can be confused with fleahopper nymphs. Pirate bug nymphs are yellow-orange in color with a tapered head. The fleahopper has a broad head and longer legs than the pirate bug nymph.

Fleahopper nymphs and adults feed on pin head size squares, causing the squares to shrivel and die. The cotton crop still needs to set squares for several more weeks, so square loss at this time cannot be tolerated without significant loss in yield. Once squares are 1/3 grown (1/4 inch in diameter) they are no longer susceptible you feel will work best for you, to fleahopper injury.

MUCH OF OUR PRESENT FLEAHOPPER PROBLEMS ARE DUE TO MOVEMENT into cotton from weed hosts. Later on, movement will be between cotton fields of different ages as well. And, of course, reproduction in fields will occur and increase infestation levels. Fleahoppers don't appear to lay many eggs--only about 3-5 per plant tissue, which is why one

never sees fleahopper eggs They hatch in about a week. Therefore, it is possible to spray a field full of adults that have laid eggs and still have damaging levels of fleahoppers (nymphs) a week later. Our insecticides simply don't last that long evan at the higher

INSECTICIDES COMMONLY BEING RECOMMENDED include Cygon, Dimethoate 267, Orthene, Bidrin and even Nudrin or Lannate. Higher rates appear to be providing more consistent and satisfactory control. Rates can be cut if banded application is used but the savings in chemical cost can cause trouble due to the delays associated with ground rigging. The key to successful fleahopper management is to quickly control fleahoppers when damaging adult numbers are found before significate egg laying occurs. Therefore, ground applications (even auto-



Dear Friends and Neighbors of the Muleshoe Area,

Most of my adult life has been spent providing health care services to the people of the area. Things have changed drastically during this time. There has been progress and an increase in government involvement in all businesses.

It is important for health care consumers to realize that it is not the responsibility of the physician to own and operate a hospital. Their problems and stress are decreased if they refer everyone who needs hospitalization to someone else. Even though the present physicians prefer to live in Muleshoe and to take care of as many of your needs as is possible, it is only a matter of time before they move away. Can you think of any reason why they should stay here? What does Muleshoe have to offer that another town doesn't? It the town does not have a doctor, then what happens to the Nursing Home? They cannot operate without a doctor.

Young people do not want to move to a town without a doctor or a hospital to bear and raise children. People of this rural area do not hesitate to drive miles to shop or seek services from a specialist. Have you considered which specialist in Lubbock you would go to see for a cold, headache, or the flu? Is there a flu specialist? What kind do you need for various aches and pains or to have your blood pressure checked?

As everyone knows who has. had family in the hospital miles away from home, it is very expensive and time-consuming to go see them everyday or to have to stay in a motel. It is also very tiring to sleep in you r car or sit up in the waiting room day and night.

The decision of funding the local hospital is one of the most critical issues we have ever had, and it is not new to most of us. It becomes even more urgent when we consider how rapidly a building deteriorates when not in use. We have a lovely facility.

When your town becomes a town of old people, and YOU are the old people, who will take care of you? Will you be able to physically and mentally to drive to Amherst, Littlefield or Lubbock. As your property values continue to decrease because there is no hospital, the little old home town where all your friends are will no longer be the same. The other little towns with hospitals run for profit, will not longer be there





Wheat harvest in this section is now in full blast, growers in jubilation because of the fine yields being returned. Apparently the rains of a few weeks ago have produced much magic in filling out heads and hefting of the grain.

Examine Yourself For Skin Cancer

Prolonged overexposure to the sun's rays may lead to skin cancer, and like all other cancers it's important to detect it early. This can be done with a simple self-examination.

'Self-examination for skin cancer is painless, cheap, and gets less time consuming the more often it is done," said Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service says. "It's an easy way to catch the disease in its early stages, when it is easier to cure.'

According to the American Cancer Society, over 400,000 cases of skin cancer are reported each year. An estimated 7,400 of these cases prove to be fatal. They also reported a 3.4 percent increase per year in the incidence of melanoma, which is the most serious of the skin cancers.

"There are a few different warning signs to look for," the specialist says. "Look for changes in the size or color of moles, and the appearance of any new skin growths or patches of dark pigmentation.'

"Though skin cancer is more likely to occur in areas that are most often exposed to the sun, all of the body must be examined," she adivses.

Self-examination requires only a full length mirror, a hand-held air dryer, and a hand-held mirror, in a well-lit room.

Check exposed areas of the skin like the hands, legs, forearms and face. Next examine the back and buttocks with mirrors. Examine the scalp with the help of a blow dryer to blow hair out of the way. Don't forget to examine the groin area and the tops and bottoms of the

"If you find anything unusual as a result of your self-examinaion, check with your physician," emphasizes the special-



BLACKENED FILLETS 2 lbs. fish fillets, 1/2-3/4 inches thick, 1 cup butter, melted, 1 tablespoon paprika, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. onion powder, 3/4 tsp. black pepper, 3/4 tsp. white pepper, 1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper. 1/2 tsp. dried thyme leaves, 1/2 1sp. dried oregano, 1 tsp. garlic

Mix all dry ingredients in a flat pan. Heat a large cast-iron skillet over high heat. Turn on hood vent. Do not use lightweight or nonstick skillet. Melt about 3 tablespoons butter in skillet. Dip each fish portion in reamaining butter, then in the dry ingredients, patting them in by hand. Cook fish on each side for 2 to 3 minutes, being careful when turning. The fish will look charred. There will be some smoke, but not excessive. This recipe may be cooked outdoors if preferred. Makes 5 to 6 servings.

