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WASHINGTON.

Washington, February 23.—In the senate, Allison, from the appropriations committee, reported amendments to the bill for the relief of the distressed districts of the Mississippi river, which was read, and a message from Gov. Lowry, of Mississippi, urging immediate measures of relief. He reported the destruction of property and stock in immense quantities, and starvation imminent in the flooded country, which comprises the best portion of the Mississippi and white and black are suffering alike.

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MISSOURI.

St. Louis, February 23.—One of the boilers in the blowing mill of the Vulcan works, on 6th street, St. Louis, exploded with terrific force to-day. One hundred men were working in the mill at the time, of whom Michael Checkley, John Dillon, Frank Chambers and Oliver W. Wolfen were injured, being terribly scorched, besides having limbs broken and faces severely lacerated. Luke Cronin suffered a compound fracture of the leg, and it would not be surprising if he were killed. The boiler was blown down and the mill otherwise considerably damaged.
