Muleshoe Heritage Foundation Schedules Community Meeting

"A big community party is being planned for Monday, August 19, at 8 p.m. in the Bailey County Civic Center,"

said Jeanne McVicker, "and everyone in the Muleshoe area, as well as Bailey County will be interested in what's going on and will want to attend."

She added, "Muleshoe and the area surrounding it, have been blessed with a very unique opportunity to develop our resources and make our town an outstanding place that people will want to visit."

"The Muleshoe Foundation has been working on a very exciting plan to develop a Museum and Ranching Center right here in Muleshoe! The Williams Company from Austin, a professional restoration and development company, have drawn up plans for such a center and Kim Williams will be on hand to tell the public all about the advantages we have and how to use them benefit Muleshoe, our Senior Citizens, our young people, as well as every age group."

Recently, the Santa Fe Railway donated the old depot to the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation and it was moved to its permanent site east of the Bailey County Civic Center, on property donated by the Bailey County Commissioner's Court for this purpose.

Jim Kassahn has given the Foundation the old historic Janes Ranch House, and a large donation. Plans are for the

house to soon join the Santa Fe Depot.

To add more interest to this Center, it is planned to add the old Muleshoe Ranch Cookhouse.

The area for each structure has been mapped out and additional features are planned, such as arbors and picnic areas, large patio areas and decks, a barbecue pit and windmill cistern will be integrated into this plan, as well as landscaped areas and trees.

According to the Heritage Foundation, it is planned that the area will be used on a daily basis for meetings, receptions, special events, as well as activities for senior citizen groups. It could very easily become a profitable and educational tourist attraction, explained Mrs. McVicker. Similar centers and attractions have been extremely successful in Lubbock, San Angelo, Albany, Fredricksburg and many other small cities. This project could really help celebrate the important Sesquicentennial Year, she added.

Smoke Damage Recorded Tuesday From Bank Fire

Shortly after 8 a.m. Tuesday, arriving employees at First Bank of Muleshoe opened the bank doors to thick smoke, and an apparent fire in the bank.

Muleshoe firemen were quickly at the bank, and traced the fire to the basement where an electrical box was found to be afire.

Extinguishing the very small blaze in seconds, the firemen then used large exhaust fans to remove smoke from the building. The only real damage was to the electrical box, which housed wires to the computer operating the bank's outside time/temperature display.

A fireman said minimal damage was sustained in the fire, with most of the damage being confined to smoke-tinged walls in the basement area.

Saturday morning, hundreds of people lined the streets and sidewalks of Muleshoe, waiting for the Mule Day Festival Parade, scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Disappointed viewers had expected entries by Bruce Parr, a resident of Black, near Friona. His entries, including a stagecoach to lead the parade, did not arrive on time, and the parade was started without the lead stagecoach around 10:40 a.m.

It was reported that Parr did show up with his stagecoach, which ended the parade, and was not seen by many of the crowd, who had already disbursed after the more than 30 entries went by.

According to a Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture spokesman, Parr was paid by a local implement company to bring the stagecoach and two surreys to Muleshoe for the Mule Day Festival.

A reporter from the Dallas Morning-News who attended all the Mule Day Festival activities said Parr made some very "unkind" remarks about Muleshoe and the Mule Day Festival.

Another 'no-show' for the parade was a chuck wagon, signed up to travel the parade route, then be on display at the Mule Day Festival location at Jeff Smith's farm east of Muleshoe.

Bailey County Fair Set; A New Event Is Added

Vegetables and fruits, crops and crafts are all being 'babied along' to enter in the annual Bailey County West Plains Fair, scheduled to be held at the Bailey County Civic Center September 12-14, according to Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley.

Growing larger each year, the fair is sponsored by the Extension Advisory Committee, Muleshoe Rotary Club and the Bailey County Commissioners Court.

Entries will be accepted from both youth and adults who reside in Bailey, Parmer, Lamb or Cochran Counties. Entries will be checked into the Bailey County Civic Center 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursday, September 12. Booths will also be set up during the same hours.

On Friday, September 13, judging will be held 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at which time the fair will open up to the public until 6 p.m.