Safe Bicycle A few chains have even switched to using polyunsaturated fats in their deep from the feet of the switch-Exercise

Before hopping on your bicycle to get some extra exercise, make sure you and the bike are fit for the road.

"Cycling is a good way to improve cardiovascular fitness,' says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "But it's also an easy way to get hurt if you aren't physically and mentally prepared.

"Remember, bicycling is like any other form of exercise." says Heussner. "You should stretch out before and after each ride to increase your flexibility and avoid muscle and tendon pulls. Relaxing your shoulders and keeping your elbows bent to help absorb shocks, and consistent pedaling to increase efficiency are also good techniques you can use to decrease the possibilities of

"Helmets are an important part of bicycle safety," the specialist says. "They should pass safety requirements, fit snugly, and be worn at all times.

"Bikes that are working properly are more enjoyable to ride, as well as safer," says Heussner. "The tires should be properly inflated and be the correct type for your bike. The gears should shift smoothly, and the brakes should stop evenly."

If you're buying a new bike, be sure to have a salesperson help you find one that is suitable for your height, weight and intended use. Heussner cautions.

Bicyclists have the most safety problems with traffic. They often forget that they must follow the same rules as moving vehicles, and they need to signal at every stop and turn.

"Bicyclists are also more difficult to see, especially at night, which often causes problems for unsuspecting motorists. Because of this, cyclists need to obey traffic laws, be aware of all motorists, and have their bikes equipped with proper reflectors and lights," Heussner maintains.

She adds, "Cycling can be an enjoyable way to get out and get some exercise, but make sure you and your bike are in good condition, and you follow the rules of the road."

Veterans, general public experience delayed stress say Texas A&M therapists

TEMPLE — Organizers of therapy groups for combat veterans such as those portrayed in the movie "Platoon," who have delayed stress disorders say such disorders are more common among the general public than suspected because they can be caused by events other than combat.

Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) may also arise from an accident, tragedy, disaster or criminal assault, and is becoming an issue in disaster and stress management, explais Dr. Merrill Lipton, a Veterans Administration physician and associate professor of psychiatry with Texas A&M University's medical school.

heard more and more as summer temperatures climb, and people turn to convenience fast food restaurants. Fortunately, smart consumers can find good nutritional values in their quest to beat the heat.

The restaurant industry is responding to the consumer demand for more nutritional and lower calorie meals," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey; a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Extension Service. "Fast food chains are especially making an effort to attract health conscious people."

Many fast food chains are trying to improve the nutritional value of their products by cutting back on sodium and fat. in their deep fryers in efforts to

Prepare For Home Food Preservation

Many fruits and vegetables are beginning to ripen, and home canners should be getting prepared for the harvest. Preplanning before home food preservation can make the process easier and safer.

"It's a good idea to check out any questions you have before beginning any home food processing," says Marilyn Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "County Extension agents can tell you if your preservation methods are safe, and will provide you with the latest research based processing times and procedures.

"Using the correct procedures in home food preservation is important," the specialist maintains. "Incorrect methods can allow bacteria growth in the food, which may cause food poisoning or lead to spoilage."

If you have any doubt about the safety of your home processed food, don't hesitate to call a county Extension agent,

"Food can sometimes be saved if you act quickly. Tell the agent what you think went wrong. Review the exact steps you followed when processing the food, being careful not to leave anything out. The smallest thing might make the difference," says Haggard.

"Have your dial gauge canners tested annually, and get any questions answered before you begin food processing," she suggests. "Preparation can save you a lot of time, money, and needless frustration."

"It's too hot to cook," is gain public approval and patronage. Cooksey points out.

'One of the most popular trends in fast food nutrition is the salad bar," says the specialist. "Salad bars are featured in many chains to compliment the existing menu and to attract the health conscious. These salads can be an excellent source of nutrition, and contain few calories, if you go easy on the croutons, cheese and dressing.


'Pizza also is a good choice. Its combination of cheese. tomato sauce, and crust make it a low-fat source of carbohydrates, vitamins, calcium and protein. But be careful, you can run up calories here too by adding sausage, pepperoni, and other high calorie toppings," remarks Cooksey.

Ethnic fast foods can add variety and nutrition, the specialist says. Those types of

Mexican food which aren't deep fried and feature lettuce, tomatoes, small amounts of meat, and beans are a good fast food choice. Chinese food also offers nutritional entrees based mainly on vegetables and rice, providing vitamins, protein and fiber.

According to Cooksey, "Eating fast food doesn't have to be a high calorie, fatty experience. There are many readily available alternatives to deep fried, high fat content foods. Fast food can be nutritious food if you make smart choices."

FLEAHOPPER MANAGE MENT REQUIRES ACCURATE SCOUTING, finding those fields that are economically infested in a timely manner. There can be tremendous variability from field to field, not always explained by planting date, of weed hosts. Remember that counting fleahoppers under windy conditions also results in lower counts. Fleahopper adults are 1/8 inch long, pale green in

color and fly readily. Don't confuse these with aphids, whiteflies, leafhoppers, plant bugs, pirate bugs and other insects frequently found while scouting. Otherwise, your counts will be inflated. Nymphs (immataures) are wingless. much smaller (down to 1/25 inch long) and very secretive. Both adults and nymphs cause the same damages -- sucking juices from tender, young plant parts. Carefully approach plants

to be checked so you can see adult fleahoppers as they fly off. Don't overlook nymphs or adults that run down the stalk to the ground. Examine terminals and ends of fruiting branches where this pest is found. Remember to attack pinhead or smaller sized
