Section 1. Beit ordained and decreed, and it is hereby ordained and decreed, by the General Counct of the Provisional Goverńment of Texas, that all bills, accounts, claims; đebts, dues, or demands, that are now, or shall or may we hereafter due, or owing b-y this or a future governmer.t, to any person or persons, for money, corn, provisions, otores, cloth, ing, medicines, forage, arms, ammunition, horses, mules, oxen, waggons, boats, transportation, or any service whatever, rendered in or furnished to and for the volunteer army of the people of Texas, now in the field, shall, before the same be admitted to audit and liquida× tion before the standing committee on war affairs of this house, or the proper department of a future government, contain the day, date, and des, cription of the article or sum furnished, and'place, and the certificate of the standing committee of safety and vigilance; or the order or certificate of the commanding officer, or col. of the regiment or company by the regiment or company by whose order, and at whose requsitions the same may have been rendered or furnished; or the receipt of the contractor, commissary, or quartermaster to whom the same may have been furnished and delivered, rogether with the oath or affirmation before any judge or al calde, of the person or persons o pres nting the same for liquidation: that the said accounts, debts, dues, demands or services were at the time \& place specified, supplied, furnished, or rendered, made use of, delivered, passed or taken, lost, or killed, in the service of the volunteer army of the people of Texas, aforesaid.

Sect. 2. Be it further ordained and decreed, and it is hereby ordained and decreed by the authority aforesaid, that the committee or war aflairs of Hiris Council, or the same department of this or a future Lgovernment, shall, and they are
hereby required to settle, audit, liquidate, and pass all bills, accounts, debts, dues, and demands, coming within the purview of the preceding section of this ordinance, on liberal prinejples, whenever the circumstances of the case shall in their disc retion or judgment admit or warrnnt the same.

S. troops from Jefferson barraks, for the Mexican fronter, where they are to be joined by Gen. Gans es, who is to take the conmand."
