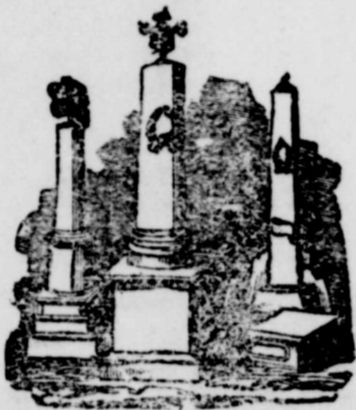

Protesting Against Rate Reduction. Atlanta, Ga.—The recent proposition of J. Pope Brown, Chairman of the Georgia Railroad commission, to reduce the passenger rate in Georgia from three to two cents per mile was protested against by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Order of Railway Conductors, and unions of the blacksmiths, machinists and telegraphers, boiler-makers, railway trainmen, carpenters and joiners, clerks and car men. These organizations employed an attorney especially to represent them, who urged that such a reduction would work against the prosperity of the state and lead to a reduction in the number of railroad employes, as well as of their wages. The Travelers' Protective Association also protested that a reduction, as proposed, would result in fewer trains and poorer service.

Enormous Wool Imports.

Albuquerque Morning Journal.

Latest figures on the imports of wool show that the United States during the month of April imported almost 31,000,000 pounds. This is a considerable increase on the imports of March and shows a total importation of wool for ten months of the fiscal year of 198,629,221 pounds. From present indications total imports for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905, will be but little short of 250,000,000 pounds. This volume of wool represents about five-sixths of our total production of domestic wool and shows the largest imports since the era of free wool.

The foreign situation has yet to develop and the London auctions on July 4 will have much to do with the course of future prices. If prices at these big sales fail to advance, market experts hold that the upward movements of prices on this side will undoubtedly be checked, as the prices of various classes of foreign wools are at the profitable importing point. This is shown by the enormous influx of foreign wools.

The hunger of American manufacturers for wool as shown by the surprising volume of imports must be encouraging to American flock owners. It can mean but one thing. That strong as the market has been there is no possible danger of any heavy reaction in the near future and that so far as prices for his product are concerned, the wool grower can rest in the comfortable assurance of stable conditions. So long as it is necessary to import these enormous quantities of foreign wools, the wool grower of the southwest and the northwest, and the little flock owner of the middle states need have no fear for his market. The condition is one which is distinctly encouraging to New Mexico. The growing of wool is our banner industry. Nothing but the most adverse conditions of climate can keep it from being profitable. Its possibilities under modern methods of care and management are limitless. With this condition of the market the New Mexico wool grower can give over worrying about meeting his bills and turn his attention to producing more wool and of a higher grade. The industry should, and undoubtedly will make vast forward strides in the next few years.

Authorities differ as to the origin of the sign \$, used to represent dollars, some claiming that it comes from the letters U. S. which, after the adoption of the Federal Constitution, were prefixed to the Federal Currency, and which, in the hurry of writing, were run into one another. Others say it was derived from a contraction of the Spanish word "pesos," while another explanation is that it is a modification of the figure 8, and denotes a piece of eight reals, or, as the dollar was formerly called, "a piece of eight," and designated thus, 8-8.

A Jap's Idea of His Own Country.

Those who imagine that Japan is altogether flowers and its people altogether virtuous and brave, are mistaken. A Japanese, Kilchi Kaneko, writes in the Arena that the condition of the workmen in Japan is a most miserable one. They are working generally twelve hours a day and sometimes fifteen hours. Ordinary workmen receive from 12 to 20 sen, 10 to 18 cents a day; skilled labor from 30 to 40 sen; girls earn from 10 to 20 sen, and children only a few sen a day. Even skilled mechanics receive but 50 sen per day; Japanese policemen get only 12 yen per month. Mr. Kaneko declares that Marquis Ito is the worst type of statesman of whose private life, immorality and degraded character he is ashamed to speak. The love of country and loyalty to the Mikado universally believed to be a national trait of the Japanese people is said to be a fiction of the imagination. In Kaneko's words: "The Japanese government system is a make-believe system. It is not by the people, of the people, for the people. It is the government of the few, of the nobles, of the titles, and above all, of the figure head, the Mikado." There is only one government and one people more degraded than the Japanese according to Mr. Kaneko, and that is the Russians, and such testimony coming from the pen of a Japanese writer is worthy of some consideration in making up an estimate of Japan and its inhabitants even if not of the Czar and his subjects.—New Mexican.
