SPS Tolk Station Has Economic Impact

City Council Members Tour New Fire Station Site

A proposed ordinance concerning the operation of the Muleshoe Airport was discussed by members of the Muleshoe City Council when they met in regular session Tuesday morn-

ing. City Manager Dave Marr explained that in the past, the airport had been leased, and the lessee had established the 'rules' for operation of the airport.

Now, in the interim, until another airport manager has been established, the city will need guidelines and rules for all operation, explained the city manager.

He said a copy of the proposed ordinance had been given to each of the Airport Board members to study, and make recommendations prior to adoption by the city.

No action was expected to be taken other than the discussion session, until after the Airport Board has time to study the proposed ordinance, said Marr.

Marr told council members that construction of the Muleshoe Fire Station is approximately 90 percent completed at this time, with finishing work underway, which will slow down the time the building will be completed.

Council members toured the building following the regular session of the meeting at the Muleshoe City Hall.

Also coming in for some discussion was the possibility of constructing some type of a barrier between the new Town and Country Food Store under construction at the intersection

More Entries Are Sought For Parade

Entries for the Mule Day Parade, scheduled for Saturday, August 10, are coming slowly, said Toni Eagle, manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. She said the parade will be held at 10 a.m. and entries will be lining up at 9 a.m. at the Boy Scout grounds.

According to Mrs. Eagle, prizes for senior and junior riding clubs are \$100 for first; \$75 for second and \$50 for third places. In the antique car division, the prize money is the same for the first through third. Any other entry will be judged for Best of Show and the winner will be awarded \$100.

Prizes for the parade will be awarded at the Mule Rodeo, beginning at 1 p.m. at Jeff Smith's arena, located two and one half miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 70.



Around Muleshoe

A rain cloud, that formed on Monday evening between Muleshoe and Needmore, deposited up to three inches of rain in a very narrow band as it moved to the southwest.

Jack Schuster, who lives five miles north of Needmore said he received .7 in moisture, and a nearby neighbor, Buster Kittrell received 1.1 inches.

Schuster said a neighbor to the southwest, O. J. Killingsworth, told him he had received three inches of rain, with up to one inch being reported around Coyote Lake.

Claunch Gin said they only received a sprinkle at Bula, as did a spokeswoman at the Needmore Co-op Gin. Muleshoe received a brief dust storm as the cloud moved through the area to the south of the city.

Bronco Little League Action Here This Week

On Monday night, 12-year old Little League action got underway in Muleshoe, with the Muleshoe 'Black' team taking on the Bovina Bronco All-Stars at 6 p.m.

Although they fell behind in the first inning, the Muleshoe 'Black' team came back with a vengeance, and following several home runs, one slammed with the bases loaded, the game was called after five innings. Under Little League rules, if any team is 10 points ahead at the end of five innings, the game is over. Muleshoe's 'Black' team won 18-8.

Not so with the Muleshoe 'Gray' team, who took on Friona at 8:30 p.m. The 'Gray' team found itself in trouble from the start, and the game was also called at the end of five innings, with Friona winning 13-3.

Muleshoe's 'Gray' team took on Bovina in the first of two games Tuesday night, while Farwell, who drew a 'bye' for the first night's action, played Friona.

On Wednesday, at 6:00 p.m., the loser of the Farwell-Friona game was to take on the winner of the 'Gray'-Bovina game and the Muleshoe 'Black' team was to play the winner of the Farwell-Friona game at 8:30 p.m.

On Thursday, the loser of game six will play the winner of game five and on Friday, the winner of game six will play the winner of game seven, with more possible game to follow on Friday night or Saturday night.

Golf Tournament Gets Underway On Friday Night

Entries are being accepted at this time at the Mule Putt Miniature Golf Course for a tournament that gets underway tomorrow, Friday at the golf course located just east of the Bailey County Civic Center.

Wayne Holmes said the tournament will be a 10-15-25 Tournament and entry fees are \$5 per individual.

Tournament games can be played only on Friday and Saturday, so be sure to enter, so you can complete your games prior to the August 17 deadline for the tournament to conclude.

For several years, as many as 800 construction workers were very busy at the Tolk Station location, building the two Units which are operating today producing electricity.

Now that construction is in the waning stages, 123 permanent employees will be left behind, according to Ben Green plant manager.

His records reflect that of the 123 permanent employees, some 86 are employees who have been transferred into the area. The 123 permanent employees do not include the permanent employee figure for Wheelabrator, who handle the coal operation for SPS.

Some 50 of the 86 employees transferred in to work at Tolk Station moved into Muleshoe, or local enough to have a Muleshoe address, said Green. Another 18 were hired as permanent employees from Muleshoe, to bring a total 68 families who now reside in the immediate area, and are employed at SPS' Tolk Station.

Green added that hiring that started in January, 1981, and continued intensely until April, 1982, is still continuing, as new workers are periodically hired to work at the electric power generation plant.

