

Bujac, Freeman and the Citizens Convention.

Were they not inflamed by the passions incident to a campaign it is certain that none of the men who characterize as a mob the Democrats who, attended the citizens convention in Carlsbad Saturday night, would be guilty of using such unjust and intemperate language.

It has long been understood that Capt. Bujac would be the Democratic nominee for constitutional delegate and it was equally well known that Judge A. A. Freeman would be the Republican candidate.

Now, as far as we can learn the feel ing between the Captain and the Judge has been far from friendly. This being the case it is not hard to conceive how the latter could obtain the impression that whatever was opposed to Bujac was a popular, or "Citizens" movement, especially as it had the extra merit of antagonizing the Democratic party at the same time.

But while considerable allowance may be made for Judge Freeman, not so much is due to some of his advisers. They knew that to invite "every citizen in favor of good government, law and order" to attend a citizens convention, and then later claim that only a few chosen Republicans and dissatisfied Democrats could participate was an insult to the great mass of Democrats in Eddy county. ADOLPH SEGAL, PROMOTER



From soapmaker, working with his own hands over a hot caldron in a little basement, multi-millionaire-this is the story Adolph Segal has written into the financial history of Philadelphia within 20 years. In the writing he has made chapters which cost the sugar trust a round million of dollars, that seasoned financier, J. Edward Addicks, a pretty penny, and finally sent to rule one of the greatest financial institutions of the City of Brotherly Love, hurrying its president to the grave of a suicide.

Out of the failure of the wrecked Real Estate Trust company comes the tale of the almost marvelous methods of an Austrian immigrant, who, landing in this country possessed of \$300 a the age of 26, claims \$12,000,000 in his forty-sixth car, all acquired without the aid of capital other than a pleasant voice, a clear eye and a graciou; personality.

Born in Austria, Adolph Segal spent his younger days in Paris, but of this period little is known by those who claim to be his closest friends, and he has writen no autobiography. It is said that he traveled in Europe and the far east and that he first came to California when he turned his face to the land of easy-money and get-rich-quick methods. In Philadelphia, 21 years ago, he boiled soap at the west end of the city. A year later he interested a soap-making concern to start him in business in a small way with labor saving machinery, and while conducting this business he and an inventor perfected a wax paper of unusual quality. The patent was sold to the New York Paper company, Segal's share being \$20,000. This was his first substantial start.

To enumerate the holdings of Adolph Segal would require columns. He is interested in railroads, steamboats, sugar refineries, match factories, soap factories, paper mills, lead plants, mines, construction companies and hotel and theater properties. In height he is about five feet ten inches, has a pleasing manner, a low voice; is, in manner, the personification of frankness and sincerity, and gives one the impression of being a musician. His wife is in terested in literature, has the press club habit and is writing a novel. Segal denies that he is a financier of the frenzied order, and in describing his operations says: "The only difference between myself and Russel Sage is that Sage speculated in stock and I speculate in bricks and mortar. I have never yet touched the speculation ribbon of the brokerage game."

ACTRESS TO WED NOSLEMAN

From a household drudge to the footlight favorite and from there the flancee of Hon. Henry Lyndhurst Bruce, eldest son of Lord Aberdare and lieutenant in a Hampshire regiment, has been the triumphant career of Camille Clifford, known in private life as Camille Otterson.

Miss Clifford's rise has been as steady as it has been spectacular. She was born in Sweden, and six years ago came to Boston and obtained employment as a domestic in the home of Mrs. John M. Schilling in Pontiac street. In 1901 Miss Ottersen became a seamstress in a Boylston street shop, and subsequently was taken as a "super" at the Park theater, later becoming a chorus girl.

Henry W. Savage discovered her theatrical possibilities, and engaged her for "The Prince of Pilsen" company, in which she figured as the typical New York girl. Two years ago she went with the troupe to London and created a sensation. Later she achieved suc-

cess in "The Catch of the Season," and this year won additional popular favor in "The Belle of Mayfair." Miss Clifford is 21 years old.

Hon. Mr. Bruce was born in 1881. He says he is going into the motor car business. The Aberdare baronage dates only from 1873, the first holder title having been T. A. Bruce, ford president of the council in the first Gladstone cabinet.

The engagement has been announced by Bruce himself, and it is understood the wedding will be celebrated before the new year dawns. On two previous occasions it has been announced that the actress and the earl would wed, but until now both have made strenuous denials.