Saturday will be the big day of the fair, as it will be open to the public 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. An added feature this year will be the 2 p.m. pet show.

Fair participants will have the added incentive of the cash drawings to be held on Friday afternoon and again on Saturday. You must be present at the drawings to be eligible for the \$50 to \$100 cash prizes.

Local Fireman

Attends School

J.O. Parker, volunteer fireman of the Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department, attended the 56th annual Texas Firemen's Training School, July 21-26.

The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

Firemen can choose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Training, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection and Disaster Rescue Training.

Fireman Parker was sponsored by Bailey County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since Volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 100 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Company believe Volunteer Fire Departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said president S.M. True Jr. of Plainview. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the firemen will help the Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department to better serve the residents of Bailey County."

about a mile west of Muleshoe.

Early Monday morning, one motorist lost control of his pickup about four miles east of Muleshoe on rain-slick Highway 84 and overturned. There were no injuries, although debris from the pickup and loaded camper were strewn over a wide area.

Tuesday afternoon at Bula, the rain amounted to around .75 in most of the area, with no hail.

At Needmore, Mrs. Lewis Wayne Shafer said they received only sprinkles, while north of Needmore, nearly one inch was reported between Needmore and Muleshoe.

Around Lazbuddie, the Lazbuddie Grain reported one half inch Tuesday afternoon, and that amount fell only in a narrow band, with most areas in that community receiving only sprinkles.

For Wednesday, the National Weather Service predicted a 30 percent chance for showers, along with a few thunderstorms. This was expected to continue on into the night on Wednesday and a slight chance of showers lingering into today, Thursday.

According to NWS, unstable tropical air spreading northward into West Texas will maintain an abundant supply of moisture for the next several days. They said the combination of a surface front, and weak upper disturbances moving over West Texas will continue to generate showers and thunderstorms, although they will be widespread.

Pet Show Is Added To Fair

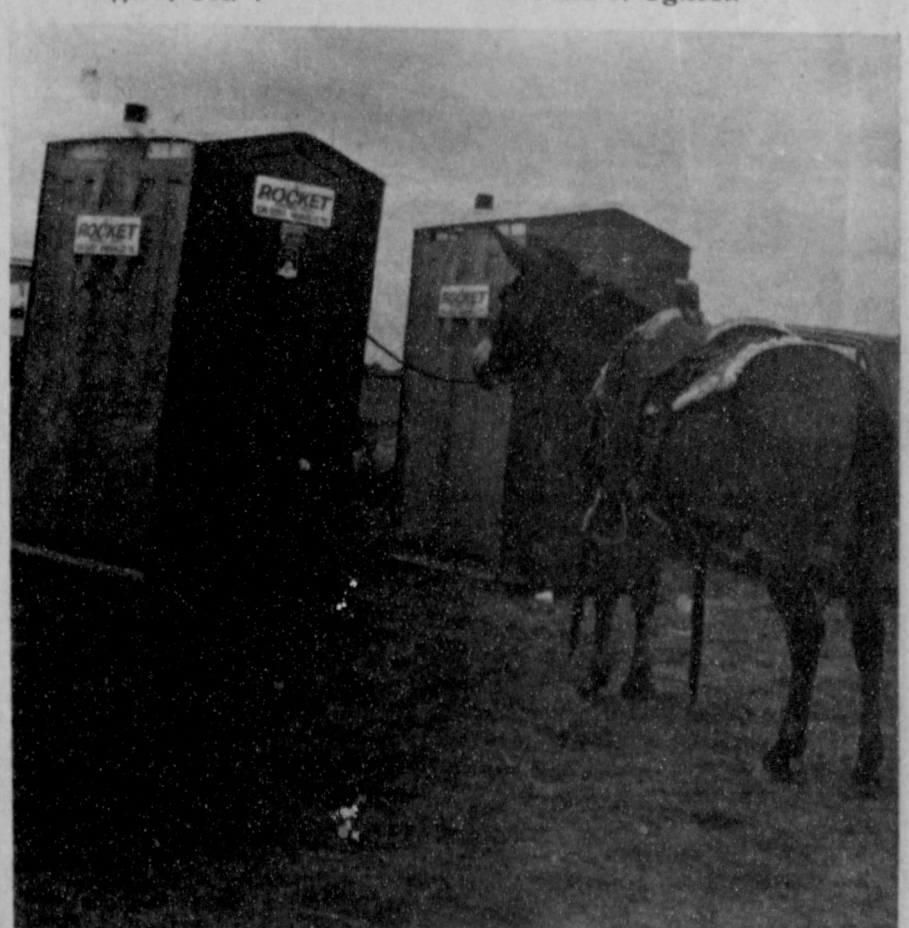
Something new has been added to the Bailey County/West Plains Fair, scheduled for September 12-14 this year. A pet show for both adults and youth is an added feature for 2 p.m. on Saturday, September 14.

