

AUSTIN. DAILY BUDGET OF NEWS.

Capture of Petty Thieves—Offers of Money to Carry on the Prairie View Normal School—Juan Pecina, of Brownsville, Issue—Kubovoy Case—Railroad Compendium.

Special Telegram. AUSTIN, February 2.—It will be remembered that an item appeared in this evening issue—five—about petty thieves infesting the city. On January 23d occurred three robberies, the following houses having been gone through: Durhan, losing clothing, Jacob, losing "Burton" socks of blue and Peter Thompson, losing clothing. For several days Capt. GENERAL NOTES.

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WASHINGTON.

Forty-Seventh Congress. Senate. WASHINGTON, February 2.—A response was received from the secretary of the treasury, in regard to the irregularities in the recent revenue collector's district of North Carolina.

Several amendments for the increasing of the appropriations for clerk's salaries were rejected and voted out on points of order.

Morgan's resolution for the printing of the testimony, etc., in regard to experiments with heavy guns and projectiles being built by the government, and calling for a report on a mixed committee was taken up and adopted, with modifications suggested by its author.

At 1:30 the case on the bill which was brought up for discussion, being upon Plumb's amendment to apply the revenue over \$100,000,000 to the reduction of the public debt.

Plumb's amendment was to be retained in the treasury shall be of standard coin value; he wanted dollars to be real gold dollars, not paper.

Plumb signed his willingness to accept the amendment, but he had proposed the only dollar in the treasury was standard gold; but, on a point made by Garland, it was ruled that a vote of 20 yeas would carry it.

Plumb's amendment was then adopted, yeas 27, nays 27.

An amendment, by Hoar, declaring that bonds bearing 5 per cent. interest are hereby declared to be legal, elicited a continuous discussion on the ratification of the funding of '5's and 6's by secretary Wadsworth.

The debate continued at considerable length principally between—Windom, Hoar, Vest and Ingalls, sometimes taking the shape of a personal controversy between Windom and Vest and Ingalls and Ingalls.

Finally the amendment as proposed by Ingalls and modified by Hoar, was adopted. It is as follows: That the secretary of the treasury is hereby authorized to receive at the treasury office of any assistant treasury agent, the interest on any postal money order, legal money order, or any other postal money order, for any multiple of that sum, or any bonds of the United States treasury, three and a half per cent. interest, which are hereby declared valid and to issue in exchange therefor an equal amount of registered currency.

Several messages from the president, enclosing communications from the secretary of departments were read and referred.
