WASHINGTON, June 19.—Mr. George introduced a bill appropriating \$100,000 for a public building at Vicksburg, Mississippi.

CHATTANOOGA, June 19.—A special to the Times from Winchester, Tennessee, reports that Henry Hodges, (colored), made an assault upon Mrs. M. Vaughn, a white lady, a resident of Winchester, on Saturday night. He was pursued and caught five miles from town, brought back and placed under guard. During Sunday night, company of unknown persons demanded admittance to the room. Upon being refused, they broke down the door and dragged out the negro. This morning the body was found hanging from a tree in the courthouse yard. The following inscription was placed on his clothes: "Whenever a man becomes tired of life, let him follow the example of Hodges and secure death."

PENNSYLVANIA, June 18.—The Shenandoah Valley railroad, extending from Roanoke through this state to Hagerstown, Maryland, has been completed and will be open for the first time to-morrow, when an excursion will be made over the entire length, 240 miles in all, and will take about 12 hours to make a direct run from north to south. F. J. Kinball, of Hagerstown, is president. VIRGINIA. GERMAN CLEARING-OUT. HARRISBURG, June 18.—The North German Gazette, of Germany, has chartered an American steamer to remove Germans from Alexandria, the accompanying orders for the German man-of-war being inadequate. ITALY. HEAVY ORDERS FOR TORPEDOES. ALEXANDRIA, June 18.—The Italian man-of-war Albatross, with two companies of troops, has arrived at Port Said. It is reported that within the next few days the Albatross will receive orders for torpedoes to the value of 100,000 pounds. A RESOLUTION TO TRANQUILIZE. ALEXANDRIA, June 18.—The British consul has advised the khedive to go to Cairo, and remain there a few days, so as to tranquilize the people. LOUISIANA. SUPPOSED MURDER AT BERKELEY. NEW ORLEANS, June 18.—The Times-Democrat's special from Bonnevill, Mississippi, says Morgan Hamilton, colored, accused of murdering Miss Nellie Hamilton, a white girl, who was shot down yesterday by a party of eight men who were working, told him to run, and he started off, but the sheriff is after the murderers. SIX BOYS DROWNED. NEW ORLEANS, June 18.—This afternoon John King, of the city of Lake Charles, Louisiana, was drowned while swimming with five other boys in the Gulf of Mexico. Their names and ages are as follows: Thomas McCormick, 10; George McCormick, 11; Willie Sherry, 15; Harry McGehee, 14; and Charles Duplessis, 14. KANSAS. THE GREAT STORM AT LEAVENWORTH. LEAVENWORTH, June 18.—A terrible storm prevailed here between twelve and one o'clock yesterday morning. St. Mary's academy, four miles south of here, suffered greatly. The main tower was blown down, crushing the roof of the dormitory, and Idaho (golden, Annie McDonald and Mabel Latham, of this city, and Miss Edna C. McGehee, of Miami, from 11 to 15 years, were killed. The other children escaped injury. The Kansas city and Leavenworth wires were cut, and the city was left in a state of darkness. A large number of houses were blown down, causing the loss of \$50,000. The wheat crop is not injured, but fruit trees and other trees are ruined. There will nevertheless be a good crop. An unknown man was blown into the river and drowned. The storm was the worst ever known in the city, and general havoc was wrought. NEW YORK. MEXICAN ARRIVAL. NEW YORK, June 18.—The steamer Germania, having on board the Irish agitator, Michael Davitt, and his private secretary, Mr. Wm. Redmond, arrived at the quay at 11:30 o'clock yesterday last night. He was met at the quay by a party of friends. In an interview with a reporter, Mr. Davitt said the object of his visit was two-fold. First, to contradict the rumors of a split in the land league movement, and the likelihood of there being a difference between Mr. Parnell and himself.