TO SUPPRESS SWEATSHOPS



Chief Sanitary Inspector Perry L. Hedrick, of Chicago, says that the sweatship-in that city consisting of one or more tenement rooms, used indiscriminately for living and working purposes -is to be obliterated as an economic factor in

Like some noxious weed that has only its most offensive sprouts nipped off while new nourishment has been given its roots, the sweat shop evil has grown larger and stronger with each succeeding year. Inspector Hedrick says that there are now between 2,000 and 3,000 of these pest spots in Chicago. With so few exceptions that they do not affect the total, all of them are located in the crowded ghetto district of the West side, where the poorest of Italian and Jewish families are crowded into the ramshackle two to four-story tenements.

After this season, if Mr. Hedrick procures the legislation which he has outlined from the general assembly and city council when they convene, these poverty-stricken persons will no longer be the only individuals within reach of the law and solely punishable for the sweatshops. The "tailors to the trade," whose little shops are centers of the webs that enmesh these poor homes, will also be criminally responsible for the conditions of the homes to which they send goods to be finished. The "tailors to the trade" do the machine work on the garments, and the finishing-stitching of certain seams, sewing on of buttons and buckles-is done in the sweat-

HEADS CHILI RELIEF WORK



Don Jerman Riesco, president of the earthquake-stricken republic of Chili, is directing the work of relief from the government offices in Santiago, his own residence being among those damaged by the shock. Although the terror, destruction and misery in his capital city are very great, he realized as soon as reports reached him that Valparaiso was in a much more serious plight. He at once dispatched as much of the fire department as could be spared to the south ern city. He sent out a squadron of cavalry to repair the telegraph lines and restore communication with Valparaiso. He ordered mounted troops hastened south to restore order. He sent warships with food, clothing and supplies to the sufferers



Mexico City, Mex .- A lake of quicksilver, covering an area of more than three acres, and having a depth ranging from 10 to 50 feet, has been discovered in the mountains of the state of Vera Cruz. The value of the product is estimated at many millions of dollars.

The news of this discovery was brought to this city by C. A. Bungi, a reputable mining man, who declares he was suffering from mercurial poisoning from having spent much time investigating the extent of the lake and coming in contact with the quicksilver. He went to Santa Rosalia springs, in the state of Chihuahua. where he took a course of treatment for his ailment. He returned to Mexico City sevral days ago fully restored in health.

Mr. Bungi interested F. Langerwall, wealthy iron manufacturer of Sweden, who is now in Mexico on business, and J. B. Feelin, of New York, who accompanied Bungi to the state of Vera Cruz and proved the truth of his discovery.

This lake of quicksilver has been known to the Indians of that locality for many generations. It is situated far up in the moutnains, in an almost inaccessible position. Its surface is partly covered by stones. It is believed that volcanic action in the mountains above smelted the quicksilver out of the cinnabar ore, and that it ran down and filled this depression.

Langerwall and Feelin have agreed to provide the capital for the operation of the rich find. A tunnel will be driven through the base of the mountain and the quicksilver will be brought down by means of gravity.

SILENT FOR DOZEN YEARS.

Man Able to Talk Makes Odd Record in an Almshouse.

York, Pa.-Silent for 12 years, never having been known to utter a word during all that time, is the record of Jerome Wills, an inmate of the county almshouse. Wills is 60 years old, and is the son of a man who is said to have been one of the richest in Adams county. Wills has full power of speech, and is apparently sound mentally, yet for 12 years he has held his tongue.

He was admitted to the almshouse 20 years ago, and showed no disinclination to talk until after he had been in the institution about seven years, when it was noticed that he was becoming taciturn and noncommunicative. Then he stopped talking altomade by stewards, attendants and physicians have repeatedly failed.

Wills spends his time in strolling along the corridors or sitting on a bench. His head is always bowed. as though he were in deep study.

When his fellow inmates address him or physicians or attendants speak to him he receives their salutations in silence. When approached by visitors he will retreat to his room and close the door after him.

AUTO HELPS FALSE HAIR TRADE.

Suppression of Convents in France Diminishes Supply Considerably.


The increase in the demand is exwomen wear more false hair than formerly. This is due to the development of automobiling and the suppression of hats in theaters.

Judge Freeman Speaks all Republicans to frame a constitution today, let them all be intelligent

False Premises Lead To Wrong Conclusions -- A Pleasan Talker.

D. L. Newkirk presided. The only speaker was Judge A. A. Freeman of Carlsbad. The Judge is a pleasant talker and made a good speech from his point of view.

When, however, he advanced the proposition that no man should be elected to a constitutional convention as the representative of a political organization he indulged in subtle though probably unconscious sophistry.

A political party is simply a manifestation of fundamental difference of opinion. Judge Freeman argued in effect that as an intelligent man would not chose a doctor, or a lawyer, or a minister, on account of the opinion the professional man might hold on the tariff, therefore, we should not bear in mind the political affiliations of a candianalogy is bad.

A consitutional delegate, unlike memwith matters about which political parties fundimentally differ-matters which often go to the basic principles of those
