THE PROCEEDINGS OF YESTERDAY

REPORTED IN FULL.

The committee on stock-raising and fencing recommended asking the legislature to pass a law allowing small land owners the right to put cattle inside of large pastures fenced by heavy owners, in proportion to the amount of land they own in said fence.

It was also reported that it is the sense of this convention that school lands should be rented for a term of not less than five years. Also recommending that no change be made in the herd laws at present, as they affect sheep.




