Early Control

For Bagworms Slows Growth

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in mid-May in the Lubbock area this year and is now complete. Insecticide control is most effective in late May through early July when the bagworms are small, says County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control be-. comes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about one and one half inches long, Tanksley adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults. mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 cggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest." say Tanksley. "But, if bagworms were present on the plant last year an control measures were not applied. chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.'

The new section will consolidate most of the agency's ground water activities. It will be headed by Bill Klemt and will be in the agency's Water Rights and Uses Division.

Executive Director Larry Soward said the Commission "recognizes that ground water is becoming a significant water issue and is of concern to Texans." He said he believes the consolidation is the Commission's response to that increasing concern.

"We think that this new section will facilitate better focus on ground water issues and provide citizens a place to get information and have input into the various decision-making processes relating to ground water," Soward said.

The listing of the critical ground water areas is in response to House Bill 2. passed by the 1985 Legislature. Klemt said the Water Commission has been gathering information on areas considered for inclusion in the list since September.

According to Klemt, a critical area means an area that is experiencing or is expected to


While the students were learning what to expect from college life, parents were learning about university programs, meeting university personnel, learning about financial obligations and touring the campus and downtown area.

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

NAVAJO FRY BREAD 3 cups flour, either all white or half whole wheat

1¹/₃ cups warm water 1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. salt

Mix flour, baking powder and stir. Add warm water and knead until dough is soft but not sticky. Tear off one piece at a time and stretch and pat dough until thin and round (about 6 inches across). Poke a hole through the middle of the round piece of dough and drop into kettle of sizzling cooking oil. Brown the bread on both sides by turning it over in the hot oil with a large cooking fork. Serve hot with honey or jam. One can toast it later for breakfast. (Poking the center of the bread to make a hole lets the evil spirits out!)







Area Soil Samples Have Decline In Nutrients To Aid Production

vields in the High Plains of Texas have steadily declined. losing an estimated ten pounds of lint production per acre per year. Results of soil sample analyses suggest that depletion of phosphorus and nitrogen from the top four feet of the soil profile may be the reason for this decrease in cotton yields in the Texas High Plains.

Results of analyses on 250 soil samples taken by the High Plains Water District, and the Soil Conservation Service from 72 fields in seven southers High Plains counties show that nitrogen levels are low enough in the four-foot root zone profile to limit crop production to onehalf bale per acre, no matter what the water supply, according to conclusions made by Dr. Dan Kreig at Texas Tech University after he reviewed the results of the soil sample analyses.

Out of the 72 fields sampled. 52 had low or very low nitrogen levels and 50 had low or very low phosphorus levels in the top foot of the soil profile. In the second foot, which is the zone containing the most active roots. 36 had low or very low nitrogen

Over the past 20 years, cotton. levels and phosphorus was very deficient in most cases, with 54 having low or very low phosphorus levels.

All plant nutrients taken from the soil are absorbed by plant roots in a watery solution. Under full irrigation, where good moisture is maintained in the top foot of the soil profile throughout the growing season, plants draw moisture and plant nutrients for growth from the top foot if moisture and nutrients are available.

Under dryland or limited irrigation, the top foot of the soil profile is exposed to repeated wetting and drying patterns. During dry periods. plants have to depend on the lower root zone soil profile to supply a part of the water and nutrients needed. If either water of the proper nutrients are not available in these lower zones at critical growth stages when the surface soil is dry, then producers can only expect reduced vields.

Nitrogen moves within the soil profile in the presence of soil moisture, thus it can become readily available to plants at depths where moisture is present. A phosphorus deficiency in the lower root zones, on the other hand, is more difficult to correct since phosphorus has very limited downward movement with moisture in the soil. Phosphorus will





are complicated because other situations, such as subsidence or contamination, are also present.

The next step for the Ground Water Conservation Section will be to hold public hearings to receive information, to discuss boundaries of the areas and to discuss the problems and possible solutions in the critical areas.A schedule of the hearings will be published later this summer.

In addition to carrying out the mandates of state law, this new section will also have certain responsibilities relating to the new ground water language contained in the federal Safe Drinking Water Act reauthorization, which was signed by President Reagan on June 19.

Activities of the new section will include technical support for creation of underground water districts, ground water protection, part of the state's underground injection control program, the underground storage tank program, work with the Texas Water Well Drillers Board, and permitting of shafts for mining and waste disposal.