Most of the 123 permanent employees have addresses in Muleshoe, Sudan, Earth and Littlefield, and their combined payroll for this many employees pumps another three and a half million into the local economy yearly.

Once again, the payroll figure does not include the figures from Wheelabrator, who conduct their own business at Tolk Station.

"In speaking for the plant staff," said Green, "We have always been made to feel welcome in Muleshoe, and we all appreciate that. We have felt the welcome from the day Muleshoe citizens toured Herrington Station at Amarillo, to indicate that we were more than welcome to move to Muleshoe.

"We have felt welcome and continue to feel welcome. Also, we have tried to quietly go about our business and be good neighbors. Our people have been moving into the area over a period of time, and most people did not really realize they were moving in," continued the plant manager.

"We think we do play a very important role in electric service that our company provides. We do not create a lot of fan fare, we just always try to go quietly about our jobs.

"Most people are aware that the plant is here, they see the plant as large as it is, but that's about all most of them know about it," he added.

Tolk Station Unit I became operational in July, 1982, followed by Unit II going on the

"Our Club will dance there instead of in Muleshoe that night. The building is air conditioned and has fans. There will be no square dancing in Muleshoe that night."

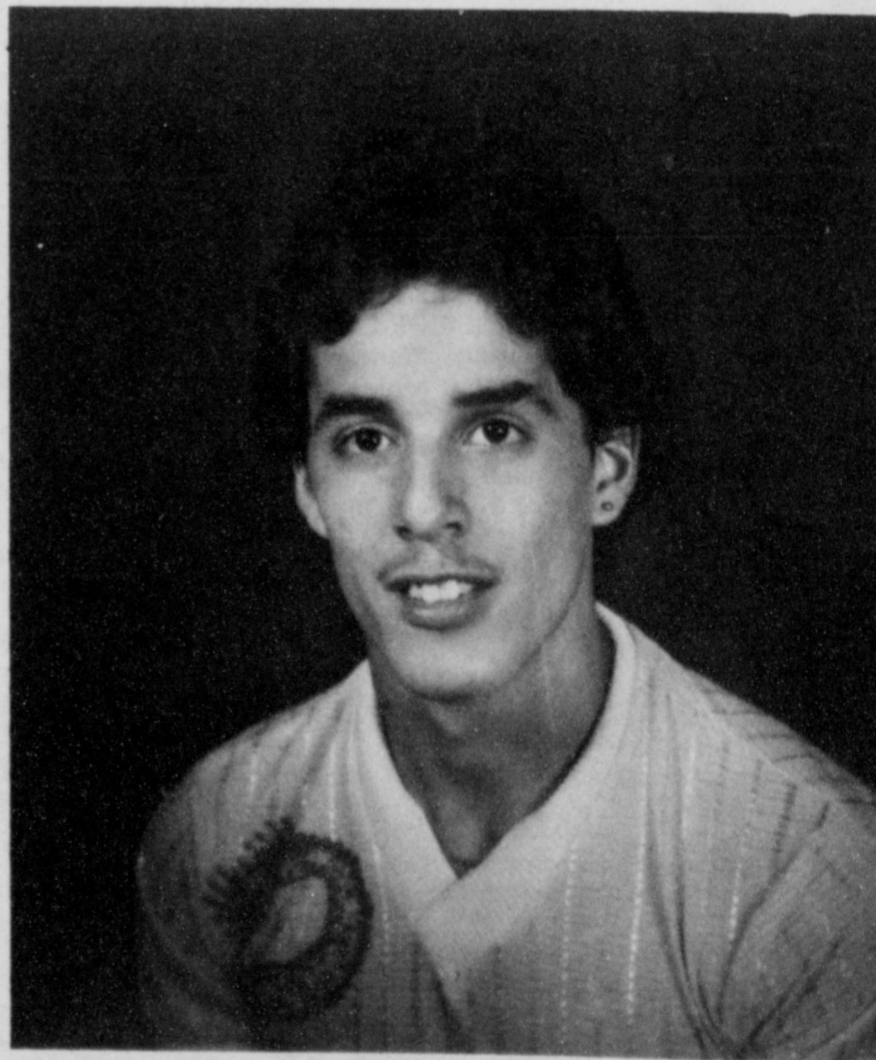
Next Thursday night, July 18th the group will be starting Plus square dance lessons for all members.

