NEW ORLEANS.

High Water Reports - Errors in all Directions.

New Orleans, January 19.-A season of unusually high water is reported from many sections. The river overflowed its bank and submerged the adjacent low lands, but Col. Wheeler says no damage was done in New Orleans. The flood-water from the Black River is spreading in every direction. About thirty miles of the Chicago, St. Louis & New Orleans railroad are under water. Many culverts are destroyed and much of the bridge is washed away. It will be weeks before through trains can be run. No trains running between Canton and Grenada, a distance of eighty-five miles. A dispatch from Goodman reports that lower part of the town inundated, roads destroyed and the bridge over the Big Black River washed away.