Large animals, such as sheep, swine, cattle, horses, goats and mules cannot be entered and all pets must be kept on a leash or in a cage.

Animals that cannot be controlled by the owner will not be allowed to show. Each exhibitor may show only one pet. The pet may be exhibited in one or more classes.

The adult division is for 18 and over and the youth division will be for those under the age of 18 years.

Co-op's Annual Meeting Marks 50th Anniversary

Some 700 Texas co-op leaders joined last week in celebrating 50 years of rural electrification. They cited the record as reason for the celebration—from 97 percent of the rural populace without electricity in 1935 to 97 percent with electric service today.

In compiling this record, Texas' 80 rural electric systems have constructed more than 241,000 miles of lines throughout the rural areas of all but nine of Texas' 254 counties. They're now looking forward to connecting their one-millionth meter later this year.

Reference to the milestone punctuated sessions of the 45th annual meeting of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives. More than 700 persons registered for the July 29-31 meeting in Austin. A focal point of the gathering was a program one evening citing the late President Lyndon B. Johnson for his particular contributions to the rural electric record.

At this point, Cactus Pryor, Austin showman oft identified as "LBJ's favorite emcee," reminisced of his acquaintance with Johnson. A film of Johnson's career and close association with electric cooperatives preceded Pryor's lively presentation.

The TEC association premiered a 45-minute version of another film, "Legacy of a Dream," one afternoon. The documentary recalls the early days of rural electrification, with old-times discussing the hardships and the excitement of the early years. Twenty-two television stations across the state broadcast a 28-minute version of the film earlier this year.

An executive of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, Richard A. Pence, discussed some attempted hostile takeovers of co-ops by investor-owned utilities. The last successful takeover attempt was in Mississippi in 1972, when Mississippi Power Company gained control of a co-op's board and changed the bylaws allowing 200 members to cast 12,000 votes.

Pence explained that in recent years, several investors owned utilities have become "cash-rich," leading them to turn a hungry eye to the not-for-profit cooperative systems. Pence and

Bill St. Clair, Austin attorney and TEC general counsel, suggested ways for co-op managers and directors to defend themselves and co-op members from large utilities by hiring communication professionals, making changes in bylaws, and by conducting surveys to get better understanding of members' attitudes.

TEC's chief operating officer, Jim Morriss, pointed out a major perception problem of cooperatives in his presentation, "Our Second Half-Century."

"The investor-owned utilities' subsidy amounts to almost \$50 per consumer; the municipal subsidy is about \$40; and the rural electric subsidy is about \$9 per consumer....Where is the equity between urban and rural consumers?"

State Representative Pete Laney of Hale Center, a farm and ranch community north of Lubbock, outlined the volatile nature of the political process and the shrinking number of rural members of the Texas Legislature. Laney, chairman of the State Affairs Committee in the House, helped some detrimental legislation in the 69th Legislature that would have had "far-reaching" effects on all co-ops.

Dennis Engelke, Government-in-Action Youth Tour director for TEC, organized a reunion of approximately 200 youth tour participants to help celebrate REA's 50th birthday. TEC sponsors the annual youth tour, an idea of Lyndon Johnson's in the 1950's, which allows about 60 winners of speech or essay contests to visit Washington, DC, and study the political process.

The TEC government relations department presented a panel discussion on issues concerning co-ops such as dual certification of service areas, recent legislation, and Public Utility Commission management audits.