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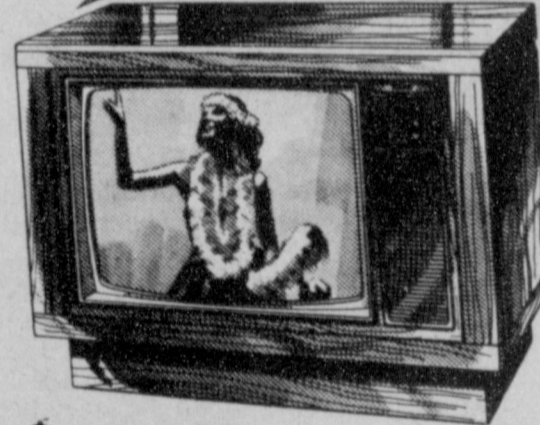

line, and operational as of April, 1985, said Green, who added that both are carrying a 95 percent capacity at this time in power, which translates to over 12,000 tons of coal per day to generate electricity.

Green added that the monthly fuel bill for Talk is something over \$10 million. In the past several days, Green said Talk Station has burned a little over a trainload of coal per day. A trainload of coal is 110 cars of coal.

According to the plant manager, the peak load is in the summertime, and the heavy use can be placed right on air conditioning.

"We have plenty of power, although the company would never ask anyone to waste power, plenty is available," said Green.

He explained that SPS has the ability to sell power to off-system electric companies, although SPS always takes care of their own customers first, then sell the excess power. "We can sell east to Oklahoma and west to New Mexico and Arizona," he added.

Green believes coal is the only 'way to go' to save fuel expenses. He said coal prices for the plant dropped during the past year by about 20 percent, and was attributed to competition among coal companies, an abundance of supply and the coal company's investment. This has resulted in a direct saving for SPS customers, who benefit from the cheaper fuel to produce electricity.

Other counties included for this allocation are Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.

"The Job Training Partnership Act is a valuable mechanism that brings the public and private sectors together to train Texans for productive employment and economic self-sufficiency," Governor White said.

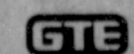

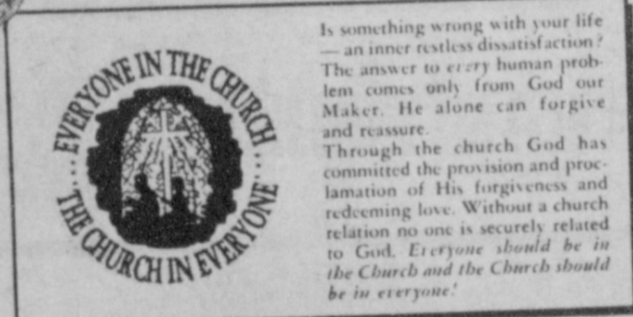

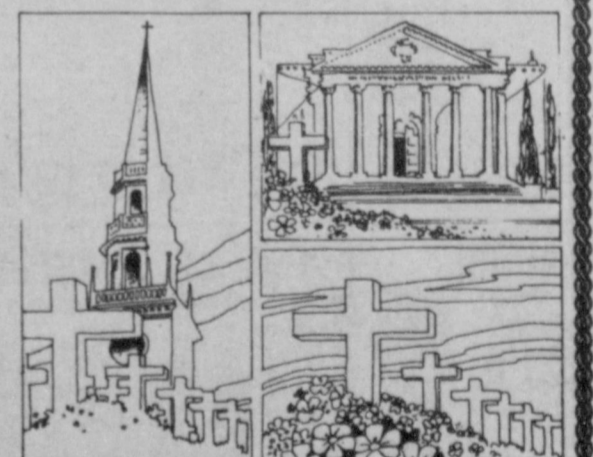

Know THE Weather

Does weather ever remain the same? In hot summer spells, is the air over your town or city the same air that was there yesterday or the day before?

Weather is never the same. The same condition may exist, but the weather you are experiencing today --the gases that are above you--have probably come from hundreds of miles away in the past twenty-four hours.

In the United States the movement of weather is generally from west to east and seldom does a time come when this trend is not in effect. The air you breathe today was not in your vicinity yesterday. Experts have estimated

that it usually was several hundred miles westward yesterday.

This does not mean that clear air hundreds of miles to the west cannot become moist or cloudy by the time it reaches you.

Local conditions sometimes generate clouds and precipitation, but usually on a local scale.

In general, if the air is clear to the west, it will be clear when it reaches you and if rainy, it will bring clouds to your area as it passes over--though clouds sometimes dissipate as they move eastward, and the experts still cannot always predict these changes.

ONE way to avoid a fifty dollar check for four, at a luxury steak house (wine and drinks included perhaps) is to grill steaks at home.

STRIP sirloins are a safe bet. Ribeyes have much fat. Filets often don't do as well because they have so little fat. Porterhouse or T-Bones are fine.

GET steaks cut three-fourths of an inch thick, or more. Let the fire-from hardwood if you have it--burn to red ashes. Place steaks about four or five inches above coals. Rub fat on the grill first to avoid sticking.

FIVE or six minutes on one side and four or five on the other--depending on the fire of course--will produce a medium char-coaled steak. Eat immediately--have the baked potatoes and salad on the table when the steaks arrive.

TURN steaks only once. Some prefer to saut after cooking. Don't allow too much flame to touch meat
