What They Are Doing With Important Measures.

AUSTIN.

RAILROAD REPRESENTATIVES BATTLED AGAINST LEGISLATIVE POLICE—THE RESISTING MEMBERS—GENERAL CAPITAL CITY NEWS.

Assembly April 15.—Messrs. Mun and Armstrong, proprietors of the Texas Law Journal, the first number of which will appear Monday, to-day purchased the Tyler Law Reporter. This will make the Texas Law Journal the only paper of the kind in the state.

Maj. E. W. Caye, treasurer of the Houston and Texas Central railroad, has been elected to the office of representative in the hall of representatives to-night.