A.T. (Sorty) Turner of Southwest Texas EC consoled concerned co-op officials about the audits: "A PUC management audit is the best thing that can happen to a co-op; you should welcome one...don't be afraid of one," Turner said.

Voting delegates elected three men to two-year terms on the board of directors: Sam Houston

of Hill County EC, Hollis E. Joslin of Johnson County EC, and J.R. (Russ) Vander Zee of Bandera EC. The board in turn selected new officers: Sam Houston, president, succeeding Bill McGinnis of Denton County EC; Hollis E. Joslin, vice-president, and James Barr of Coleman County EC, secretary-treasurer.

The Texas Rural Electric Women's Association elected Mrs. Pat McAlister of North Plains EC Texas member of the national board. Mrs. J.R. Vander Zee was elected to the TREWA board.

Rural friends, a political

action group for the cooperatives, elected three new officers: Tommie Cutler, assistant manager of Taylor EC, is the new chairman; Jim Springs, general manager of DeWitt County EC is vice-chairman; and Sid Stevenson, president of Blue bonnet EC is secretary-treasurer.

DID YOU KNOW??

In early Muleshoe and Bailey County church services were often held in homes. One of the first such services in a home were in the L.F. Willman home, 8 miles northeast of Muleshoe. Another early church was held in the little old cracker box school house 7 miles north of Muleshoe. All denominations met together with services held by a Presbyterian minister, (later the father of a famous singing star, Jimmy Dean!)

In 1920 a church was built in the east part of town that served everybody, regardless of their denomination.

The First Baptist Church was organized in 1920 with 9 members.

The Church of Christ began meeting, with a few members, in 1930.

Methodism was first started in "old" Hurley. Later on, the building was first moved to Janes and then to Muleshoe. But the first Methodist church in Muleshoe wasn't really a church; it was a Sunday School. It was held in the depot of the

Santa Fe Railroad Co. in early 1914.

Now, in 1985, we are again planning meetings to be held in the Santa Fe depot building when it is renovated and restored in its new site west of the Bailey County Civic Center.

The railroad into Muleshoe was opened in Nov. 1913. Another source says it was 1914. The road bed was open to traffic in 1913, but the depot was not opened until early 1914. (according to *Early Bailey Co. History* compiled by 7th grade students in 1976- to 1978).

Most of the early settlers came to Bailey County by train. When railroads criss-crossed this Plains area, the farmers came to West Texas and Bailey County. Bailey Co. was one of 54 created from Bexar Territory in 1876. Only 4 people were counted living here in 1900. Bailey Co. was unsettled and undeveloped until ranching came when a law was passed in 1879 that made this possible. Bailey Co. was included in the Yellowstone division when the XIT Ranch was fenced into 7 divisions.

Cooling condenses air and reduces its capacity to retain water. In doing so, the invisible water particles in the air become relatively greater in content and finally become visible droplets of moisture. A cloud, then, is the result of cooling of air, which changes invisible moisture into visible form. This cooling process also produces fog-the lowest of the clouds. The sun's heating of the earth, which, in turn, heats the air above it, which rises and is cooled in the higher altitude, causes the formation of most clouds.

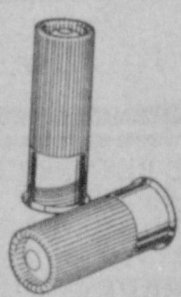
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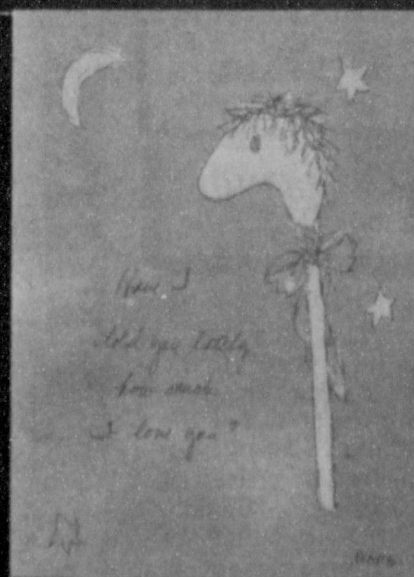


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
