LAW ON AR-TESIAN WELLS

The Act Recently Passed by the Tertitorial Legislature Regulating the Casing, Flow and License of Artesian Wells.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Asembly of the Territory of New Mexico: Rection 1. That any A tesian Well hat is not tightly and securely cased, apped or furnished with such mechanial appliances as will readily and effecively arrest and prevent the flow of water from such well, is hereby declared o be a public nuisance. The owner, enant, or occupant of the land upon which such well is situated who causes, permits or suffers such public nuisance, or suffers or permits it to remain or coninue, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Section 2. Any person owning, pos-

essing or occupying any land upon which is situated an Artesian Well, who auses, suffers or permits the water to innecessarily flow from such well or to to waste, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Section 3. An Artesian Well is dewell, the waters of which, if properly within said county, district or city. cased, will flow out continuously over the natural surface of the ground adjacent to such well at any season of the shall apply to water flowing from min-

Section 4. Waste is defined for the purpose of this Act to be causing, suffersuch well to reach any porous substratum before coming to the earth's surface, or to flow from such wells unnecessarily upon any land, or indirectly into any river, creek or other natural water course or channel, or into any lake or pond, or into any street, road or highway, unless it be used on land for beneficial purposes.
